goon	A violent, aggressive person who is hired to intimidate or harm people. <i>He hired goons to hunt down supporters.</i>
lout	An awkward stupid person. <i>Drunken louts.</i>

lubber	A big, clumsy person.
lummox	An awkward stupid person. <i>Watch it you great lummox.</i>
<u>lump</u>	The state of being self-employed and paid without deduction of tax, especially in the building industry. <i>Working Only on the lump here and there.</i>
oaf	An awkward stupid person. <i>They are just big clumsy oafs.</i>
stumblebum	A clumsy or inept person.

Synonyms of "Gawk" as a verb (11 Words)

gape	Look with amazement; look stupidly. <i>A large duffel bag gaped open by her feet.</i>
gawp	Stare openly in a stupid or rude manner. <i>What are you gawping at.</i>
<u>gaze</u>	Look at with fixed eyes. <i>He could only gaze at her in astonishment.</i>
goggle	Look with wide open eyes, typically in amazement. <i>I goggled at them in total disbelief.</i>
look fixedly	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
look vacantly	Accord in appearance with.
ogle	Stare at in a lecherous manner. <i>He was ogling her breasts.</i>

<u>stare</u>	Look fixedly or vacantly at someone or something with one's eyes wide open. <i>He stared at her in amazement.</i>
stare in wonder	Fixate one's eyes.
stare open-mouthed	Fixate one's eyes.
stare stupidly	Look at with fixed eyes.

Usage Examples of "Gawk" as a verb

- *They were gawking at some pin-up.*

Associations of "Gawk" (30 Words)

cough	A condition of the respiratory organs causing coughing. <i>He coughed up bloodstained fluid.</i>
<u>dazzle</u>	Amaze or overwhelm (someone) with a particular impressive quality. <i>The dancer dazzled the audience with his turns and jumps.</i>
drowse	Sleep lightly or for a short period of time. <i>Let not your prudence drowse.</i>
filament	A threadlike structure (as a chainlike series of cells). <i>Each myosin filament is usually surrounded by 12 actin filaments.</i>
<u>flame</u>	A thing compared to a flame's ability to burn fiercely or be extinguished. <i>Jess's cheeks flamed.</i>
<u>flare</u>	Become flared and widen usually at one end. <i>The skirt had a wide flare.</i>
flash	A newsflash. <i>The flashings of pain were a warning.</i>
<u>frown</u>	Furrow one's brows in an expression indicating disapproval, displeasure, or concentration. <i>A frown of disapproval.</i>
gape	A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm. <i>She climbed into her sports car to the gapes of passers by.</i>
<u>gaze</u>	A long fixed look. <i>The male gaze.</i>
glance	Throw a glance at take a brief look at. <i>Sunlight glanced off the curved body of a dolphin.</i>

glare	Be sharply reflected. <i>The pomp and glare of rhetoric.</i>
glass	The contents of a glass. <i>Every hour the ship's glass was turned.</i>
gleam	An expression of an emotion or quality in a person's eyes. <i>The gleam of hope vanished.</i>
glower	Look at with a fixed gaze. <i>She glowered at him suspiciously.</i>
goggle	Look with wide open eyes, typically in amazement. <i>Their goggle mesmerizes even fishmongers.</i>
limelight	A focus of public attention. <i>The shock win has thrust him into the limelight.</i>
look	An expression of a feeling or thought by looking. <i>Her father looked unhappy.</i>
lurid	Presented in vividly shocking or sensational terms. <i>Lurid food colourings.</i>
ogle	Look at with amorous intentions. <i>A vaguely erotic ogle.</i>
rummage	Search haphazardly. <i>He rummaged in his pocket for a handkerchief.</i>
runny	(of a person's nose) producing or discharging mucus. <i>The souffl was hard on top and quite runny underneath.</i>
search	Search or seek. <i>They are searching for the missing man in the entire county.</i>
sneeze	An act or the sound of sneezing. <i>He stopped a sudden sneeze.</i>
spotlight	Illuminate with a spotlight as in the theater. <i>The knife flashed in the spotlight.</i>
stare	Fixate one's eyes. <i>He stared at her in amazement.</i>
staring	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Stark staring mad.</i>
sunglasses	Glasses tinted to protect the eyes from sunlight or glare.
wear	Have in one's aspect wear an expression of one's attitude or personality. <i>He always wears a smile.</i>
yawn	Utter a yawn as from lack of oxygen or when one is tired. <i>The yawning in the audience told him it was time to stop.</i>
