Definitions of "Glean" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “glean” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Gather (leftover grain) after a harvest.*
- *Collect gradually.*
- *Obtain (information) from various sources, often with difficulty.*
- *Gather, as of natural products.*

derive Come from; be connected by a relationship of blood, for example.
*The present name **derives** from an older form.*

draw Represent by making a drawing of as with a pencil chalk etc on a surface.
*The session was **drawn** to a close.*

extract Extract by the process of distillation.
*Early computers had an instruction to **extract** a square root.*

garner Assemble or get together.
*The police struggled to **garner** sufficient evidence.*

gather Collect or gather.
*She lay **gathering** her thoughts together.*

gather in Collect or gather.

get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Let s get you home.</i>
harvest	Gather a crop as a harvest. <i>The research teams are leading the way in identifying new ways of harvesting the sun s energy.</i>
obtain	Receive a specified treatment (abstract). <i>Adequate insurance cover is difficult to obtain.</i>
reap	Get or derive. <i>In terms of science the Apollo programme reaped a meagre harvest.</i>
take	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes. <i>Everything you say he takes it the wrong way.</i>
take in	Take into consideration for exemplifying purposes.



Usage Examples of "Glean" as a verb

- *The conditions of farm workers in the 1890s made gleaning essential.*
- *The information is gleaned from press cuttings.*

- *Objects gleaned from local markets.*



Associations of "Glean" (30 Words)

acquire	Gain knowledge or skills. <i>He acquired a reputation for scrupulous honesty.</i>
acquired	Gotten through environmental forces. <i>Acquired characteristics such as a suntan or a broken nose cannot be passed on.</i>
acquirement	Something acquired, typically a skill. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i>
acquisition	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>There were many acquisitions among travel agents.</i>
aggregation	The formation of a number of things into a cluster. <i>A single dose of aspirin irreversibly inhibits the normal aggregation of platelets.</i>
<u>attainable</u>	Capable of being attained or accomplished. <i>An attainable target.</i>

collate	Compare critically; of texts. <i>These accounts he collated with his own experience.</i>
collect	Gather or collect. <i>A small crowd collected at the back door.</i>
cumulate	An igneous rock formed by gravitational settling of particles in a magma. <i>All unpaid dividend payments cumulate and are paid when earnings are sufficient.</i>
derive	Obtain something from (a specified source). <i>The volume fraction of the soil can then be derived as a function of L.</i>
<u>earn</u>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction earn as salary or wages. <i>He earns his living as a lorry driver.</i>
gain	(of a clock or watch) become fast by (a specific amount of time). <i>To gratify the queen and gain the court.</i>
<u>garner</u>	Assemble or get together. <i>The crop was ready to be reaped and garnered.</i>
<u>gather</u>	Collect or gather. <i>She paused to gather her breath and leaned against the wall puffing.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Get the form signed by a doctor.</i>
harvest	Gather a crop as a harvest. <i>After harvesting most of the crop is stored in large buildings.</i>
<u>incur</u>	Make oneself subject to; bring upon oneself; become liable to. <i>I will pay any expenses incurred.</i>
obtain	Come into possession of. <i>The price of silver fell to that obtaining elsewhere in the ancient world.</i>
obtainable	Able to be obtained. <i>Customers financial details are easily obtainable.</i>
procure	Persuade or cause (someone) to do something. <i>He procured his wife to sign the mandate for the joint account.</i>
<u>procurement</u>	The action of obtaining or procuring something. <i>Financial assistance for the procurement of legal advice.</i>
purchase	Something acquired by purchase. <i>She stowed her purchases in the car.</i>
reap	Cut or gather (a crop or harvest). <i>Many men were employed to reap the harvest.</i>
reaper	Someone who helps to gather the harvest.

- regain** Get or find back; recover the use of.
*He soon **regained** his composure.*
- retrieval** The action of obtaining or consulting material stored in a computer system.
*Storage and **retrieval** systems.*
- scythe** Cut with a scythe.
*The first job was to **scythe** paths through the nettles.*
- secure** Financially sound.
*His position as party leader was less than **secure**.*
- wangle** An act or an instance of obtaining something by persuasion or clever manipulation.
*A rather clever **wangle** on the part of some of the folk at the office.*
