black	Relating to black people. As <b>black</b> as coal.
<u>bleak</u>	(of an area of land) lacking vegetation and exposed to the elements. <i>He paints a <b>bleak</b> picture of a company that has lost its way.</i>
blue	Of a ski run of the second lowest level of difficulty as indicated by blue markers positioned along it. <b>Blue</b> laws.
cheerless	Gloomy; depressing. Something <b>cheerless</b> about the room.



comfortless	Having or offering nothing that serves to ease feelings or grief or distress. A <b>comfortless</b> room.
crestfallen	Brought low in spirit. He came back empty handed and <b>crestfallen</b> .
dark	Having a dark hue. <b>Dark</b> green.
dejected	Affected or marked by low spirits. Is <b>dejected</b> but trying to look cheerful.
demoralized	Having lost confidence or hope; disheartened. Desperate <b>demoralized</b> people looking for work.
depressed	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <b>Depressed</b> inner city areas.
depressing	Causing sad feelings of gloom and inadequacy. <i>The economic outlook is <b>depressing</b></i> .
desolate	Providing no shelter or sustenance. Depressed and <b>desolate</b> of soul.
despondent	Without or almost without hope. She grew more and more <b>despondent</b> .
<u>dim</u>	Made dim or less bright. The matter was in the <b>dim</b> and distant past.
<u>dingy</u>	(of color) discolored by impurities; not bright and clear. A dirty or <b>dingy</b> white.
disappointed	Sad or displeased because someone or something has failed to fulfil one's hopes or expectations. <i>Thousands of <b>disappointed</b> customers were kept waiting.</i>
<u>disappointing</u>	Not up to expectations. A <b>disappointing</b> performance from one who had seemed so promising.
disconsolate	Very unhappy and unable to be comforted. A <b>disconsolate</b> winter landscape.
<u>discouraged</u>	Made less hopeful or enthusiastic. Felt <b>discouraged</b> by the magnitude of the problem.
<u>disheartened</u>	Made less hopeful or enthusiastic. The <b>disheartened</b> instructor tried vainly to arouse their interest.
<u>disheartening</u>	Destructive of morale and self-reliance. Her death is particularly <b>disheartening</b> because it was preventable.



dismal	Causing dejection. <i>The <b>dismal</b> weather made the late afternoon seem like evening.</i>
dispirited	Having lost enthusiasm and hope; disheartened. A <b>dispirited</b> and divided Party.
dispiriting	Destructive of morale and self-reliance. It was a <b>dispiriting</b> occasion.
distressing	Bad; unfortunate. <i>Distressing</i> or disturbing news.
doleful	Causing grief or misfortune. A <b>doleful</b> look.
dour	Stubbornly unyielding. A <b>dour</b> self sacrificing life.
<u>down</u>	Denoting a flavour variety of stable quark having relatively low mass and an electric charge of 1 3 In the Standard Model protons and neutrons are composed of up and down quarks. <i>Had his algebra problems</i> <b>down</b> .
down in the mouth	Extending or moving from a higher to a lower place.
downbeat	Pessimistic or gloomy. He responds to her enthusiasm with <b>downbeat</b> bemusement.
downcast	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <b>Downcast</b> after his defeat.
downhearted	Filled with melancholy and despondency. Fans must not be <b>downhearted</b> even though we lost.
<u>drab</u>	Of a light brownish green color. <b>Drab</b> camouflage uniforms.
drear	Causing dejection.
dreary	Lacking in liveliness or charm or surprise. The <b>dreary</b> round of working eating and trying to sleep.
<u>forlorn</u>	Pitifully sad and abandoned or lonely. <i>Forlorn</i> figures at bus stops.
frowzy	Scruffy and neglected in appearance. <i>Frowzy</i> white hair.
full of gloom	Having the normally expected amount.
funereal	Having the mournful, sombre character appropriate to a funeral. <i>Funereal</i> gloom.
gloomful	Depressingly dark. <i>Gloomful</i> is archaic.



glooming	Depressingly dark.
grooming	The <b>glooming</b> interior of an old inn.
<u>glum</u>	Moody and melancholic. A <b>glum</b> hopeless shrug.
<u>grim</u>	Harshly ironic or sinister. <i>Grim</i> determination.
hopeless	Certain to fail. I m <b>hopeless</b> at mathematics.
in low spirits	Currently fashionable.
in the doldrums	Holding office.
joyless	Not giving or feeling any pleasure or satisfaction; grim or dismal. She had to face the thought of a <b>joyless</b> future.
long-faced	Having a face longer than the usual.
low	Subdued or brought low in condition or status. <i>The sun is <b>low</b></i> .
low-spirited	Filled with melancholy and despondency.
lugubrious	Excessively mournful. His face looked even more <b>lugubrious</b> than usual.
<u>melancholy</u>	Having a feeling of melancholy sad and pensive. Growing more <b>melancholy</b> every hour.
mirthless	(of a smile or laugh) lacking real amusement and typically expressing irony. <i>He gave a short mirthless laugh.</i>
<u>miserable</u>	Very unhappy; full of misery. <i>You <b>miserable</b> old creep.</i>
morose	Showing a brooding ill humor- Bruce Bli. She was <b>morose</b> and silent when she got home.
mournful	Filled with or evoking sadness. Stared with <b>mournful</b> eyes.
<u>murky</u>	Clouded as with sediment. Murky waters.
<u>pessimistic</u>	Expecting the worst possible outcome. <i>He was <b>pessimistic</b> about the prospects.</i>
poorly lit	Somewhat ill or prone to illness.
sad	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i>Her clothes were in <b>sad</b> shape.</i>



