- *Store; deposit.*

- Acquire or deserve by one's efforts or actions.

## Synonyms of "Garner" as a verb (16 Words)

<b><u>accumulate</u></b>	Gather; build up. <i>Her goal was to <b>accumulate</b> a huge fortune.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Gather together in a crowd or group. <i>The soldiers were <b>amassing</b> from all parts of Spain.</i>
<b><u>assemble</u></b>	Translate (a program) from a higher-level programming language into machine code. <i><b>Assemble</b> the program and produce a file suitable to input to the simulator.</i>
<b><u>cache</u></b>	Store data in a cache memory. <i>The operating system tries to <b>cache</b> every disk operation.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>A rider should want to be able to <b>collect</b> a horse when hacking.</i>
<b><u>conceal</u></b>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. <i>A line of sand dunes <b>concealed</b> the distant sea.</i>
<b><u>earn</u></b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>She <b>earns</b> a lot in her new job.</i>
<b><u>gather</u></b>	Collect or gather. <i>I <b>gather</b> you have not done your homework.</i>
<b>hide</b>	Be or go into hiding; keep out of sight, as for protection and safety. <i><b>Hide</b> the money.</i>
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i><b>Load</b> the cassette into the camcorder.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	Hike with a backpack. <i>A pneumatic igloo tent that <b>packs</b> away compactly.</i>
<b>pull together</b>	Strain abnormally.
<b><u>secrete</u></b>	(of a cell, gland, or organ) produce and discharge (a substance). <i>Insulin is <b>secreted</b> in response to rising levels of glucose in the blood.</i>
<b><u>store</u></b>	Find a place for and put away for storage. <i>The bear <b>stores</b> fat for the period of hibernation when he doesn't eat.</i>
<b>stow</b>	Pack or store (an object) carefully and neatly in a particular place. <i><b>Stow</b> the cart.</i>
<b>win</b>	Be the winner in a contest or competition be victorious. <i>Many lived to <b>win</b> the great cave.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Garner" as a verb

- *The police struggled to garner sufficient evidence.*
- *The crop was ready to be reaped and garnered.*

<b>acquired</b>	Gotten through environmental forces. <i><b>Acquired</b> characteristics such as a suntan or a broken nose cannot be passed on.</i>
<b>aggregate</b>	Amount in the aggregate to. <i>Raspberries are <b>aggregate</b> fruits.</i>
<b>allowance</b>	Give someone a sum of money as an allowance. <i>The elderly receive a heating <b>allowance</b> every winter.</i>
<b>amass</b>	Collect or gather. <i>He <b>amassed</b> a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.</i>
<b>attainable</b>	Capable of being attained or accomplished. <i>An <b>attainable</b> target.</i>
<b>collate</b>	Collect and combine (texts, information, or data). <i><b>Collate</b> the papers.</i>
<b>collect</b>	Gather or collect. <i>By all best conjectures I <b>collect</b> Thou art to be my fatal enemy.</i>
<b>convergent</b>	Relating to or denoting evolutionary convergence. <i>There are a number of <b>convergent</b> reasons for the growth of interest in pragmatics.</i>
<b>convoke</b>	Call together. <i>She sent messages <b>convoking</b> a Council of Ministers.</i>
<b>cumulate</b>	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>They appear to have formed from <b>cumulates</b> in the root of a magma chamber.</i>
<b>datum</b>	An item of factual information derived from measurement or research. <i>This is not a permanent and unchangeable <b>datum</b>.</i>

<b>deserved</b>	Properly deserved. <i>A <b>deserved</b> standing ovation.</i>
<b>earn</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>He <b>earns</b> his living as a lorry driver.</i>
<b>gain</b>	Increase in value. <i>I have <b>gained</b> weight over the years.</i>
<b>gather</b>	A part of a garment that is gathered. <i>I <b>gathered</b> that they were old friends.</i>
<b>gathered</b>	Brought together in one place. <i>The <b>gathered</b> folds of the skirt.</i>
<b>glean</b>	Gather (leftover grain) after a harvest. <i>The information is <b>gleaned</b> from press cuttings.</i>
<b>harvest</b>	Gather a crop as a harvest. <i>Farmers work longer hours during the <b>harvest</b>.</i>
<b>infamous</b>	Known widely and usually unfavorably. <i>The <b>infamous</b> Benedict Arnold.</i>
<b>infamy</b>	A state of extreme dishonor- F.D.Roosevelt. <i>A day that will live in <b>infamy</b>.</i>
<b>notoriety</b>	The state of being known for some unfavorable act or quality. <i>The song has gained some <b>notoriety</b> in the press.</i>
<b>obtain</b>	Be valid, applicable, or true. <i>How did you <b>obtain</b> the visa.</i>
<b>philatelist</b>	A collector and student of postage stamps.
<b>procure</b>	Obtain (something), especially with care or effort. <i>He <b>procured</b> extra cigarettes even though they were rationed.</i>
<b>reap</b>	Gather, as of natural products. <i>The company is poised to <b>reap</b> the benefits of this investment.</i>
<b>reconvene</b>	Convene or cause to convene again, especially after a pause in proceedings. <i>Parliament <b>reconvenes</b> on 1st June.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. <i>Online information <b>retrieval</b>.</i>
<b>scythe</b>	Cut with a scythe. <i>Attacking players can <b>scythe</b> through defences.</i>
