
Galvanize as a Verb

Definitions of "Galvanize" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "galvanize" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Cover with zinc.
- Coat (iron or steel) with a protective layer of zinc.
- To stimulate to action.
- Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock.
- Shock or excite (someone) into taking action.

dynamize Make (a drug) effective.

Dynamized medicine.

Convert (a machine or system, especially a railway line) to the use of electrical $\[$

Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. thrill



urge Do try to relax she **urge**d.




vitalize Make more lively or vigorous. The eggs are vitalized.
