
According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "give" as a noun can have the following definitions:

allot	Administer or bestow, as in small portions. <i>Equal time was allotted to each.</i>
amortization	The action or process of reducing or paying off a debt with regular payments. An amortization schedule shows your payments each month and how it affects the total amount you owe.
apportion	Assign. Voting power will be apportion ed according to contribution.
appropriation	Money set aside (as by a legislature) for a specific purpose. Success in obtaining appropriation s for projects.



assign	Give an assignment to a person to a post or assign a task to a person. The biologist assign ed the mushroom to the proper class.

dispense	Manage without or get rid of. I was dispense d from this terrible task.
distribute	Cause be distributed. The function distribute s the values evenly.
<u>forgo</u>	Be earlier in time; go back further. We forgo any comparison between the two men.
generously	In a way that shows a readiness to give more of something, especially money, than is necessary or expected. <i>Generously</i> butter a pudding dish.
grant	A contract granting the right to operate a subsidiary business. Funds are grant ed to qualified researchers.
gratuity	A sum of money paid to an employee at the end of a period of employment. An end of contract gratuity of 20 of the total pay received.
<u>impart</u>	Make (information) known. The teachers impart ed a great deal of knowledge to their pupils.
meed	A fitting reward. He must extract from her some meed of approbation.



A prescribed number. The removal of entry quota s encouraged young people to enter universities.
Allocate or distribute (work or resources) differently. <i>He had been reassigned to another post.</i>
Pay (someone) for services rendered or work done. They should be remunerate d fairly for their work.
Something that remunerates. They work in excess of their contracted hours for no additional remuneration .
Pay a salary to. A 15 per cent salary increase.
Accept or yield to a superior force or to the authority or will of another person. The United States refused to submit to arbitration.
Bringing little or no profit or income. An unremunerative occupation.
Carry on (a war or campaign. Disasters are the wage s of sin.
Give in, as to influence or pressure. They are forced to yield ground.
