<b>forbearing</b>	Patient and restrained. <i>Seemly and <b>forbearing</b> yet strong enough to resist aggression.</i>
<b>forgiving</b>	Ready and willing to forgive. <i>A <b>forgiving</b> embrace to the naughty child.</i>

<b>pleasant</b>	(of a person or their manner) friendly and considerate; likeable. <i><b>Pleasant</b> sensations.</i>
<b>slight</b>	Small in quantity or degree; not much or almost none or (with `a') at least some. <i><b>Slight</b> evidence.</i>

<b><u>meek</u></b>	Evidencing little spirit or courage; overly submissive or compliant- Orville Prescott. <i><b>Meek</b> and self effacing.</i>
<b>merciful</b>	Gracious (used conventionally of royalty and high nobility). <i>Sought <b>merciful</b> treatment for the captives.</i>
<b><u>mild</u></b>	Humble in spirit or manner suggesting retiring mildness or even cowed submissiveness. <i>A <b>mild</b> winter storm.</i>
<b>mottle</b>	A spot or patch forming part of a mottled arrangement. <i>It was not dull grey as distance had suggested but a <b>mottle</b> of khaki and black and olive green.</i>
