Synonyms of "Gladly" as an adverb (4 Words)

cheerfully In a way that inspires feelings of happiness.
*He **cheerfully** admits to being the wrong side of fifty.*

fain Gladly.
*I would **fain** do it.*

happily In an unexpectedly lucky way.
*They shouted **happily**.*

lief In a willing manner.
*He would just as **lief** eat a pincushion.*

Usage Examples of "Gladly" as an adverb

- *This was gladly agreed to.*
- *She offered me a lift and I gladly accepted.*
- *I would have gladly paid for it.*

Associations of "Gladly" (30 Words)

act	Be engaged in an activity often for no particular purpose other than pleasure. <i>The governor should act on the new energy bill.</i>
amenable	Capable of being acted upon in a particular way; susceptible. <i>An amenable hospitalization should not result in untimely death.</i>
apt	Mentally quick and resourceful. <i>She proved an apt pupil.</i>
cheerfully	In a cheerful way. <i>He cheerfully admits to being the wrong side of fifty.</i>
compliant	Disposed to agree with others or obey rules, especially to an excessive degree; acquiescent. <i>A compliant labour force.</i>
deservedly	In the way that is deserved; rightfully. <i>A deservedly popular sitcom.</i>
disposed	Usually followed by to naturally disposed toward. <i>He is favourably disposed towards the proposals.</i>
fain	Gladly. <i>He was fain to acknowledge that the agreement was sacrosanct.</i>
given	(of a document) signed and dated. <i>She was not often given to anger.</i>
greet	Express greetings upon meeting someone. <i>Sam threw open the door and was greeted by a cacophony of noise.</i>
happily	In a joyous manner. <i>Happily today s situation is very different.</i>
inclined	At an angle to the horizontal or vertical position. <i>Wasn t inclined to believe the excuse.</i>
likely	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Speculation on the likely effect of opting out.</i>
luckily	It is fortunate that. <i>Luckily for me it s worked out.</i>
minded	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. <i>Conservation minded citizens.</i>
obedient	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>The obedient colonies are heavily taxed the refractory remain unburdened.</i>

<u>obey</u>	Submit to the authority of (someone) or comply with (a law). <i>I always obey my father.</i>
partiality	A predisposition to like something. <i>An attack on the partiality of judges.</i>
participation	The act of sharing in the activities of a group. <i>Participation in chapel activities.</i>
prepared	Equipped or prepared with necessary intellectual resources. <i>He paints over the prepared canvas with brown acrylic to bring out the cracks.</i>
<u>prone</u>	Likely or liable to suffer from, do, or experience something unpleasant or regrettable. <i>A child prone to mischief.</i>
ready	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>I got ready for bed.</i>
<u>reliance</u>	Dependence on or trust in someone or something. <i>He wrote the paper with considerable reliance on the work of other scientists.</i>
<u>susceptible</u>	Capable or admitting of. <i>Susceptible of proof.</i>
<u>thankfully</u>	In a thankful manner. <i>He accepted thankfully my apologies.</i>
<u>tractable</u>	(of a person) easy to control or influence. <i>Trying to make the mathematics tractable.</i>
volitional	Relating to the use of one's will. <i>Acceptance is a volitional act.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	Done, given, or acting of one's own free will. <i>A voluntary helper.</i>
<u>willing</u>	Given or done readily. <i>A willing participant.</i>
<u>willingly</u>	In a willing manner. <i>She went willingly.</i>
