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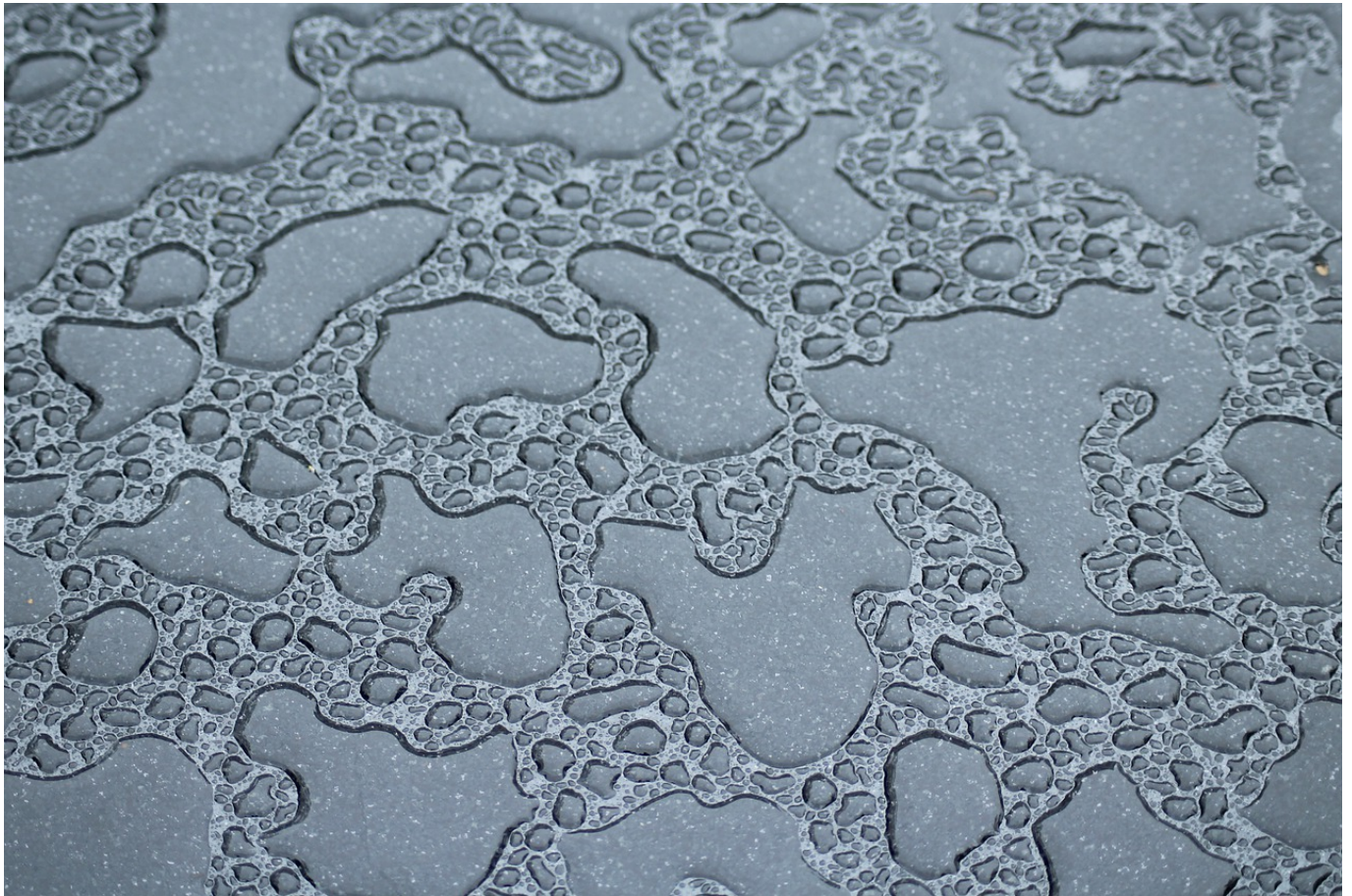

