### **Definitions of "Globalization" as a noun**

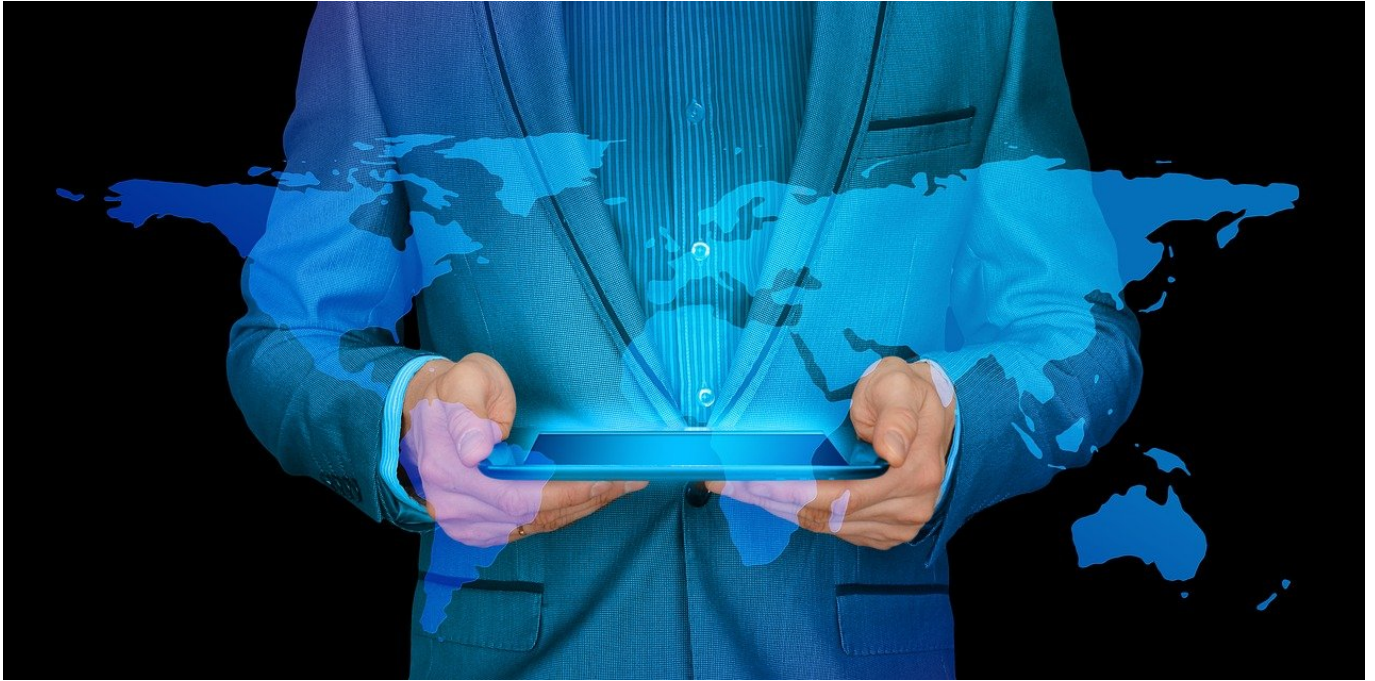
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “globalization” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Growth to a global or worldwide scale.*

**globalisation** Growth to a global or worldwide scale.

## Associations of "Globalization" (30 Words)

### accelerate

(especially of a vehicle) begin to move more quickly.

*Inflation started to **accelerate**.*

### capitalism

An economic and political system in which a country's trade and industry are controlled by private owners for profit, rather than by the state.

*An era of free market **capitalism**.*

### city

A town created a city by charter and usually containing a cathedral.

*The **city** raised the tax rate.*

### civilization

The stage of human social and cultural development and organization that is considered most advanced.

*The people slowly progressed from barbarism to **civilization**.*

<b>commercialization</b>	The process of managing or running something principally for financial gain. <i>The government tried to accelerate the <b>commercialization</b> of this development.</i>
<b>deregulation</b>	The removal of regulations or restrictions, especially in a particular industry. <i>He fought for <b>deregulation</b> of the telecom industry.</i>
<b>english</b>	(sports) the spin given to a ball by striking it on one side or releasing it with a sharp twist.
<b>global</b>	Operating or applying through the whole of a file, program, etc. <b>Global</b> war.
<b>globalize</b>	Develop or be developed so as to make international influence or operation possible. <i>Building facilities overseas is part of the strategy of every company that aims to <b>globalize</b>.</i>
<b>immigration</b>	The action of coming to live permanently in a foreign country. <i>A barrier to control illegal <b>immigration</b> from Mexico.</i>
<b>industrialization</b>	The development of industries in a country or region on a wide scale. <i>These developing countries have undergone rapid <b>industrialization</b>.</i>
<b>industrialize</b>	(of a country or region) build up a system of industries. <i>The nations of South East Asia will quickly <b>industrialize</b> and catch up with the West.</i>
<b>international</b>	Any of several international socialist organizations. <b>International</b> waters.
<b>internationally</b>	Throughout the world. <i>The trial attracted attention both locally and <b>internationally</b>.</i>
<b>localization</b>	The fact of being or becoming located or fixed in a particular place. <i>Differences in <b>localization</b> of growth control molecules in carcinoma.</i>
<b>migration</b>	(chemistry) the nonrandom movement of an atom or radical from one place to another within a molecule. <i>This butterfly's annual <b>migration</b> across North America.</i>
<b>modernity</b>	The quality or condition of being modern. <i>A shopping mall would instill a spirit of <b>modernity</b> into this village.</i>
<b>modernization</b>	Making modern in appearance or behavior. <i>The industry is undergoing <b>modernization</b>.</i>
<b>modernize</b>	Adapt (something) to modern needs or habits, typically by installing modern equipment or adopting modern ideas or methods. <i>He <b>modernized</b> the health service.</i>

<b>multinational</b>	Involving or operating in several nations or nationalities. <i>1 500 troops were sent to join the <b>multinational</b> force.</i>
<b>nonnative</b>	Not being or composed of aborigines. <i>Our large <b>nonnative</b> population.</i>
<b>overseas</b>	From, to, or relating to a foreign country, especially one across the sea. <i>He spent quite a lot of time working <b>overseas</b>.</i>
<b>privatization</b>	Changing something from state to private ownership or control. <i>The government launched a new round of <b>privatizations</b>.</i>
<b>sophisticate</b>	Sophisticated. <i>She ll <b>sophisticate</b> in three languages.</i>
<b>transcontinental</b>	A transcontinental railway or train. <i>A <b>transcontinental</b> city.</i>
<b>transnational</b>	Extending or operating across national boundaries. <i><b>Transnational</b> advertising agencies.</i>
<b><u>urbanization</u></b>	The condition of being urbanized. <i>Public opposition to the <b>urbanization</b> of the countryside.</i>
<b>westernization</b>	Assimilation of Western culture; the social process of becoming familiar with or converting to the customs and practices of Western civilization.
<b>world</b>	A stage of human life, either mortal or after death. <i>His <b>world</b> was shattered.</i>
<b><u>worldwide</u></b>	Of worldwide scope or applicability. <i><b>Worldwide</b> sales of television rights.</i>
