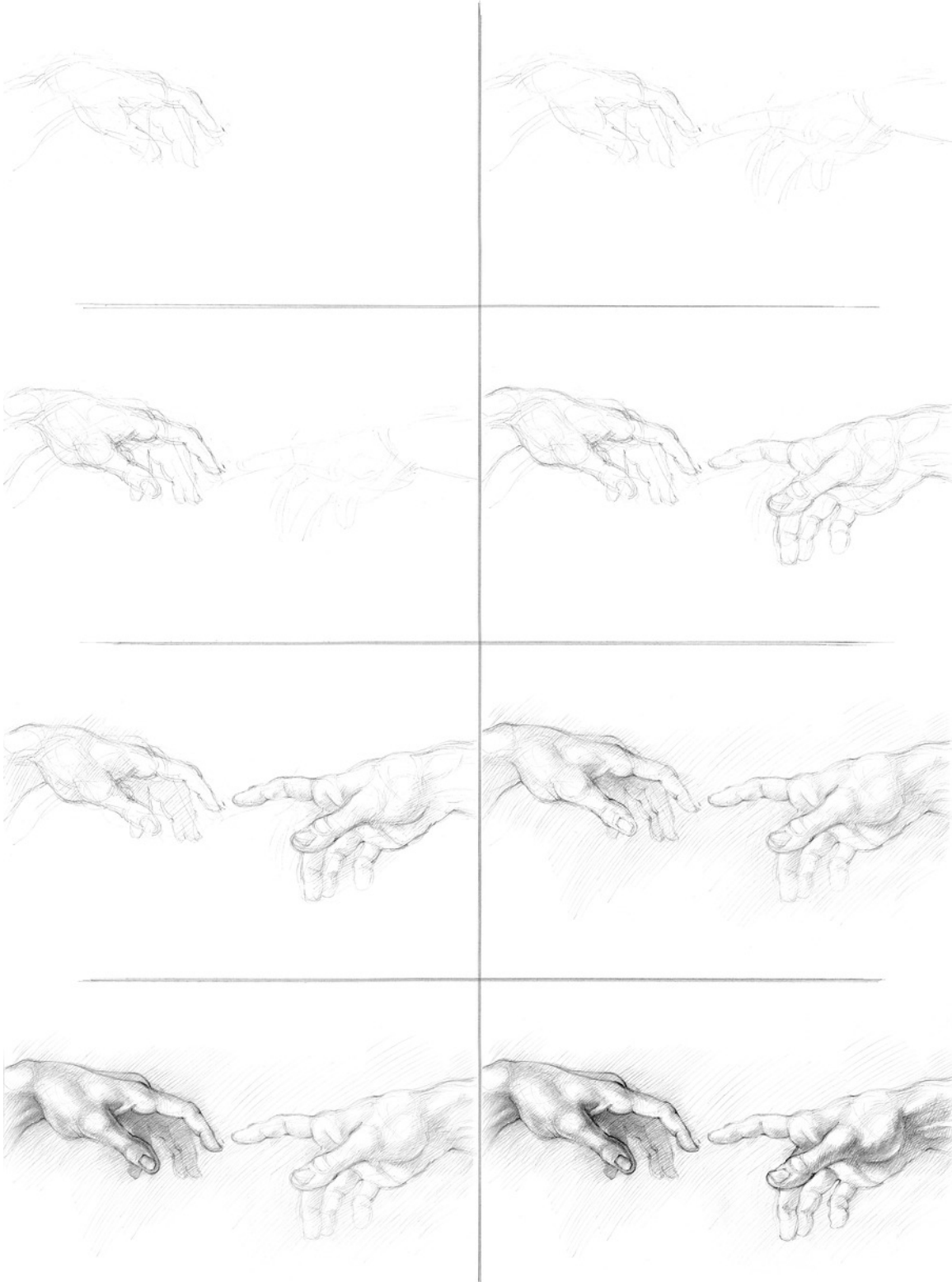

- *A coming into being.*

<b>beginning</b>	The point in time or space at which something begins. <i>It was a dark and stormy night is a hackneyed <b>beginning</b> for a story.</i>
<b><u>birth</u></b>	The process of giving birth. <i>They celebrated the <b>birth</b> of their first child.</i>
<b>book of genesis</b>	Physical objects consisting of a number of pages bound together.
<b>coming into being</b>	The act of drawing spatially closer to something.
<b><u>commencement</u></b>	The act of starting something. <i>The <b>commencement</b> of the trial.</i>
<b>creation</b>	Everything created; the universe. <i>Job <b>creation</b>.</i>
<b>development</b>	The section of a composition or movement (especially in sonata form) where the major musical themes are developed and elaborated. <i>The paintings provide evidence of his artistic <b>development</b>.</i>
<b><u>emergence</u></b>	The gradual beginning or coming forth. <i>The parasite s eggs hatch synchronously with the <b>emergence</b> of the wasp larvae.</i>
<b>evolution</b>	Biology the sequence of events involved in the evolutionary development of a species or taxonomic group of organisms. <i>Flocks of waders often perform aerial <b>evolutions</b>.</i>
<b>formation</b>	A thing that has been formed. <i>The <b>formation</b> of pseudopods.</i>
<b><u>formulation</u></b>	The action of creating or preparing something. <i>Compare this complex <b>formulation</b> with Bosch s much more simplistic analysis.</i>
<b><u>generation</u></b>	The normal time between successive generations. <i>They had to wait a <b>generation</b> for that prejudice to fade.</i>
<b><u>inception</u></b>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its <b>inception</b> two years ago.</i>
<b><u>invention</u></b>	The act of inventing. <i>The <b>invention</b> of printing in the 15th century.</i>
<b><u>origin</u></b>	The more fixed end or attachment of a muscle. <i>A voice that betrays his Welsh <b>origins</b>.</i>
<b><u>origination</u></b>	An event that is a beginning; a first part or stage of subsequent events. <i>There are a number of theories on the <b>origination</b> of the name.</i>

