knightly	Characteristic of the time of chivalry and knighthood in the Middle Ages. <i>The knightly years.</i>
lionhearted	Extraordinarily courageous. <i>A brilliant lionhearted second half comeback.</i>
lofty	Of high moral or intellectual value; elevated in nature or style. <i>Lofty intellectual disdain.</i>
majestic	Majestic in manner or bearing superior to mundane matters. <i>His majestic presence.</i>
mettlesome	(of a person or animal) full of spirit and courage; lively. <i>Their horses were beasts of burden not mettlesome chargers.</i>
obliging	Willing to do a service or kindness; helpful. <i>It s very obliging of him.</i>
