Definitions of "Garner" as a verb

- Store grain.
- Gather or collect (something, especially information or approval.
- Store; deposit.

Synonyms of "Garner" as a verb (16 Words)

<u>accumulate</u>	Gather; build up. <i>Her goal was to accumulate a huge fortune.</i>
amass	Gather together in a crowd or group. The soldiers were amass ing from all parts of Spain.
<u>assemble</u>	Translate (a program) from a higher-level programming language into machine code. Assemble the program and produce a file suitable to input to the simulator.
<u>cache</u>	Store data in a cache memory. The operating system tries to cache every disk operation.
collect	Gather or collect. A rider should want to be able to collect a horse when hacking.
<u>conceal</u>	Prevent from being seen or discovered. A line of sand dunes conceal ed the distant sea.
<u>earn</u>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. She earn s a lot in her new job.
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. I gather you have not done your homework.
hide	Be or go into hiding; keep out of sight, as for protection and safety. <i>Hide</i> the money.
load	Fill or place a load on. <i>Load</i> the cassette into the camcorder.
<u>pack</u>	Hike with a backpack. A pneumatic igloo tent that pack s away compactly.
pull together	Strain abnormally.
<u>secrete</u>	(of a cell, gland, or organ) produce and discharge (a substance. Insulin is secrete d in response to rising levels of glucose in the blood.
<u>store</u>	Find a place for and put away for storage. The bear store s fat for the period of hibernation when he doesn t eat.
stow	Pack or store (an object) carefully and neatly in a particular place. <i>Stow the cart.</i>
win	Be the winner in a contest or competition be victorious. Many lived to win the great cave.



Usage Examples of "Garner" as a verb

- The police struggled to garner sufficient evidence.
- The crop was ready to be reaped and garnered.

<u>accumulate</u>	Get or gather together. <i>Her goal was to accumulate a huge fortune.</i>
acquire	Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes. I managed to acquire all the books I needed.
acquired	Gotten through environmental forces. <i>Acquired</i> characteristics such as a suntan or a broken nose cannot be passed on.
<u>aggregate</u>	Amount in the aggregate to. <i>Raspberries are aggregate fruits.</i>
<u>allowance</u>	Give someone a sum of money as an allowance. The elderly receive a heating allowance every winter.
amass	Collect or gather. He amass ed a fortune estimated at close to a million pounds.
<u>attainable</u>	Capable of being attained or accomplished. An attainable target.
collate	Collect and combine (texts, information, or data. <i>Collate</i> the papers.
collect	Gather or collect. By all best conjectures I collect Thou art to be my fatal enemy.
convergent	Relating to or denoting evolutionary convergence. There are a number of convergent reasons for the growth of interest in pragmatics.
convoke	Call together. She sent messages convoking a Council of Ministers.
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. They appear to have formed from cumulate s in the root of a magma chamber.
datum	An item of factual information derived from measurement or research. This is not a permanent and unchangeable datum .



deserved	Properly deserved. A deserved standing ovation.
<u>earn</u>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>He earns his living as a lorry driver.</i>
gain	Increase in value. I have gain ed weight over the years.
<u>gather</u>	A part of a garment that is gathered. I gather ed that they were old friends.
gathered	Brought together in one place. The gathered folds of the skirt.
<u>glean</u>	Gather (leftover grain) after a harvest. The information is glean ed from press cuttings.
harvest	Gather a crop as a harvest. Farmers work longer hours during the harvest .
<u>infamous</u>	Known widely and usually unfavorably. The infamous Benedict Arnold.
infamy	A state of extreme dishonor- F.D.Roosevelt. A day that will live in infamy .
<u>notoriety</u>	The state of being known for some unfavorable act or quality. The song has gained some notoriety in the press.
obtain	Be valid, applicable, or true. <i>How did you obtain the visa.</i>
philatelist	A collector and student of postage stamps.
procure	Obtain (something), especially with care or effort. <i>He procured extra cigarettes even though they were rationed.</i>
reap	Gather, as of natural products. The company is poised to reap the benefits of this investment.
reconvene	Convene or cause to convene again, especially after a pause in proceedings. <i>Parliament</i> reconvenes on 1st June.
retrieval	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. Online information retrieval .
scythe	Cut with a scythe. Attacking players can scythe through defences.