### Definitions of "Fuzzy" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fuzzy” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Relating to a form of set theory and logic in which predicates may have degrees of applicability, rather than simply being true or false. It has important uses in artificial intelligence and the design of control systems.*
- *Difficult to perceive; indistinct or vague.*
- *(of a person or the mind) unable to think clearly; confused.*
- *(of popular music or electric instruments) having or producing a distorted buzzing tone; fuzzed.*
- *Indistinct or hazy in outline.*
- *Covering with fine light hairs.*
- *Having a frizzy texture or appearance.*
- *Confused and not coherent; not clearly thought out.*

<b>addled</b>	Confused and vague; used especially of thinking. <i>This might just be my <b>addled</b> brain playing tricks.</i>
<b>befuddled</b>	Confused and vague; used especially of thinking. <i>He has an air of <b>befuddled</b> unworldliness.</i>
<b>benumbed</b>	Deprived of physical or emotional feeling. <i>The <b>benumbed</b> intellectual faculties can no longer respond.</i>
<b>bleary</b>	(of the eyes) looking or feeling dull and unfocused from sleep or tiredness. <i>Boris opened a <b>bleary</b> eye.</i>
<b>blurred</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>The <b>blurred</b> aims of the group.</i>
<b><u>blurry</u></b>	Not clearly or distinctly visible or audible. <i>Their eyes were <b>blurry</b> with tears.</i>
<b>confused</b>	Mentally confused unable to think with clarity or act intelligently. <i>Reports about the incident were rather <b>confused</b>.</i>

<b>disorientated</b>	Confused and unable to think clearly. <i>When he emerged into the street he was totally <b>disorientated</b>.</i>
<b>disoriented</b>	Socially disoriented. <i>The anesthetic left her completely <b>disoriented</b>.</i>
<b>dizzy</b>	Having or causing a whirling sensation; liable to falling. <i>Jonathan had begun to suffer <b>dizzy</b> spells.</i>
<b>downy</b>	Soft and fluffy. <i><b>Downy</b> milkweed seeds.</i>
<b>fazed</b>	Caused to show discomposure. <i>Refused to be <b>fazed</b> by the objections.</i>
<b>foggy</b>	Full of or characterized by fog. <i>A dark and <b>foggy</b> night.</i>
<b>frizzy</b>	In small tight curls. <i><b>Frizzy</b> red hair.</i>
<b>fuddled</b>	Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol. <i><b>Fuddled</b> drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.</i>
<b>fuzzed</b>	(of popular music or electric instruments) having or producing a distorted buzzing tone. <i><b>Fuzzed</b> guitars.</i>
<b>groggy</b>	Dazed, weak, or unsteady, especially from illness, intoxication, sleep, or a blow. <i>The sleeping pills had left her feeling <b>groggy</b>.</i>
<b>hazy</b>	Indistinct or hazy in outline. <i>It was a beautiful day but quite <b>hazy</b>.</i>
<b>indistinct</b>	Not clear or sharply defined. <i>Only <b>indistinct</b> notions of what to do.</i>
<b>mixed up</b>	Consisting of a haphazard assortment of different kinds.
<b>muddled</b>	Not clear or coherent; confused. <i>The <b>muddled</b> display of pictures has been taken down.</i>
<b>muzzy</b>	Confused and vague; used especially of thinking. <i>A slightly <b>muzzy</b> picture.</i>
<b>napped</b>	(of fabrics) having soft nap produced by brushing. <i><b>Napped</b> fabrics.</i>
<b>perplexed</b>	Completely baffled; very puzzled. <i><b>Perplexed</b> language.</i>
<b>satiny</b>	Having a smooth, glossy surface or finish like that of satin. <i>The walls glow with a <b>satiny</b> sheen.</i>

