amortization	Payment of an obligation in a series of installments or transfers. <i>An amortization schedule shows your payments each month and how it affects the total amount you owe.</i>
ascend	(of a road or flight of steps) slope or lead up. <i>We had ascended 3 000 ft.</i>
ascent	An upward slope or path that one may walk or climb. <i>The first balloon ascent was in 1783.</i>
assistance	A person or thing that is a resource that helps make something easier or possible to do. <i>The work was completed with the assistance of carpenters.</i>
augmentation	The action or process of making or becoming greater in size or amount. <i>The augmentation of the curriculum with new subjects.</i>
bestow	Bestow a quality on. <i>Bestow an honor on someone.</i>
boost	Give a boost to be beneficial to. <i>The singer had to be boosted onto the stage by a special contraption.</i>
certificate	Authorize by certificate. <i>A share certificate.</i>
compensate	Make payment to compensate. <i>She was compensated for the loss of her arm in the accident.</i>
elevate	Raise in rank or condition. <i>The exercise will naturally elevate your chest and head.</i>
ennoble	Give (someone) a noble rank or title. <i>They receive life baronies on appointment unless they are already ennobled.</i>
escalator	A stairway whose steps move continuously on a circulating belt.

exalt	Heighten or intensify. <i>The party will continue to exalt their hero.</i>
grant	A right or privilege that has been granted. <i>Grant a degree.</i>
heave	(geology) a horizontal dislocation. <i>His shoulders heaved as he panted.</i>
<u>hoist</u>	Move from one place to another by lifting. <i>A white flag was hoisted.</i>
increase	The amount by which something increases. <i>The increase in unemployment.</i>
increment	A regular increase in salary on an incremental scale. <i>Your first increment will be payable six months from your date of commencement.</i>
<u>inflation</u>	The act of filling something with air. <i>The inflation of a balloon.</i>
lift	A wave that lifts the surface of the water or ground. <i>He lifted her down from the pony's back.</i>
mounting	The action of mounting something. <i>He pulled the curtain rail from its mounting.</i>
<u>precipitate</u>	A substance precipitated from a solution. <i>Vesuvius precipitated its fiery destructive rage on Herculaneum.</i>
price	Attach price labels or tickets to an item for sale. <i>The watches are priced at 55.</i>
raise	Raise in rank or condition. <i>Raise a siege.</i>
<u>soar</u>	The act of rising upward into the air. <i>The bird spread its wings and soared into the air.</i>
<u>underpin</u>	Support with evidence or authority or make more certain or confirm. <i>The theme of honour underpinning the two books.</i>
<u>up</u>	Used as a command to a soldier or an animal to stand up and be ready to move or attack. <i>Up the ante.</i>
<u>upgrade</u>	The property possessed by a slope or surface that rises. <i>I've upgraded my computer so I can run better software.</i>
<u>upsurge</u>	An upward surge in the strength or quantity of something; an increase. <i>An upsurge in vandalism and violent crime.</i>
