- *Dwell on with satisfaction.*
- *Dwell on one's own success or another's misfortune with smugness or malignant pleasure.*
- *Gaze at or think about something with great self-satisfaction, gratification, or joy.*

crow	Utter shrill sounds. <i>She crowed with joy.</i>
crow over	Express pleasure verbally.
delight in	Take delight in.
enjoy greatly	Derive or receive pleasure from; get enjoyment from; take pleasure in.
exult in	To express great joy.
glory in	Rejoice proudly.
rejoice in	Be ecstatic with joy.
<u>relish</u>	Make pleasant to the taste add relish to. <i>We did not relish the idea of a strike.</i>
revel in	Take delight in.
take great pleasure in	Experience or feel or submit to.
<u>triumph</u>	Be ecstatic with joy. <i>She stopped triumphing over Mrs Ward s failure.</i>
triumph over	Prove superior.

- *His enemies gloated over his death.*

Associations of "Gloat" (30 Words)

<u>arrogant</u>	Having or showing feelings of unwarranted importance out of overbearing pride. <i>Arrogant claims.</i>
arty	Making a strong, affected, or pretentious display of being artistic or interested in the arts. <i>A very arty film.</i>
brash	Self-assertive in a rude, noisy, or overbearing way. <i>He was brash cocky and arrogant.</i>
<u>brat</u>	A small pork sausage. <i>She s been acting like a spoiled brat all evening.</i>
cocksure	Confident in an excessive or arrogant way. <i>An arrogant and cocksure materialist.</i>
conceited	Excessively proud of oneself; vain. <i>A conceited fool.</i>
<u>condescending</u>	(used of behavior or attitude) characteristic of those who treat others with condescension. <i>She thought the teachers were arrogant and condescending.</i>
<u>glee</u>	Malicious satisfaction. <i>His face lit up with impish glee.</i>
<u>haughty</u>	Arrogantly superior and disdainful. <i>Haughty aristocrats.</i>
immodest	Having or showing an exaggerated opinion of your importance, ability, etc. <i>Brash immodest boasting.</i>
imperious	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>His imperious demands.</i>
<u>insolent</u>	Unrestrained by convention or propriety- Los Angeles Times. <i>The modern world with its quick material successes and insolent belief in the boundless possibilities of progress.</i>
insolently	In an insolent manner.

lordly	Of or befitting a lord. <i>They were putting on lordly airs.</i>
mirth	Amusement, especially as expressed in laughter. <i>His six foot frame shook with mirth.</i>
officious	Intrusive in a meddling or offensive manner. <i>Bustling about self importantly making an officious nuisance of himself.</i>
<u>overbearing</u>	Having or showing arrogant superiority to and disdain of those one views as unworthy. <i>An overbearing ill tempered brute.</i>
overweening	Showing excessive confidence or pride. <i>No idea how overweening he would be.</i>
pomposity	The quality of being pompous; self-importance. <i>His reputation for arrogance and pomposity.</i>
poseur	A person who behaves affectedly in order to impress others.
<u>presumptuous</u>	Excessively forward. <i>I hope I won't be considered presumptuous if I offer some advice.</i>
proud	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i>Proud parents.</i>
revenge	Inflict revenge on behalf of someone else. <i>Zimbabwe snatched the game 18 16 but the Spanish had their revenge later.</i>
sneering	Contemptuous or mocking. <i>It will take a concerted effort from many to lay off the sneering and try understanding.</i>
<u>snob</u>	A person regarded as arrogant and annoying. <i>A musical snob.</i>
<u>snobbish</u>	Relating to, characteristic of, or like a snob. <i>The writer takes a rather snobbish tone.</i>
supercilious	Behaving or looking as though one thinks one is superior to others. <i>Curled his lip in a supercilious smile.</i>
superciliousness	The trait of displaying arrogance by patronizing those considered inferior.
taunt	Harass with persistent criticism or carping. <i>You once taunted me taunted me with cowardice because I dared not face the world and conquer it.</i>
vainglorious	Feeling self-importance. <i>This vainglorious boast of personal infallibility.</i>