<b>silken</b>	Soft or lustrous like silk. <i>A <b>silken</b> ribbon.</i>
<b>silky</b>	Of or resembling silk, especially in being soft, fine, and lustrous. <i><b>Silky</b> skin.</i>
<b>soft</b>	Soft and mild not harsh or stern or severe. <i><b>Soft</b> crushed velvet.</i>
<b>stupefied</b>	As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise. <i>Lay semiconscious stunned or <b>stupefied</b> by the blow.</i>
<b>velvety</b>	Smooth and soft to sight or hearing or touch or taste. <i>The surface feels <b>velvety</b> to the touch.</i>
<b>woolly</b>	(of a sound) indistinct or distorted. <i><b>Woolly</b> thinking.</i>

<b>beard</b>	Go along the rim like a beard around the chin. <i>He was afraid to <b>beard</b> the sultan himself.</i>
<b>brushed</b>	(of fabrics) having soft nap produced by brushing. <i>A dress of <b>brushed</b> cotton.</i>
<b>bushy</b>	Covered with bush or bushes. <i><b>Bushy</b> desert areas.</i>
<b>curly</b>	Having curls or waves. <i>My hair is just naturally thick and <b>curly</b>.</i>
<b>feathery</b>	Resembling or suggesting a feather or feathers. <i>Wisps of <b>feathery</b> blonde hair.</i>

<b>fleece</b>	Cover as if with a fleece. <i>He clutched the ram by two handfuls of thick <b>fleece</b>.</i>
<b>fringe</b>	Decorate with or as if with a surrounding fringe. <i>Fur <b>fringed</b> the hem of the dress.</i> The skin of an animal with fur on it.
<b>fur</b>	<b>Fur</b> or scale not just in kettles but in other hidden parts of the hot water system.
<b>furry</b>	Covered with a dense coat of fine silky hairs. <i>A <b>furry</b> teddy bear.</i>
<b>hackles</b>	A feeling of anger and animosity. <i>Having one s <b>hackles</b> or dander up.</i>
<b>hair</b>	Filamentous hairlike growth on a plant. <i>Scalloped leaves edged with silver <b>hairs</b>.</i>
<b>haired</b>	Having or covered with hair. <i>A curly <b>haired</b> boy.</i>
<b>hairy</b>	Covered with hair. <i>Jacob was a <b>hairy</b> man.</i>
<b>hirsute</b>	Having or covered with hair. <i>Their <b>hirsute</b> chests.</i>
<b>leather</b>	Leather clothes especially those worn by a motorcyclist. <i>Carlos took his customary 20 metre sprint up to the ball and <b>leathered</b> it.</i>
<b>martin</b>	Any of various swallows with squarish or slightly forked tail and long pointed wings; migrate around Martinmas.
<b>mitten</b>	Glove that encases the thumb separately and the other four fingers together.
<b>mohair</b>	A yarn or fabric made from mohair typically mixed with wool. <i>A <b>mohair</b> sweater.</i>
<b>molt</b>	Cast off hair, skin, horn, or feathers.
<b>mop</b>	To wash or wipe with or as if with a mop. <i>She <b>mopped</b> the floor and cleaned out two cupboards.</i>
<b>mow</b>	Cut with a blade or mower. <i><b>Mow</b> the lawn a day or two before you go so it stays looking tidy while you are away.</i>
<b>mustache</b>	An unshaved growth of hair on the upper lip. <i>He looked younger after he shaved off his <b>mustache</b>.</i>
<b>otter</b>	The fur of an otter.
<b>plush</b>	Richly luxurious and expensive. <i>A <b>plush</b> Mayfair flat.</i>

<b>shave</b>	(of a man) cut the hair off the face with a razor. <i><b>Shave</b> the radish.</i>
<b>shaving</b>	The action of shaving. <i>She brushed wood <b>shavings</b> from her knees.</i>
<b>shear</b>	Cut off something such as hair wool or grass with scissors or shears. <i><b>Shear</b> sheep.</i>
<b>sweater</b>	A person who perspires. <i>A close knit wool <b>sweater</b> for icy weather.</i>
<b>whiskered</b>	Having hair on the cheeks and chin.
