Definitions of "Glee" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “glee” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Malicious satisfaction.*
- *A song for men's voices in three or more parts, usually unaccompanied, of a type popular especially c.1750-1830.*
- *Great delight, especially from one's own good fortune or another's misfortune.*
- *Great merriment.*



Synonyms of "Glee" as a noun (21 Words)

- amusement** A feeling of delight at being entertained.
*On the promenade the **amusements** were still open.*
- cheerfulness** The quality of causing happiness.
*Flowers added a note of **cheerfulness** to the drab room.*
- delight** A feeling of extreme pleasure or satisfaction.
*We broke into an impromptu dance to the **delight** of the crowd.*
- elation** A feeling of joy and pride.
*Richard's **elation** at regaining his health was short lived.*
- euphoria** A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation.
*In his **euphoria** he had become convinced he could defeat them.*
- exhilaration** The feeling of lively and cheerful joy.
*They felt the **exhilaration** of victory.*
- gladness** Experiencing joy and pleasure.
- gleefulness** Great merriment.

<u>gloat</u>	An act of gloating. <i>I would join her for a good gloat.</i>
gloating	Malicious satisfaction.
happiness	State of well-being characterized by emotions ranging from contentment to intense joy. <i>Tom's heart swelled with happiness.</i>
hilarity	Extreme amusement, especially when expressed by laughter. <i>By midnight the hilarity had increased.</i>
jocularity	Activity characterized by good humor.
jollity	The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false jollity.</i>
joviality	A jovial nature.
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>Tears of joy.</i>
joyfulness	The emotion of great happiness.
merriment	Gaiety and fun. <i>Her eyes sparkled with merriment.</i>
mirth	Great merriment. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>
mirthfulness	Great merriment.
pleasure	An activity that affords enjoyment. <i>The touch of his fingers gave her such pleasure.</i>

enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The security forces enjoy legal immunity from prosecution.</i>
enjoyable	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was enjoyable.</i>

exultant	Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i>

glad	Willing and eager (to do something). <i>Heard the glad news.</i>
gloat	An act of gloating. <i>His enemies gloated over his death.</i>
happy	Well expressed and to the point. <i>He had the happy knack of making people like him.</i>
hilarity	Great merriment. <i>By midnight the hilarity had increased.</i>
humor	The trait of appreciating and being able to express the humorous. <i>The humors are blood and phlegm and yellow and black bile.</i>
humorous	Causing laughter and amusement; comic. <i>Humorous stories.</i>
humour	The ability to express humour or amuse other people. <i>She was always humouring him to prevent trouble.</i>
jollity	The quality of being cheerful. <i>He was full of false jollity.</i>
jolly	A yawl used by a ship's sailors for general work. <i>The jolly crowd at the reunion.</i>
joviality	Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor.
joy	A thing that causes joy. <i>You ll get no joy out of her.</i>
laugh	A facial expression characteristic of a person laughing. <i>His face wrinkled in a silent laugh of derision.</i>
laughing	Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i>
laughter	The activity of laughing; the manifestation of joy or mirth or scorn. <i>He roared with laughter.</i>
merriment	Gaiety and fun. <i>Her eyes sparkled with merriment.</i>
merry	Cheerful and lively. <i>A merry chase.</i>
mirth	Amusement, especially as expressed in laughter. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>

pleasantry	An agreeable or amusing remark. <i>He laughed at his own pleasantry.</i>
pleasure	Derive enjoyment from. <i>He puts duty before pleasure.</i>
slapstick	Comedy based on deliberately clumsy actions and humorously embarrassing events. <i>Slapstick style of humor.</i>
smile	Express with a smile. <i>He flashed his most winning smile.</i>
taunt	Provoke or challenge (someone) with insulting remarks. <i>Pupils will play truant rather than face the taunts of classmates about their ragged clothes.</i>
