
## Galvanize as a Verb

#### Definitions of "Galvanize" as a verb

According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "galvanize" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Cover with zinc.
- Coat (iron or steel) with a protective layer of zinc.
- To stimulate to action.
- Stimulate (muscles) by administering a shock.
- Shock or excite (someone) into taking action.

| <u>excite</u>     | Cause to be agitated excited or roused.<br>Gould was <b>excite</b> d by these discoveries.   |
| exhilarate        | Make (someone) feel very happy, animated, or elated.<br>She was <b>exhilarate</b> d by the day s events.   |
| fire              | Drive out or away by or as if by fire.<br><i>Fire a bullet</i> .   |
| <u>fuel</u>       | Take in fuel as of a ship.<br>The tanker <b>fuel</b> ed in Bahrain.  |
| galvanise         | Cover with zinc.   |
| impel             | Drive, force, or urge (someone) to do something.<br>Vital energies <b>impel</b> him in unforeseen directions.  |
| inspire           | Create (a feeling, especially a positive one) in a person.<br>Their past record does not <b>inspire</b> confidence.                                  |
| <u>invigorate</u> | Make lively.<br>The shower had <b>invigorate</b> d her.  |
| <u>jolt</u>       | Push or shake (someone or something) abruptly and roughly.<br>She tried to <b>jolt</b> him out of his depression.                                    |
| <u>motivate</u>   | Give an incentive for action.<br><i>He said he would <b>motivate</b> funds to upgrade the food stalls.</i>   |
| rouse             | Cause to be agitated excited or roused.<br>The crowds were <b>rouse</b> d to fever pitch by the drama of the race.                                   |
| shock             | Collect or gather into shocks.<br>If a patient is deeply <b>shock</b> ed measurement of blood pressure may be difficult.                             |
| spur              | Urge a horse forward by digging one s spurs into its sides.<br><i>Spur</i> horses.   |
| <u>startle</u>    | Cause to feel sudden shock or alarm.<br>The loud noise <b>startle</b> d him awake.   |
| stimulate         | Encourage development of or increased activity in (a state or process.<br>The reader could not fail to be <b>stimulate</b> d by the ideas presented. |
| stir              | Mix or add by stirring.<br>As he grew older he seldom <b>stir</b> red from his club.   |
| thrill            | Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input.<br><b>Thrill</b> to the magic of the world s greatest guitarist.                                      |
| urge              | Push for something.<br>Do try to relax she <b>urge</b> d.  |




#### **vitalize** Make more lively or vigorous. *The eggs are vitalized.*

| electricity          | A form of energy resulting from the existence of charged particles (such as electrons or protons), either statically as an accumulation of charge or dynamically as a current.<br><i>The regional electricity companies.</i> |
| experiment           | To conduct a test or investigation.<br>A laboratory which carried out <b>experiment</b> s on pigs.   |
| <u>flabbergasted</u> | As if struck dumb with astonishment and surprise.<br>This news has left me totally <b>flabbergasted</b> .  |
| galvanism            | Electricity produced by chemical action.   |
| impact               | The action of one object coming forcibly into contact with another.<br><i>There was the sound of a third impact.</i>   |
| incredulity          | Doubt about the truth of something.<br><i>He stared down the street in <b>incredulity</b>.</i>   |
| <u>jolt</u>          | An unpleasant surprise or shock.<br>All the jars and <b>jolt</b> s were smoothed out by the shock absorbers.   |
| manganese            | The black dioxide of manganese as an industrial raw material or additive especially in glass making.   |
| <u>puzzled</u>       | Unable to understand; perplexed.<br><b>Puzzled</b> that she left without saying goodbye.   |
| serendipity          | The occurrence and development of events by chance in a happy or beneficial way.<br>A fortunate stroke of <b>serendipity</b> .   |
| shock                | Collect or gather into shocks.<br><b>Shock</b> ed onlookers watched as detectives broke into the pub.  |
| skepticism           | Doubt about the truth of something.  |
| <u>skittish</u>      | (of a person) playfully frivolous or unpredictable.<br>My <b>skittish</b> and immature mother.   |
| <u>staggering</u>    | Deeply shocking; astonishing.<br>The <b>staggering</b> bills for maintenance and repair.   |



| <u>startle</u> | A sudden involuntary movement.<br>A sudden sound in the doorway <b>startle</b> d her.  |

| stun           | Knock unconscious or into a dazed or semi-conscious state.<br><i>Stun fish.</i>  |
| stupefy        | Make dull or stupid or muddle with drunkenness or infatuation.<br>The offence of administering drugs to a woman with intent to <b>stupefy</b> her. |
| <u>stupor</u>  | A state of near-unconsciousness or insensibility.<br>A drunken <b>stupor</b> .   |
| surprise       | Cause to be surprised.<br>Much to her <b>surprise</b> she d missed him.  |
