broad	Broad in scope or content. <i>A broad expanse of paddy fields.</i>
enormous	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. <i>An enormous boulder.</i>
<u>expansive</u>	Marked by exaggerated feelings of euphoria and delusions of grandeur. <i>An expansive lifestyle.</i>
extensive	Broad in scope or content. <i>An extensive garden.</i>
huge	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>A huge wave.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth ship.</i>
vast	Of very great extent or quantity; immense. <i>The vast reaches of outer space.</i>
<u>wide</u>	Having ample fabric. <i>Tax revenues have undershot Treasury projections by a wide margin.</i>

Associations of "Gigantic" (30 Words)

<u>behemoth</u>	Someone or something that is abnormally large and powerful. <i>Shoppers are now more loyal to their local shops than to faceless behemoths.</i>
boulder	A large rock, typically one that has been worn smooth by erosion.
colossal	Extremely large or great. <i>Colossal crumbling ruins of an ancient temple.</i>
colossus	A statue that is much bigger than life size. <i>The Russian Empire was the colossus of European politics.</i>
craggy	(of a landscape) having many crags. <i>A craggy coastline.</i>
disservice	A harmful action. <i>You have done a disservice to the African people by ignoring this fact.</i>
elephantine	Of, resembling, or characteristic of an elephant or elephants, especially in being large, clumsy, or awkward. <i>There was an elephantine thud from the bathroom.</i>

enormous	Very large in size, quantity, or extent. <i>An enormous boulder.</i>
gargantuan	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>A gargantuan appetite.</i>
giant	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Giant multinational corporations.</i>
hilly	Having many hills. <i>Hilly terrain.</i>
huge	Extremely large; enormous. <i>While he may be unknown in the American mainstream he s huge in Britain.</i>
hulking	Of great size and bulk. <i>Three hulking battleships.</i>
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>Immense numbers of birds.</i>
large	Fairly large or important in effect influential. <i>The concert attracted large crowds.</i>
largeness	The property of having a relatively great size. <i>A man distinguished by the largeness and scope of his views.</i>
leviathan	Monstrous sea creature symbolizing evil in the Old Testament. <i>It s a challenge to navigate a wheeled leviathan in rush hour traffic.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth corporation.</i>
massive	(of a mineral) not visibly crystalline. <i>Massive oak doors.</i>
monolith	A single great stone (often in the form of a column or obelisk). <i>We passed Stonehenge the strange stone monoliths silhouetted against the horizon.</i>
<u>monolithic</u>	Imposing in size or bulk or solidity. <i>IPC moved the paper from Covent Garden to the monolithic King s Reach Tower.</i>
monster	(medicine) a grossly malformed and usually nonviable fetus. <i>This is a monster of a book almost 500 pages.</i>
<u>monstrosity</u>	A thing which is outrageously evil or wrong. <i>Had my tone of reason in the face of monstrosity finally registered.</i>

monstrous	Extraordinarily and dauntingly large. <i>Twisted into monstrous shapes.</i>
mountainous	(of a region) having many mountains. <i>Mountainous waves.</i>
ogre	(folklore) a giant who likes to eat human beings. <i>It is clear that I am no ogre.</i>
oversized	Bigger than the usual size. <i>An oversized T shirt.</i>
titanic	Of great force or power. <i>A series of titanic explosions.</i>
<u>tremendous</u>	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. <i>A plane took off with a tremendous noise.</i>
<u>troll</u>	A fisherman's lure that is used in trolling. <i>All tongues shall troll you.</i>
