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## Associations of "Fussing" (30 Words)

<b>altercation</b>	Noisy quarrel. <i>I had an <b>altercation</b> with the ticket collector.</i>
<b>argue</b>	Persuade someone to do or not to do (something) by giving reasons. <i>He <b>argued</b> for extra resources.</i>
<b>bicker</b>	Argue about petty and trivial matters. <i>The restless wheels whose flashing spokes <b>bicker</b> and burn.</i>
<b>brawl</b>	A rough or noisy fight or quarrel. <i>He ended up <b>brawling</b> with a lout outside his house.</i>
<b>bustle</b>	(of a place) be full of activity. <i>She <b>bustled</b> us into the kitchen.</i>
<b>busy</b>	Keep busy with. <i>He had been too <b>busy</b> to enjoy himself.</i>
<b>cavil</b>	Raise trivial objections. <i>They <b>cavilled</b> at the cost.</i>
<b>commotion</b>	Civil insurrection. <i>They set off firecrackers to make a lot of <b>commotion</b>.</i>
<b>confuse</b>	Make (someone) bewildered or perplexed. <i>The points made by the authors <b>confuse</b> rather than clarify the issue.</i>
<b>dither</b>	Make a fuss; be agitated. <i>He was <b>dithering</b> about the election date.</i>
<b>dogfight</b>	Arrange for an illegal dogfight. <i>Sergeant Smith and a colleague were in a <b>dogfight</b> with an enemy aircraft.</i>
<b>fight</b>	Be engaged in a fight carry on a fight. <i>The <b>fight</b> was on television last night.</i>
<b>flap</b>	Move with a flapping motion. <i>The bird <b>flapped</b> its wings.</i>

<b>flurry</b>	A sudden short period of activity or excitement. <i>There was a brief <b>flurry</b> of activity in the hall.</i>
<b>fluster</b>	Be flustered behave in a confused manner. <i>The main thing is not to get all in a <b>fluster</b>.</i>
<b>flutter</b>	An act of fluttering. <i>There was a <b>flutter</b> of wings at the window.</i>
<b>hassle</b>	Deliberate harassment. <i>An election year <b>hassle</b> with farmers.</i>
<b>nitpick</b>	Engage in fussy or pedantic fault-finding. <i>The state is <b>nitpicking</b> about minor administrative matters.</i>
<b>picky</b>	Exacting especially about details. <i>They are becoming increasingly <b>picky</b> about where they stay.</i>
<b>priggish</b>	Self-righteously moralistic and superior. <i>A <b>priggish</b> little pedant.</i>
<b>quarrel</b>	A reason for disagreement with a person, group, or principle. <i>We have no <b>quarrel</b> with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>
<b>quibble</b>	An evasion of the point of an argument by raising irrelevant distinctions or objections. <i>The only <b>quibble</b> about this book is the price.</i>
<b>scuffle</b>	(of an animal or person) move (something) in a scrambling or confused manner. <i>A drenched woman <b>scuffled</b> through the doorway.</i>
<b>sophism</b>	A clever but false argument, especially one used deliberately to deceive.
<b>sophistry</b>	A fallacious argument. <i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure <b>sophistry</b>.</i>
<b>spat</b>	Come down like raindrops. <i>Oysters <b>spat</b>.</i>
<b>squabble</b>	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family <b>squabbles</b>.</i>
<b>tussle</b>	Disorderly fighting. <i>The demonstrators <b>tussled</b> with police.</i>
<b>wrangle</b>	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>The bar keeper threw them out but they continued to <b>wrangle</b> on down the street.</i>
