abundance	The quantity or amount of something present in a particular area, volume, or sample. <i>She was blessed with talent and charm in abundance.</i>
altruism	Behaviour of an animal that benefits another at its own expense. <i>Reciprocal altruism.</i>
<u>amplitude</u>	Greatness of magnitude. <i>The amplitude of alpha rhythms.</i>
beneficence	Doing good; feeling beneficent.
<u>benevolence</u>	Disposition to do good.

bounty	The property of copious abundance. <i>For millennia the people along the Nile have depended entirely on its bounty.</i>
charity	Help or money given to those in need. <i>The proceeds of the sale will go to charity.</i>
copiousness	The property of a more than adequate quantity or supply.
disinterest	Lack of interest in something. <i>He chided Dennis for his disinterest in anything that is not his own idea.</i>
generousness	The trait of being willing to give your money or time.
goodness	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i>
high-mindedness	Elevated ideals or conduct; the quality of believing that ideals should be pursued.
honour	A course of degree studies more specialized than for an ordinary pass. <i>Kyle had the honour at the last hole.</i>
honourableness	The quality of deserving honor or respect; characterized by honor. In the Roman Catholic Church a grant by the Pope of remission of the temporal punishment in purgatory still due for sins after absolution
indulgence	The unrestricted sale of indulgences by pardoners was a widespread abuse during the later Middle Ages. <i>Too much indulgence spoils a child.</i>
infinity	An infinite or very great number or amount. <i>An infinity of combinations.</i>
kindliness	The quality of being kind, warm-hearted, or gentle; kindness.
kindness	The quality of being friendly, generous, and considerate. <i>He thanked them for their kindness and support.</i>
lack of prejudice	The state of needing something that is absent or unavailable.
largeness	The capacity to understand a broad range of topics. <i>A man distinguished by the largeness and scope of his views.</i>
lavishness	The quality possessed by something that is excessively expensive.
liberality	The trait of being generous in behavior and temperament. <i>Noblemen were expected to live with a certain liberality and panache.</i>
loftiness	Impressiveness in scale or proportion.
magnanimity	The fact or condition of being magnanimous; generosity. <i>Both sides will have to show magnanimity.</i>

magnanimousness	Magnanimity.
munificence	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>We must be thankful for his munificence.</i>
<u>nobility</u>	The quality of being noble in character. <i>A member of the English nobility.</i>
nobleness	The quality of elevation of mind and exaltation of character or ideals or conduct.
opulence	Great wealth or luxuriousness. <i>Rooms of spectacular opulence.</i>
plentifulness	A large number or amount or extent.
prodigality	The trait of spending extravagantly.
profuseness	The property of being extremely abundant.
richness	A strong deep vividness of hue. <i>He praised the richness of the soil.</i>
self-sacrifice	Acting with less concern for yourself than for the success of the joint activity.
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
unselfishness	Acting generously. <i>Rural people show more devotion and unselfishness than do their urban cousins.</i>

altruism	Disinterested and selfless concern for the well-being of others. <i>Reciprocal altruism.</i>
appreciated	Fully understood or grasped. <i>Dangers not yet appreciated.</i>
benefactor	A person who helps people or institutions (especially with financial help). <i>A low interest loan from a benefactor allowed them to build a floor for the exhibition hall.</i>
beneficence	Doing good; feeling beneficent.
beneficent	Doing or producing good. <i>A beneficent landowner.</i>
benevolence	The quality of being well meaning; kindness.
benignity	Kindness or tolerance toward others. <i>His air of benignity.</i>

bountifulness	The property of copious abundance.
bounty	A sum paid for killing or capturing a person or animal. <i>They do not qualify for their bounty because they have spent insufficient time at summer camp.</i>
compassion	Sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others. <i>The victims should be treated with compassion.</i>
friendliness	A friendly disposition. <i>I was overwhelmed by the friendliness of the people here.</i>
generous	Showing a readiness to give more of something, especially money, than is strictly necessary or expected. <i>A generous benefactor to the University.</i>
giver	A person who gives something. <i>A giver of advice.</i>
goodness	That which is pleasing or valuable or useful. <i>A belief in the basic goodness of mankind.</i>
goodwill	A disposition to kindness and compassion. <i>The scheme is dependent on goodwill between the two sides.</i>
humane	Marked or motivated by concern with the alleviation of suffering. <i>Humane methods of killing.</i>
kind	Each of the elements (bread and wine) of the Eucharist. <i>A dry climate kind to asthmatics.</i>
kindness	Tendency to be kind and forgiving. <i>It would be a kindness on your part to invite her.</i>
largess	A gift or money given (as for service or out of benevolence); usually given ostentatiously.
largesse	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>The distribution of largesse to the local population.</i>
liberality	The trait of being generous in behavior and temperament. <i>Liberality towards bisexuality.</i>
magnanimity	Liberality in bestowing gifts; extremely liberal and generous of spirit. <i>Both sides will have to show magnanimity.</i>
mercy	The feeling that motivates compassion. <i>Mercy missions to refugees caught up in the fighting.</i>
munificence	The quality or action of being extremely generous. <i>We must be thankful for his munificence.</i>

<u>philanthropy</u>	The desire to promote the welfare of others, expressed especially by the generous donation of money to good causes. A philanthropy was incorporated to help oldsters obtain benefits like pension rights.
selflessness	The quality of unselfish concern for the welfare of others. A noble act of selflessness .
thank	Express gratitude or show appreciation to. You have only yourself to thank for the plight you are in.
thanks	An acknowledgment of appreciation. Many thanks .
<u>unselfish</u>	Disregarding your own advantages and welfare over those of others. Unselfish devotion.
unstinting	Very generous. Called for unstinting aid to Britain.
