**gape** A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm.

**intent look** The intended meaning of a communication.

**regard** The condition of being honored esteemed or respected or well regarded.

- *Look steadily and intently, especially in admiration, surprise, or thought.*



## Synonyms of "Gaze" as a verb (9 Words)

<b>gape</b>	Look with amazement; look stupidly. <i>A large duffel bag <b>gaped</b> open by her feet.</i>
<b>goggle</b>	(of the eyes) open wide or protrude. <i>I <b>goggled</b> at them in total disbelief.</i>
<b>leer</b>	Look or gaze in a lascivious or unpleasant way. <i>Bystanders were <b>leering</b> at the nude painting.</i>
<b>look</b>	Look forward to the probable occurrence of. <i>She <b>looked</b> over the expanse of land.</i>
<b>look fixedly</b>	Convey by one's expression.
<b>look vacantly</b>	Look forward to the probable occurrence of.
<b><u>peer</u></b>	Look with difficulty or concentration at someone or something. <i>Faye <b>peered</b> at her with suspicion.</i>
<b><u>stare</u></b>	Be unpleasantly prominent or striking. <i>She tried hard not to <b>stare</b>.</i>



**take a good look** Receive or obtain regularly.



### Usage Examples of "Gaze" as a verb

- *He could only gaze at her in astonishment.*



## Associations of "Gaze" (30 Words)

<b>appall</b>	Strike with disgust or revulsion.
<b>arrant</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i>An <b>arrant</b> fool.</i>
<b>daunt</b>	Make (someone) feel intimidated or apprehensive. <i>Some people are <b>daunted</b> by technology.</i>
<b>fear</b>	Used to express regret or apology. <i>The <b>fear</b> of God.</i>
<b>fright</b>	Frighten. <i>I got the <b>fright</b> of my life seeing her in the hotel.</i>
<b>frighten</b>	Drive out by frightening. <i>At his age I guess he doesn't <b>frighten</b> any more.</i>



<b>gape</b>	A disease of birds with gaping of the mouth as a symptom caused by infestation with gapeworm. <i>A large duffel bag <b>gaped</b> open by her feet.</i>
<b>horror</b>	Something that inspires horror something horrible. <i>Photographs showed the <b>horror</b> of the tragedy.</i>
<b>intently</b>	With strained or eager attention. <i>He gazed at her <b>intently</b>.</i>
<b>intimidate</b>	To compel or deter by or as if by threats. <i>Her boss <b>intimidates</b> her.</i>
<b>leer</b>	A lascivious or unpleasant look. <i>The men <b>leered</b> at the young women on the beach.</i>
<b>look</b>	Of a building or room have an outlook in a specified direction. <i>A <b>look</b> of triumph.</i>
<b>overawe</b>	Impress (someone) so much that they are silent or inhibited. <i>The eleven year old was <b>overawed</b> by the atmosphere.</i>
<b>panic</b>	Feel or cause to feel panic. <i>We are not going to be <b>panicked</b> into a decision.</i>
<b>peek</b>	A secret look. <i>Faces <b>peeked</b> from behind twitched curtains.</i>
<b>petrify</b>	Cause to become stonelike or stiff or dazed and stunned. <i>Slogans <b>petrify</b> our thinking.</i>
<b>scare</b>	Become scared. <i>She has been given the all clear after a breast cancer <b>scare</b>.</i>
<b>scared</b>	Fearful; frightened. <i>Too shocked and <b>scared</b> to move.</i>
<b>scary</b>	Provoking fear terror. <i>It was <b>scary</b> the way they bonded with each other.</i>
<b>sneer</b>	A contemptuous or mocking smile, remark, or tone. <i>I see you re conservative in your ways David <b>sneered</b>.</i>
<b>stare</b>	Be unpleasantly prominent or striking. <i>He <b>stared</b> at her in amazement.</i>
<b>staring</b>	Without qualification; used informally as (often pejorative) intensifiers. <i><b>Staring</b> eyes.</i>
<b>terrified</b>	Thrown into a state of intense fear or desperation. <i>The <b>terrified</b> horse bolted.</i>
<b>terrify</b>	Cause to feel extreme fear. <i>The thought terrifies me.</i>



<b>terror</b>	Terrorism. <i>She had a <b>terror</b> of darkness.</i>
<b>tincture</b>	A quality of a given color that differs slightly from another color. <i>The sky was <b>tinctured</b> red.</i>
<b><u>unadulterated</u></b>	(especially of food or drink) having no inferior added substances; pure. <i>Pure <b>unadulterated</b> jealousy.</i>
<b><u>unmitigated</u></b>	Not diminished or moderated in intensity or severity; sometimes used as an intensifier. <i>An <b>unmitigated</b> lie.</i>
<b><u>utter</u></b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i>He <b>uttered</b> strange sounds that nobody could understand.</i>
<b>yawn</b>	Utter a yawn as from lack of oxygen or when one is tired. <i>The <b>yawning</b> in the audience told him it was time to stop.</i>
