Associations of "Fussing" (30 Words)

altercation	Noisy quarrel. <i>I had an altercation with the ticket collector.</i>
argue	Persuade someone to do or not to do (something) by giving reasons. <i>He argued for extra resources.</i>
bicker	Argue about petty and trivial matters. <i>The restless wheels whose flashing spokes bicker and burn.</i>
brawl	A rough or noisy fight or quarrel. <i>He ended up brawling with a lout outside his house.</i>
bustle	(of a place) be full of activity. <i>She bustled us into the kitchen.</i>
busy	Keep busy with. <i>He had been too busy to enjoy himself.</i>
cavil	Raise trivial objections. <i>They cavilled at the cost.</i>
commotion	Civil insurrection. <i>They set off firecrackers to make a lot of commotion.</i>
confuse	Make (someone) bewildered or perplexed. <i>The points made by the authors confuse rather than clarify the issue.</i>
dither	Make a fuss; be agitated. <i>He was dithering about the election date.</i>
dogfight	Arrange for an illegal dogfight. <i>Sergeant Smith and a colleague were in a dogfight with an enemy aircraft.</i>
fight	Be engaged in a fight carry on a fight. <i>The fight was on television last night.</i>
flap	Move with a flapping motion. <i>The bird flapped its wings.</i>

flurry	A sudden short period of activity or excitement. <i>There was a brief flurry of activity in the hall.</i>
fluster	Be flustered behave in a confused manner. <i>The main thing is not to get all in a fluster.</i>
<u>flutter</u>	An act of fluttering. <i>There was a flutter of wings at the window.</i>
<u>hassle</u>	Deliberate harassment. <i>An election year hassle with farmers.</i>
nitpick	Engage in fussy or pedantic fault-finding. <i>The state is nitpicking about minor administrative matters.</i>
<u>picky</u>	Exacting especially about details. <i>They are becoming increasingly picky about where they stay.</i>
priggish	Self-righteously moralistic and superior. <i>A priggish little pedant.</i>
<u>quarrel</u>	A reason for disagreement with a person, group, or principle. <i>We have no quarrel with the people of the country only with the dictator.</i>
<u>quibble</u>	An evasion of the point of an argument by raising irrelevant distinctions or objections. <i>The only quibble about this book is the price.</i>
scuffle	(of an animal or person) move (something) in a scrambling or confused manner. <i>A drenched woman scuffled through the doorway.</i>
sophism	A clever but false argument, especially one used deliberately to deceive. A fallacious argument.
sophistry	<i>Trying to argue that I had benefited in any way from the disaster was pure sophistry.</i>
<u>spat</u>	Come down like raindrops. <i>Oysters spat.</i>
squabble	A quarrel about petty points. <i>Family squabbles.</i>
tussle	Disorderly fighting. <i>The demonstrators tussled with police.</i>
<u>wrangle</u>	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>The bar keeper threw them out but they continued to wrangle on down the street.</i>
