<b><u>please</u></b>	Satisfy aesthetically. <i>Instead of attending the meeting it <b>pleased</b> him to go off hunting.</i>

heartening	Cheerfully encouraging. <i>This is the most <b>heartening</b> news of all.</i>
<u>joyful</u>	Full of or producing joy. <i><b>Joyful</b> music.</i>
like a child with a new toy	Conforming in every respect.
like a dog with two tails	Conforming in every respect.
more than willing	A quantifier meaning greater in size or amount or extent or degree.
<u>overjoyed</u>	Extremely joyful. <i>All of them were <b>overjoyed</b> at my success.</i>
<u>pleased</u>	Proud of one's achievements, especially excessively so; self-satisfied. <i>We will be <b>pleased</b> to provide an independent appraisal.</i>
pleasing	Giving pleasure and satisfaction. <i>The <b>pleasing</b> austerity of the surroundings.</i>
<u>thrilled</u>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
welcome	Allowed or invited to do a specified thing. <i>You are <b>welcome</b> to join us.</i>
well pleased	Resulting favorably.

<b>enjoyable</b>	(of an activity or occasion) giving delight or pleasure. <i>The company was <b>enjoyable</b>.</i>
<b>enraptured</b>	Feeling great rapture or delight.
<b>euphoria</b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exult</b>	To express great joy. <i>Who cannot <b>exult</b> in Spring.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>festal</b>	Relating to or characteristic of a celebration or festival. <i>Plum pudding was originally served on <b>festal</b> days as a main course.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	Emotions experienced when in a state of well-being. <i>She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Feeling or showing pleasure or contentment. <i>He was not <b>happy</b> about the proposals.</i>



<b><u>hilarious</u></b>	Boisterously merry. <i>The meal was noisy and <b>hilarious</b>.</i>
<b><u>jolly</u></b>	To certain extent or degree. <i>They were trying to <b>jolly</b> her out of her torpor.</i>
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>You ll get no <b>joy</b> out of her.</i>
<b><u>joyful</u></b>	Feeling, expressing, or causing great pleasure and happiness. <i><b>Joyful</b> music.</i>
<b><u>joyous</u></b>	Full of or characterized by joy. <i><b>Joyous</b> laughter.</i>
<b>jubilant</b>	Feeling or expressing great happiness and triumph. <i>A large number of <b>jubilant</b> fans ran on to the pitch.</i>
<b>laughing</b>	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i><b>Laughing</b> children.</i>
<b><u>merry</u></b>	Slightly and good-humouredly drunk. <i>Peals of <b>merry</b> laughter.</i>
<b><u>pleased</u></b>	Experiencing or manifesting pleasure. <i>As he led the way he looked very <b>pleased</b> with himself.</i>
<b>rapt</b>	Filled with an intense and pleasurable emotion enraptured. <i>She shut her eyes and seemed <b>rapt</b> with desire.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	A state of elated bliss. <i>The tabloids went into <b>raptures</b> about her.</i>
<b>rejoice</b>	Be ecstatic with joy. <i>The guard <b>rejoiced</b> in the name of Blossom.</i>
