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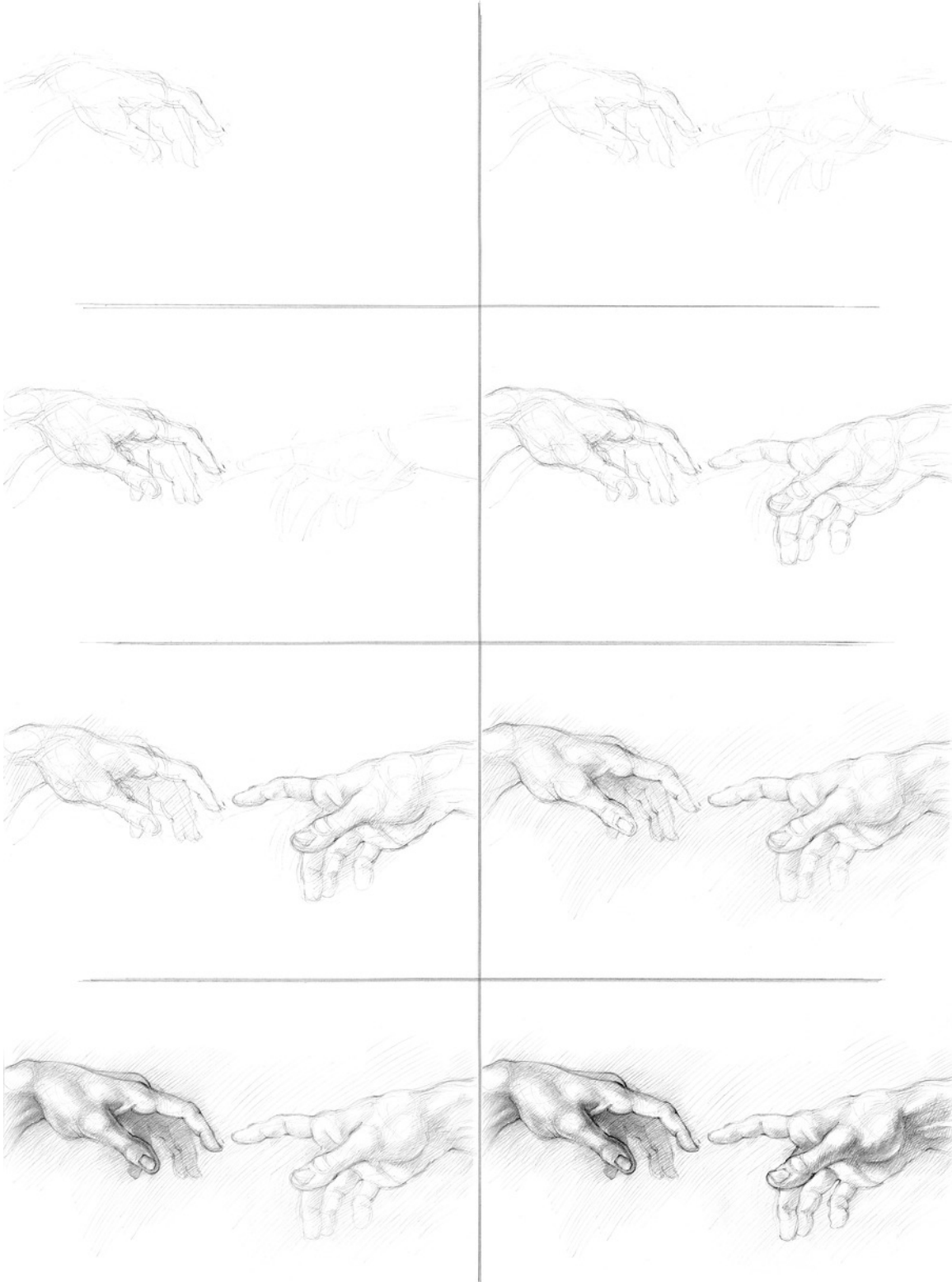

