*An **expansive** lifestyle.*
- extensive** Broad in scope or content.

## Associations of "Gigantic" (30 Words)

<b><u>behemoth</u></b>	Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful. <i>Shoppers are now more loyal to their local shops than to faceless <b>behemoths</b>.</i>
<b>boulder</b>	A large rock, typically one that has been worn smooth by erosion.
<b>colossal</b>	Extremely large or great. <i><b>Colossal</b> crumbling ruins of an ancient temple.</i>
<b>colossus</b>	A statue that is much bigger than life size. <i>The Russian Empire was the <b>colossus</b> of European politics.</i>
<b>craggy</b>	(of a landscape) having many crags. <i>A <b>craggy</b> coastline.</i>
<b>disservice</b>	A harmful action. <i>You have done a <b>disservice</b> to the African people by ignoring this fact.</i>
<b>elephantine</b>	Of, resembling, or characteristic of an elephant or elephants, especially in being large, clumsy, or awkward. <i>There was an <b>elephantine</b> thud from the bathroom.</i>

<b>enormous</b>	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>An <b>enormous</b> boulder.</i>
<b>gargantuan</b>	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>A <b>gargantuan</b> appetite.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g. giant hogweed, giant tortoise. <i><b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.</i>
<b>hilly</b>	Having many hills. <i><b>Hilly</b> terrain.</i>
<b>huge</b>	Extremely large; enormous. <i>While he may be unknown in the American mainstream, he is <b>huge</b> in Britain.</i>
<b>hulking</b>	Of great size and bulk. <i>Three <b>hulking</b> battleships.</i>
<b>immense</b>	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i><b>Immense</b> numbers of birds.</i>
<b>large</b>	Fairly large or important in effect/influential. <i>The concert attracted <b>large</b> crowds.</i>
<b>largeness</b>	The property of having a relatively great size. <i>A man distinguished by the <b>largeness</b> and scope of his views.</i>
<b>leviathan</b>	Monstrous sea creature symbolizing evil in the Old Testament. <i>It is a challenge to navigate a wheeled <b>leviathan</b> in rush hour traffic.</i>
<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A <b>mammoth</b> corporation.</i>
<b>massive</b>	(of a mineral) not visibly crystalline. <i><b>Massive</b> oak doors.</i>
<b>monolith</b>	A single great stone (often in the form of a column or obelisk). <i>We passed Stonehenge, the strange stone <b>monoliths</b> silhouetted against the horizon.</i>
<b>monolithic</b>	Imposing in size or bulk or solidity. <i>IPC moved the paper from Covent Garden to the <b>monolithic</b> King's Reach Tower.</i>
<b>monster</b>	(medicine) a grossly malformed and usually nonviable fetus. <i>This is a <b>monster</b> of a book, almost 500 pages.</i>
<b>monstrosity</b>	A thing which is outrageously evil or wrong. <i>Had my tone of reason in the face of <b>monstrosity</b> finally registered.</i>

- monstrous** Extraordinarily and dauntingly large.  
*Twisted into **monstrous** shapes.*
- mountainous** (of a region) having many mountains.  
***Mountainous** waves.*
- ogre** (folklore) a giant who likes to eat human beings.  
*It is clear that I am no **ogre**.*
- oversized** Bigger than the usual size.  
*An **oversized** T shirt.*
- titanic** Of great force or power.  
*A series of **titanic** explosions.*
- tremendous** Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree.  
*A plane took off with a **tremendous** noise.*
- troll** A fisherman's lure that is used in trolling.  
*All tongues shall **troll** you.*
