all in all

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

almost always

Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.

altogether

To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).

*It was not **altogether** her fault.*

as a general rule

To the same degree (often followed by ‘as’).

as a rule

To the same degree (often followed by ‘as’).

basically

In essence; at bottom or by one’s (or its) very nature.

*I **basically** played the same thing every night.*

broadly

Without regard to specific details or exceptions.

*The climate is **broadly** similar in the two regions.*

broadly speaking

In a wide fashion.

by and large	So as to pass a given point.
commonly	Under normal conditions. <i>Shift workers commonly complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>
comprehensively	In a way that includes or deals with all or nearly all elements or aspects of something. <i>They were comprehensively defeated.</i>
conventionally	In a way that is based on what is traditionally done or believed. <i>He was dressed conventionally in a grey shirt and trousers.</i>
effectively	In such a manner as to achieve a desired result. <i>Effectively this means that companies will be able to avoid regulations.</i>
<u>extensively</u>	To a large or detailed degree. <i>The article was extensively researched.</i>
for the most part	Slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but.
generally speaking	Without distinction of one from others.
in a general sense	To or toward the inside of.
in general	To or toward the inside of.
in general terms	To or toward the inside of.
in most cases	To or toward the inside of.
in the general run of things	To or toward the inside of.
in the main	To or toward the inside of.
in the ordinary way	To or toward the inside of.
<u>loosely</u>	In a careless and indiscreet manner. <i>Discussions were loosely structured to enhance informality.</i>
<u>mainly</u>	More than anything else. <i>He is mainly concerned with fiction.</i>
more often than not	Used to form the comparative of some adjectives and adverbs.
most of the time	Very.
<u>mostly</u>	Usually; generally. <i>I made some good friends but mostly met closed minded people.</i>

normally	In a normal manner. <i>Try to breathe normally.</i>
on the whole	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’).
ordinarily	Usually. <i>An effort to behave ordinarily.</i>
overall	Taken as a whole; in all. <i>Overall 10 000 jobs will go.</i>
popularly	Among the people. <i>A popularly elected Parliament.</i>
predominantly	Much greater in number or influence. <i>It is predominantly a coastal bird.</i>
principally	For the most part; chiefly. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
substantially	For the most part; essentially. <i>Things will remain substantially the same over the next ten years.</i>
traditionally	As part of a long-established custom, practice, or belief; typically. <i>A nation traditionally hostile to taxation.</i>
universally	Everywhere. <i>Progress is not always universally welcomed.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions. <i>He usually arrives home about one o clock.</i>
widely	Far apart; with a wide space or interval between. <i>She was widely read.</i>

chiefly	Mainly. <i>He is remembered chiefly for his organ sonatas.</i>
commonly	Under normal conditions. <i>Shift workers commonly complain of not getting enough sleep.</i>

habitually	By way of habit; customarily. <i>Does he lie habitually.</i>
infrequently	Not often; rarely. <i>A storage area for infrequently used items.</i>
invariably	In every case or on every occasion; always. <i>Ranch meals are invariably big and hearty.</i>
largely	In large part; mainly or chiefly. <i>These accounts are largely inactive.</i>
mainly	For the most part. <i>He is mainly concerned with fiction.</i>
mostly	Usually; as a rule. <i>I made some good friends but mostly met closed minded people.</i>
normally	In a normal manner. <i>Try to breathe normally.</i>
ordinarily	In a normal way. <i>An effort to behave ordinarily.</i>

<u>overwhelmingly</u>	To a very great degree or with a great majority. <i>The country voted overwhelmingly for independence.</i>
pantechicon	A large moving van (especially one used for moving furniture).
predominantly	Mainly; for the most part. <i>It is predominantly a coastal bird.</i>
<u>primarily</u>	For the most part. <i>This is primarily a question of economics.</i>
principally	For the most part. <i>He was principally a landscape painter.</i>
<u>regularly</u>	In a way that follows the normal pattern of inflection. <i>The reunion has taken place regularly every two years.</i>
repeatedly	Over and over again; constantly. <i>They have been warned repeatedly with no effect.</i>
<u>routinely</u>	According to routine or established practice. <i>Owners routinely flout local laws about restraining and picking up after their pets.</i>
<u>typically</u>	With the distinctive qualities of a particular type of person or thing. <i>A typically English village wedding.</i>
universally	By everyone; in every case. <i>Progress is not always universally welcomed.</i>
usually	Under normal conditions; generally. <i>Heat resistant paints are usually black or aluminium coloured.</i>
<u>wont</u>	An established custom. <i>Sons wont to nurse their Parents in old age.</i>