<b>outset</b>	The start or beginning of something. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the <b>outset</b> and learned on the job.</i>
<b>propagation</b>	Transmission of motion, light, sound, etc. in a particular direction or through a medium. <i>Hunting regulations ensure the <b>propagation</b> of the species.</i>
<b>root</b>	Any plant grown for its root. <i><b>Roots</b> like beet and carrot cannot be transplanted.</i>
<b>shaping</b>	The spatial arrangement of something as distinct from its substance.
<b>source</b>	A person who supplies information. <i>Pittsburgh is the <b>source</b> of the Ohio River.</i>
<b>start</b>	A line indicating the location of the start of a race or a game. <i>The <b>starting</b> signal was a green light.</i>

<b><u>advent</u></b>	Arrival that has been awaited (especially of something momentous). <i>The <b>advent</b> of television.</i>
<b>begin</b>	Begin to speak understand read and write a language. <i>My property <b>begins</b> with the three maple trees.</i>
<b>beginning</b>	The first part or earliest stage of something. <i>She had the <b>beginnings</b> of a headache.</i>
<b><u>biblical</u></b>	In keeping with the nature of the Bible or its times or people. <i><b>Biblical</b> Hebrew.</i>
<b>coming</b>	The temporal property of becoming nearer in time. <i>This <b>coming</b> Thursday.</i>
<b><u>commence</u></b>	Get off the ground. <i>A public inquiry is due to <b>commence</b> on the 16th.</i>

<b><u>commencement</u></b>	A ceremony in which degrees or diplomas are conferred on university or high-school students. <i>A <b>commencement</b> address.</i>
<b>creation</b>	The action or process of bringing something into existence. <i>From its <b>creation</b> the plan was doomed to failure.</i>
<b><u>emanate</u></b>	Originate from; be produced by. <i>He <b>emanated</b> a powerful brooding air.</i>
<b><u>emergence</u></b>	The process of becoming visible after being concealed. <i>Figurines presage the <b>emergence</b> of sculpture in Greece.</i>
<b>first</b>	The first or highest in an ordering or series. <i>The <b>first</b> violin section.</i>
<b>germinal</b>	Containing seeds of later development. <i>De Beauvoir's <b>germinal</b> book <i>The Second Sex</i>.</i>
<b><u>groundbreaking</u></b>	Innovative; pioneering. <i><b>Groundbreaking</b> research into fertility problems.</i>
<b>inaugural</b>	An address delivered at an inaugural ceremony especially by a United States president. <i>President Clinton's <b>inaugural</b>.</i>
<b><u>inception</u></b>	The establishment or starting point of an institution or activity. <i>She has been on the board since its <b>inception</b> two years ago.</i>
<b>inchoative</b>	An inchoative verb. <i><b>Inchoative</b> stages.</i>
<b><u>incipient</u></b>	Only partly in existence; imperfectly formed. <i>We seemed more like friends than <b>incipient</b> lovers.</i>
<b>initial</b>	Mark with one's initials. <i>Greece and the United States <b>initialled</b> a new defence cooperation agreement.</i>
<b>initially</b>	At first. <i><b>Initially</b> he thought the new concept was nonsense.</i>
<b>initiate</b>	A person who has been initiated into an organization or activity. <i>They were <b>initiated</b> into the mysteries of mathematics.</i>
<b><u>initiative</u></b>	The power or opportunity to act or take charge before others do. <i>A new <b>initiative</b> against car crime.</i>
<b>mount</b>	A mounting consisting of a piece of metal as in a ring or other jewelry that holds a gem in place. <i>She was <b>mounted</b> on a white horse.</i>

<b>occur</b>	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>Radon <b>occurs</b> naturally in rocks such as granite.</i>
<u><a href="#">origin</a></u>	A fixed point from which coordinates are measured. <i>Jupiter was the <b>origin</b> of the radiation.</i>
<u><a href="#">originally</a></u>	In an original manner. <i>Potatoes <b>originally</b> came from South America.</i>
<u><a href="#">originate</a></u>	Have a specified beginning. <i>The flight <b>originates</b> in Calcutta.</i>
<b>outset</b>	The time at which something is supposed to begin. <i>A field of which he had known nothing at the <b>outset</b> and learned on the job.</i>
<b>provenance</b>	Where something originated or was nurtured in its early existence. <i>The manuscript has a distinguished <b>provenance</b>.</i>
<b>source</b>	Obtain from a particular source. <i>A heat <b>source</b>.</i>
<b>start</b>	Play in the starting lineup. <i>He awoke with a <b>start</b>.</i>
