## Synonyms of "Gladly" as an adverb (4 Words)

**cheerfully** In a way that inspires feelings of happiness.  
*He **cheerfully** admits to being the wrong side of fifty.*

**fain** Gladly.  
*I would **fain** do it.*

**happily** In an unexpectedly lucky way.  
*They shouted **happily**.*

**lief** In a willing manner.  
*He would just as **lief** eat a pincushion.*

## Usage Examples of "Gladly" as an adverb

- *This was gladly agreed to.*
- *She offered me a lift and I gladly accepted.*
- *I would have gladly paid for it.*

## Associations of "Gladly" (30 Words)

<b>act</b>	Be engaged in an activity often for no particular purpose other than pleasure. <i>The governor should <b>act</b> on the new energy bill.</i>
<b>amenable</b>	Capable of being acted upon in a particular way; susceptible. <i>An <b>amenable</b> hospitalization should not result in untimely death.</i>
<b>apt</b>	Mentally quick and resourceful. <i>She proved an <b>apt</b> pupil.</i>
<b>cheerfully</b>	In a cheerful way. <i>He <b>cheerfully</b> admits to being the wrong side of fifty.</i>
<b>compliant</b>	Disposed to agree with others or obey rules, especially to an excessive degree; acquiescent. <i>A <b>compliant</b> labour force.</i>
<b>deservedly</b>	In the way that is deserved; rightfully. <i>A <b>deservedly</b> popular sitcom.</i>
<b>disposed</b>	Usually followed by to naturally disposed toward. <i>He is favourably <b>disposed</b> towards the proposals.</i>
<b>fain</b>	Gladly. <i>He was <b>fain</b> to acknowledge that the agreement was sacrosanct.</i>
<b>given</b>	(of a document) signed and dated. <i>She was not often <b>given</b> to anger.</i>
<b>greet</b>	Express greetings upon meeting someone. <i>Sam threw open the door and was <b>greeted</b> by a cacophony of noise.</i>
<b>happily</b>	In a joyous manner. <i><b>Happily</b> today s situation is very different.</i>
<b>inclined</b>	At an angle to the horizontal or vertical position. <i>Wasn t <b>inclined</b> to believe the excuse.</i>
<b>likely</b>	Likely but not certain to be or become true or real. <i>Speculation on the <b>likely</b> effect of opting out.</i>
<b>luckily</b>	It is fortunate that. <i><b>Luckily</b> for me it s worked out.</i>
<b>minded</b>	(usually followed by `to') naturally disposed toward. <i>Conservation <b>minded</b> citizens.</i>
<b>obedient</b>	Dutifully complying with the commands or instructions of those in authority. <i>The <b>obedient</b> colonies are heavily taxed the refractory remain unburdened.</i>

<u>obey</u>	Submit to the authority of (someone) or comply with (a law). <i>I always <b>obey</b> my father.</i>
<b>partiality</b>	A predisposition to like something. <i>An attack on the <b>partiality</b> of judges.</i>
<b>participation</b>	The act of sharing in the activities of a group. <i><b>Participation</b> in chapel activities.</i>
<b>prepared</b>	Equipped or prepared with necessary intellectual resources. <i>He paints over the <b>prepared</b> canvas with brown acrylic to bring out the cracks.</i>
<u>prone</u>	Likely or liable to suffer from, do, or experience something unpleasant or regrettable. <i>A child <b>prone</b> to mischief.</i>
<b>ready</b>	Make ready or suitable or equip in advance for a particular purpose or for some use event etc. <i>I got <b>ready</b> for bed.</i>
<u>reliance</u>	Dependence on or trust in someone or something. <i>He wrote the paper with considerable <b>reliance</b> on the work of other scientists.</i>
<u>susceptible</u>	Capable or admitting of. <i><b>Susceptible</b> of proof.</i>
<u>thankfully</u>	In a thankful manner. <i>He accepted <b>thankfully</b> my apologies.</i>
<u>tractable</u>	(of a person) easy to control or influence. <i>Trying to make the mathematics <b>tractable</b>.</i>
<b>volitional</b>	Relating to the use of one's will. <i>Acceptance is a <b>volitional</b> act.</i>
<u>voluntary</u>	Done, given, or acting of one's own free will. <i>A <b>voluntary</b> helper.</i>
<u>willing</u>	Given or done readily. <i>A <b>willing</b> participant.</i>
<u>willingly</u>	In a willing manner. <i>She went <b>willingly</b>.</i>
