<b><u>suitor</u></b>	A man who courts a woman. <i>The company agreed to negotiate with its <b>suitor</b>.</i>

<b>courtly</b>	Refined or imposing in manner or appearance; befitting a royal court. <i>He gave a <b>courtly</b> bow.</i>
<b>daring</b>	(of a person or action) adventurous or audaciously bold. <i>A <b>daring</b> crime.</i>
<b>dashing</b>	Stylish and fashionable. <i>A <b>dashing</b> hero.</i>
<b>doughty</b>	Brave and persistent. <i>His <b>doughty</b> spirit kept him going.</i>
<a href="#"><u>fearless</u></a>	Invulnerable to fear or intimidation. <i><b>Fearless</b> reporters and photographers.</i>
<b>gentlemanly</b>	Befitting a man of good breeding. <i><b>Gentlemanly</b> behavior.</i>
<a href="#"><u>gracious</u></a>	A polite epithet used of royalty or their acts. <i>Greig was <b>gracious</b> in defeat.</i>

<b>knightly</b>	Characteristic of the time of chivalry and knighthood in the Middle Ages. <i>The <b>knightly</b> years.</i>
<b>lionhearted</b>	Extraordinarily courageous. <i>A brilliant <b>lionhearted</b> second half comeback.</i>
<b>lofty</b>	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i><b>Lofty</b> intellectual disdain.</i>
<b>majestic</b>	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>His <b>majestic</b> presence.</i>
<b>mettlesome</b>	(of a person or animal) full of spirit and courage; lively. <i>Their horses were beasts of burden not <b>mettlesome</b> chargers.</i>
<b>obliging</b>	Willing to do a service or kindness; helpful. <i>It s very <b>obliging</b> of him.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Having or showing determined courage in the face of difficulties. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>
<b>polite</b>	Showing regard for others in manners, speech, behavior, etc. <i>They thought she was wrong but were too <b>polite</b> to say so.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i><b>Proud</b> alpine peaks.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Feeling or manifesting veneration. <i><b>Respectful</b> behavior.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>Brows drawn together in <b>thoughtful</b> consideration.</i>

<b>courage</b>	The ability to do something that frightens one; bravery. <i>He fought his illness with great <b>courage</b>.</i>
<b>courageous</b>	Not deterred by danger or pain; brave. <i>Her <b>courageous</b> human rights work.</i>
<b>daring</b>	(of a person or action) adventurous or audaciously bold. <i>The most <b>daring</b> of contemporary fiction writers.</i>
<b>daringly</b>	In an adventurous manner.
<b>gallantry</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>No young man offers to carry this burden for her such <b>gallantry</b> is out of fashion.</i>
<b>gutsy</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>You have to admire her it was a <b>gutsy</b> thing to do.</i>
<b>hardy</b>	English novelist and poet (1840-1928). <i>A favourite flowering shrub for early spring vigorous and <b>hardy</b>.</i>
<b>heroic</b>	A verse form suited to the treatment of heroic or elevated themes dactylic hexameter or iambic pentameter. <i>They took <b>heroic</b> measures to save his life.</i>
<b>impudence</b>	The quality of being impudent; impertinence. <i>His arrogance and <b>impudence</b> had offended many.</i>
<b>intrepid</b>	Fearless; adventurous (often used for rhetorical or humorous effect). <i>Our <b>intrepid</b> reporter.</i>
<b>manly</b>	Having or denoting those good qualities traditionally associated with men, such as courage, strength, and spirit. <i><b>Manly</b> sports.</i>
<b>plucky</b>	Marked by courage and determination in the face of difficulties or danger; robust and uninhibited. <i>The <b>plucky</b> youngster has astounded medical staff.</i>



<b>resourcefulness</b>	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>His films show remarkable technical <b>resourcefulness</b>.</i>
<b>robust</b>	(of an object) sturdy in construction. <i>The country's political system has continued to be <b>robust</b> in spite of its economic problems.</i>
<b>shameless</b>	(of a person or their conduct) characterized by or showing a lack of shame; barefaced or brazen. <i>His <b>shameless</b> hypocrisy.</i>
<b>stalwart</b>	Dependable. <i>He remained a <b>stalwart</b> supporter of the cause.</i>
<b>stouthearted</b>	Used especially of persons. <i>A <b>stouthearted</b> fellow who had an active career in the army.</i>
<b>valiant</b>	Having or showing valor. <i>She made a <b>valiant</b> effort to hold her anger in check.</i>
<b>valor</b>	The qualities of a hero or heroine; exceptional or heroic courage when facing danger (especially in battle). <i>He received a medal for <b>valor</b>.</i>
<b>valorous</b>	Showing great courage in the face of danger, especially in battle. <i><b>Valorous</b> deeds on the field of honour.</i>
<b>venturous</b>	Willing to take risks or embark on difficult or unusual courses of action. <i>Five <b>venturous</b> young men.</i>
