cadaverous	Very pale, thin, or bony. <i>He was gaunt and cadaverous.</i>
chalky	Of something having the color of chalk. <i>She turned chalky white.</i>
charnel	Associated with death. <i>I gagged on the charnel stench of the place.</i>
colourless	(especially of a gas or liquid) without colour. <i>Colourless nail varnish.</i>
<u>dire</u>	Fraught with extreme danger; nearly hopeless. <i>He was in dire need of help.</i>
<u>disagreeable</u>	Unfriendly and bad-tempered. <i>Henry was always a very disagreeable boy.</i>
displeasing	Causing displeasure or lacking pleasing qualities. <i>It was not entirely displeasing to be the centre of such a drama.</i>
distasteful	Causing dislike or aversion; disagreeable or unpleasant. <i>He found such cynicism distasteful.</i>
<u>drained</u>	Drained of electric charge discharged. <i>Left the lights on and came back to find the battery drained.</i>
<u>dreadful</u>	Extremely disagreeable and unpleasant. <i>This was all a dreadful mistake.</i>
frightful	Extreme in degree or extent or amount or impact. <i>A frightful crime of decapitation.</i>
ghostlike	Resembling or characteristic of a phantom.
<u>grave</u>	Of great gravity or crucial import; requiring serious thought. <i>A grave God fearing man.</i>
green	Of a ski run of the lowest level of difficulty as indicated by green markers on the run. <i>Are you all right You look absolutely green.</i>
grey	Used to signify the Confederate forces in the American Civil War who wore grey uniforms. <i>His hair was grey and wispy.</i>
grievous	Causing or marked by grief or anguish. <i>The American fleet suffered grievous losses.</i>
<u>grim</u>	Harshly uninviting or formidable in manner or appearance. <i>His grim expression.</i>
grisly	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>The town was shaken by a series of grisly crimes.</i>

gruesome	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>The most gruesome murder.</i>
horrible	Very unpleasant. <i>War is beyond all words horrible.</i>
ill	Suffering from an illness or disease or feeling unwell. <i>Ill from the monotony of his suffering.</i>
macabre	Disturbing because concerned with or causing a fear of death. <i>Macabre tales of war and plague in the Middle ages.</i>
objectionable	Arousing distaste or opposition; unpleasant or offensive. <i>I find his theory objectionable in its racist undertones.</i>
obnoxious	Extremely unpleasant. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
off-putting	Causing annoyance or repugnance.
offensive	Morally offensive. <i>The allegations made are deeply offensive to us.</i>
pale	Not full or rich. <i>She looked pale and drawn.</i>
pallid	Lacking in intensity or brightness; dim or feeble. <i>A pallid sky.</i>
pasty	Having the sticky properties of an adhesive. <i>He looked pasty and red eyed.</i>
peakish	Somewhat peaked or pointed; characterized by peaks.
peaky	Pale from illness or fatigue; sickly. <i>Absence of peaky highs and beefed up bass.</i>
pinched	Sounding as if the nose were pinched. <i>Her pinched sallow face.</i>
sallow	Unhealthy looking. <i>Sallow faced addicts.</i>
sepulchral	Relating to a tomb or interment. <i>The sepulchral darkness of the catacombs.</i>
serious	Appealing to the mind. <i>A serious student of history.</i>
severe	Severely simple. <i>A hefty six footer with a rather severe mien.</i>
sick	Having a strong distaste from surfeit. <i>He looked pretty sick at that but he eventually agreed.</i>

sickly	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>The walls were painted a sickly green.</i>
spectral	Of or like a ghost. <i>Spectral emanations.</i>
terrible	Causing or likely to cause terror; sinister. <i>I was terrible at basketball.</i>
unacceptable	Used of persons or their behavior. <i>The coach told his players that defeat was unacceptable.</i>
undesirable	Not wanted. <i>The drug s undesirable side effects.</i>
unpleasant	(of a person or their manner) unfriendly and inconsiderate; rude. <i>An unpleasant smell.</i>
unwell	Ill. <i>Is unwell and can t come to work.</i>
very bad	Being the exact same one; not any other.
wan	(of light) pale; weak. <i>She was looking wan and bleary eyed.</i>
waxen	Having the paleness of wax- Bram Stoker. <i>The poor face with the same awful waxen pallor.</i>
waxy	Capable of being bent or flexed or twisted without breaking. <i>A thin face with a waxy paleness.</i>
white	Of wine made from white grapes or dark grapes with the skins removed and having a yellowish colour. <i>A white hot center of the fire.</i>
whitish	Resembling milk in color; not clear.

<u>gruesome</u>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>Gruesome catering.</i>
<u>hellish</u>	Extremely (used for emphasis). <i>Hellish weather.</i>
hideous	Extremely unpleasant. <i>Hideous lizard like creatures.</i>
horrible	Provoking horror. <i>War is beyond all words horrible.</i>
<u>horrific</u>	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>Horrific conditions in the mining industry.</i>

horrifying	Causing horror; extremely shocking. <i>A horrifying incident.</i>
infernal	Characteristic of or resembling Hell. <i>His roar made the infernals quake.</i>
macabre	Disturbing because concerned with or causing a fear of death. <i>Macabre tortures conceived by madmen.</i>
monster	(medicine) a grossly malformed and usually nonviable fetus. <i>A monster with the head of a hyena and hindquarters of a wolf.</i>
monstrosity	A thing, especially a building, which is very large and unsightly. <i>They regarded the atom bomb as a monstrosity.</i>
sadly	In a sad manner. <i>Sadly he died before he could see his grandchild.</i>
scary	Frightening; causing fear. <i>It was scary the way they bonded with each other.</i>
sepulchral	Gruesomely indicative of death or the dead. <i>Hollow sepulchral tones.</i>
spooky	Easily frightened; nervous. <i>Some horses are more spooky by nature than others.</i>
terrible	Very unwell or troubled. <i>I was terrible at basketball.</i>
unlovely	Not attractive; ugly. <i>Unlovely tower blocks.</i>
unsightly	Unpleasant to look at. <i>An unsightly rubbish tip.</i>