- *A coming into being.*

beginning	The point in time or space at which something begins. <i>It was a dark and stormy night is a hackneyed beginning for a story.</i>
<u>birth</u>	The process of giving birth. <i>They celebrated the birth of their first child.</i>
book of genesis	Physical objects consisting of a number of pages bound together.
coming into being	The act of drawing spatially closer to something.
<u>commencement</u>	The act of starting something. <i>The commencement of the trial.</i>
creation	Everything created; the universe. <i>Job creation.</i>
development	The section of a composition or movement (especially in sonata form) where the major musical themes are developed and elaborated. <i>The paintings provide evidence of his artistic development.</i>
<u>emergence</u>	The gradual beginning or coming forth. <i>The parasite s eggs hatch synchronously with the emergence of the wasp larvae.</i>
evolution	Biology the sequence of events involved in the evolutionary development of a species or taxonomic group of organisms. <i>Flocks of waders often perform aerial evolutions.</i>
formation	A thing that has been formed. <i>The formation of pseudopods.</i>
<u>formulation</u>	The action of creating or preparing something. <i>Compare this complex formulation with Bosch s much more simplistic analysis.</i>
<u>generation</u>	The normal time between successive generations. <i>They had to wait a generation for that prejudice to fade.</i>
<u>inception</u>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its inception two years ago.</i>
<u>invention</u>	The act of inventing. <i>The invention of printing in the 15th century.</i>
<u>origin</u>	The more fixed end or attachment of a muscle. <i>A voice that betrays his Welsh origins.</i>
<u>origination</u>	An event that is a beginning; a first part or stage of subsequent events. <i>There are a number of theories on the origination of the name.</i>

outset	The start or beginning of something. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the outset and learned on the job.</i>
propagation	Transmission of motion, light, sound, etc. in a particular direction or through a medium. <i>Hunting regulations ensure the propagation of the species.</i>
root	Any plant grown for its root. <i>Roots like beet and carrot cannot be transplanted.</i>
shaping	The spatial arrangement of something as distinct from its substance.
source	A person who supplies information. <i>Pittsburgh is the source of the Ohio River.</i>
start	A line indicating the location of the start of a race or a game. <i>The starting signal was a green light.</i>

<u>commencement</u>	A ceremony in which degrees or diplomas are conferred on university or high-school students. <i>A commencement address.</i>
creation	The action or process of bringing something into existence. <i>From its creation the plan was doomed to failure.</i>
<u>emanate</u>	Originate from; be produced by. <i>He emanated a powerful brooding air.</i>
<u>emergence</u>	The process of becoming visible after being concealed. <i>Figurines presage the emergence of sculpture in Greece.</i>
first	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>The first violin section.</i>
germinal	Containing seeds of later development. <i>De Beauvoir's germinal book <i>The Second Sex</i>.</i>
<u>groundbreaking</u>	Innovative; pioneering. <i>Groundbreaking research into fertility problems.</i>
inaugural	An address delivered at an inaugural ceremony especially by a United States president. <i>President Clinton's inaugural.</i>
<u>inception</u>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its inception two years ago.</i>
inchoative	An inchoative verb. <i>Inchoative stages.</i>
<u>incipient</u>	Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed. <i>We seemed more like friends than incipient lovers.</i>
initial	Mark with one's initials. <i>Greece and the United States initialled a new defence cooperation agreement.</i>
initially	At first. <i>Initially he thought the new concept was nonsense.</i>
initiate	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>They were initiated into the mysteries of mathematics.</i>
<u>initiative</u>	The power or opportunity to act or take charge before others do. <i>A new initiative against car crime.</i>
mount	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>She was mounted on a white horse.</i>

occur	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>Radon occurs naturally in rocks such as granite.</i>
<u>origin</u>	A fixed point from which coordinates are measured. <i>Jupiter was the origin of the radiation.</i>
<u>originally</u>	In an original manner. <i>Potatoes originally came from South America.</i>
<u>originate</u>	Have a specified beginning. <i>The flight originates in Calcutta.</i>
outset	The time at which something is supposed to begin. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the outset and learned on the job.</i>
provenance	Where something originated or was nurtured in its early existence. <i>The manuscript has a distinguished provenance.</i>
source	Obtain from a particular source. <i>A heat source.</i>
start	Play in the starting lineup. <i>He awoke with a start.</i>
