Synonyms of "Gaze" as a noun (5 Words)

eye

The region of the face surrounding the eyes.

*Delicate flowers of light blue colour with white or yellow **eyes**.*

- gape** A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm.
*A **gape** of the jaws.*
- intent look** The intended meaning of a communication.
- regard** The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded.
*They hold dolphins in high **regard**.*
- stare** A fixed look with eyes open wide.
*She gave him a cold **stare**.*

- *He fixed his paternal gaze on me.*



Gaze as a Verb

Definitions of "Gaze" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "gaze" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Look at with fixed eyes.*
- *Look steadily and intently, especially in admiration, surprise, or thought.*



Synonyms of "Gaze" as a verb (9 Words)

gape	Look with amazement; look stupidly. <i>A large duffel bag gaped open by her feet.</i>
goggle	(of the eyes) open wide or protrude. <i>I goggled at them in total disbelief.</i>
leer	Look or gaze in a lascivious or unpleasant way. <i>Bystanders were leering at the nude painting.</i>
look	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>She looked over the expanse of land.</i>
look fixedly	Convey by one's expression.
look vacantly	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
<u>peer</u>	Look with difficulty or concentration at someone or something. <i>Faye peered at her with suspicion.</i>
<u>stare</u>	Be unpleasantly prominent or striking. <i>She tried hard not to stare.</i>

take a good look Receive or obtain regularly.



Usage Examples of "Gaze" as a verb

- *He could only gaze at her in astonishment.*

appall	Strike with disgust or revulsion.
arrant	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>An arrant fool.</i>
daunt	Make (someone) feel intimidated or apprehensive. <i>Some people are daunted by technology.</i>
fear	Used to express regret or apology. <i>The fear of God.</i>
fright	Frighten. <i>I got the fright of my life seeing her in the hotel.</i>
frighten	Drive out by frightening. <i>At his age I guess he doesn't frighten any more.</i>

gape	A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm. <i>A large duffel bag gaped open by her feet.</i>
horror	Something that inspires horror something horrible. <i>Photographs showed the horror of the tragedy.</i>
intently	With strained or eager attention. <i>He gazed at her intently.</i>
intimidate	To compel or deter by or as if by threats. <i>Her boss intimidates her.</i>
leer	A lascivious or unpleasant look. <i>The men leered at the young women on the beach.</i>
look	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>A look of triumph.</i>
overawe	Impress (someone) so much that they are silent or inhibited. <i>The eleven year old was overawed by the atmosphere.</i>
panic	Feel or cause to feel panic. <i>We are not going to be panicked into a decision.</i>
peek	A secret look. <i>Faces peeked from behind twitched curtains.</i>
petrify	Cause to become stonelike or stiff or dazed and stunned. <i>Slogans petrify our thinking.</i>
scare	Become scared. <i>She has been given the all clear after a breast cancer scare.</i>
scared	Fearful; frightened. <i>Too shocked and scared to move.</i>
scary	Provoking fear terror. <i>It was scary the way they bonded with each other.</i>
sneer	A contemptuous or mocking smile, remark, or tone. <i>I see you re conservative in your ways David sneered.</i>
stare	Be unpleasantly prominent or striking. <i>He stared at her in amazement.</i>
staring	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>Staring eyes.</i>
terrified	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. <i>The terrified horse bolted.</i>
terrify	Cause to feel extreme fear. <i>The thought terrifies me.</i>

terror	Terrorism. <i>She had a terror of darkness.</i>
tincture	A quality of a given color that differs slightly from another color. <i>The sky was tinctured red.</i>
unadulterated	(especially of food or drink) having no inferior added substances; pure. <i>Pure unadulterated jealousy.</i>
unmitigated	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>An unmitigated lie.</i>
utter	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>He uttered strange sounds that nobody could understand.</i>
yawn	Utter a yawn as from lack of oxygen or when one is tired. <i>The yawning in the audience told him it was time to stop.</i>
