Definitions of "Globalization" as a noun

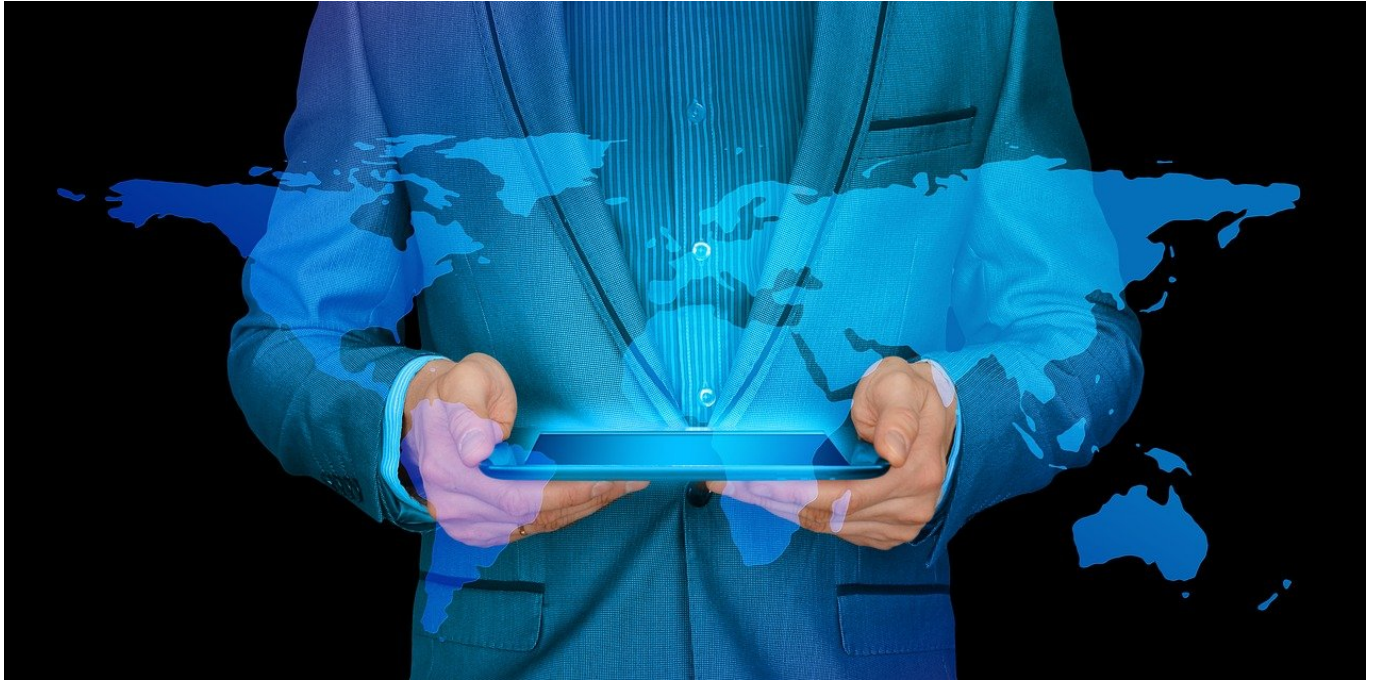
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “globalization” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Growth to a global or worldwide scale.*



Synonyms of "Globalization" as a noun (1 Word)

globalisation Growth to a global or worldwide scale.

Associations of "Globalization" (30 Words)

accelerate

(especially of a vehicle) begin to move more quickly.
*Inflation started to **accelerate**.*

capitalism

An economic and political system in which a country's trade and industry are controlled by private owners for profit, rather than by the state.
*An era of free market **capitalism**.*

city

A town created a city by charter and usually containing a cathedral.
*The **city** raised the tax rate.*

civilization

The stage of human social and cultural development and organization that is considered most advanced.
*The people slowly progressed from barbarism to **civilization**.*

| commercialization | The process of managing or running something principally for financial gain. <i>The government tried to accelerate the commercialization of this development.</i> |
| deregulation | The removal of regulations or restrictions, especially in a particular industry. <i>He fought for deregulation of the telecom industry.</i> |
| english | (sports) the spin given to a ball by striking it on one side or releasing it with a sharp twist. |
| <u>global</u> | Operating or applying through the whole of a file, program, etc. Global war. |
| globalize | Develop or be developed so as to make international influence or operation possible. <i>Building facilities overseas is part of the strategy of every company that aims to globalize.</i> |
| <u>immigration</u> | The action of coming to live permanently in a foreign country. <i>A barrier to control illegal immigration from Mexico.</i> |
| <u>industrialization</u> | The development of industries in a country or region on a wide scale. <i>These developing countries have undergone rapid industrialization.</i> |
| industrialize | (of a country or region) build up a system of industries. <i>The nations of South East Asia will quickly industrialize and catch up with the West.</i> |
| <u>international</u> | Any of several international socialist organizations. International waters. |
| internationally | Throughout the world. <i>The trial attracted attention both locally and internationally.</i> |
| localization | The fact of being or becoming located or fixed in a particular place. <i>Differences in localization of growth control molecules in carcinoma.</i> |
| migration | (chemistry) the nonrandom movement of an atom or radical from one place to another within a molecule. <i>This butterfly's annual migration across North America.</i> |
| modernity | The quality or condition of being modern. <i>A shopping mall would instill a spirit of modernity into this village.</i> |
| modernization | Making modern in appearance or behavior. <i>The industry is undergoing modernization.</i> |
| <u>modernize</u> | Adapt (something) to modern needs or habits, typically by installing modern equipment or adopting modern ideas or methods. <i>He modernized the health service.</i> |

| multinational | Involving or operating in several nations or nationalities. <i>1 500 troops were sent to join the multinational force.</i> |
| nonnative | Not being or composed of aborigines. <i>Our large nonnative population.</i> |
| overseas | From, to, or relating to a foreign country, especially one across the sea. <i>He spent quite a lot of time working overseas.</i> |
| privatization | Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government launched a new round of privatizations.</i> |
| sophisticate | Sophisticated. <i>She ll sophisticate in three languages.</i> |
| transcontinental | A transcontinental railway or train. <i>A transcontinental city.</i> |
| transnational | Extending or operating across national boundaries. <i>Transnational advertising agencies.</i> |
| <u>urbanization</u> | The condition of being urbanized. <i>Public opposition to the urbanization of the countryside.</i> |
| westernization | Assimilation of Western culture; the social process of becoming familiar with or converting to the customs and practices of Western civilization. |
| world | A stage of human life, either mortal or after death. <i>His world was shattered.</i> |
| <u>worldwide</u> | Of worldwide scope or applicability. <i>Worldwide sales of television rights.</i> |