saturnine	Showing a brooding ill humor- Bruce Bli. His <b>saturnine</b> face and dark watchful eyes.
sepulchral	Gloomy; dismal. A speech delivered in <b>sepulchral</b> tones.
shadowy	Of uncertain identity or nature. A long <b>shadowy</b> cobbled passage.
sombre	Grave or even gloomy in character. The night skies were <b>sombre</b> and starless.
<u>sorrowful</u>	Experiencing or marked by or expressing sorrow especially that associated with irreparable loss- Proverbs 14:13. <i>Sorrowful news.</i>
<u>sorry</u>	Used as a polite request that someone should repeat something that one has failed to hear or understand. <i>He looks a <b>sorry</b> sight with his broken jaw.</i>
subdued	In a softened tone. <b>Subdued</b> lighting.
sulky	Moving slowly. Disappointment was making her <b>sulky</b> .
sunless	Without any sun. The windowless <b>sunless</b> headquarters.
unfavourable	Not favorable. <b>Unfavourable</b> economic conditions.
unhappy	Not happy. <b>Unhappy</b> caravans straggling afoot through swamps and canebrakes.
<u>uninviting</u>	Not tempting. The house was dark and <b>uninviting</b> .
unpromising	Not giving hope of future success or good results. The boy s natural intellect had survived in <b>unpromising</b> circumstances.
unwelcoming	Having an inhospitable or uninviting quality. Jean crept into her cold and <b>unwelcoming</b> bed.
woebegone	Worn and broken down by hard use. His sorrow made him look haggard and <b>woebegone</b> .
woeful	Affected by or full of grief or woe. <b>Woeful</b> errors of judgment.
wretched	Of poor quality; very bad. Spent a <b>wretched</b> night on the floor.

cheerless	Causing sad feelings of gloom and inadequacy. The corridors were ill lit and <b>cheerless</b> .
<u>contemplative</u>	A person devoted to the contemplative life. She regarded me with a <b>contemplative</b> eye.
dejected	Sad and depressed; dispirited. <i>He stood in the street looking <b>dejected</b>.</i>
depressed	(of a place or economic activity) suffering the damaging effects of a lack of demand or employment. <b>Depressed</b> by the loss of his job.
despair	A state in which all hope is lost or absent. They were rescued from <b>despair</b> at the last minute.



despairing	Showing the loss of all hope. The last <b>despairing</b> plea of the condemned criminal.
despondent	Without or almost without hope. She grew more and more <b>despondent</b> .
<u>dingy</u>	Discolored by impurities; not bright and clear is often used in combination. <i>A dirty or <b>dingy</b> white.</i>
disconsolate	Very unhappy and unable to be comforted. A <b>disconsolate</b> winter landscape.
<u>discouraged</u>	Lacking in resolution. Felt <b>discouraged</b> by the magnitude of the problem.
dismal	(of a person or their mood) gloomy. The first <b>dismal</b> dispiriting days of November.
dispirited	Filled with melancholy and despondency. A <b>dispirited</b> and resigned expression on her face.
dour	Showing a brooding ill humor. A hard <b>dour</b> humourless fanatic.
<u>drab</u>	Clothes especially trousers made of drab. The landscape was <b>drab</b> and grey.
dreary	Causing dejection. The <b>dreary</b> round of working eating and trying to sleep.
gloom	A feeling of melancholy apprehension. A black yew <b>gloom</b> d the stagnant air.
<u>glum</u>	Looking or feeling dejected; morose. A <b>glum</b> hopeless shrug.
<u>grim</u>	Harshly uninviting or formidable in manner or appearance. <i>Grim determination.</i>
hopeless	Without hope because there seems to be no possibility of comfort or success. With a <b>hopeless</b> sigh he sat down.
<u>melancholy</u>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>We acquainted him with the <b>melancholy</b> truth.</i>
mourning	State of sorrow over the death or departure of a loved one. If he dies she ll put on <b>mourning</b> but she won t cry.
<u>nostalgia</u>	Something done or presented in order to evoke feelings of nostalgia. <i>An evening of TV <b>nostalgia</b></i> .



pensive	Showing pensive sadness. A <b>pensive</b> mood.
<u>pessimistic</u>	Expecting the worst possible outcome. <i>He was <b>pessimistic</b> about the prospects.</i>
sadden	Cause to feel sorrow; make unhappy. He was greatly <b>sadden</b> ed by the death of his only son.
<u>somber</u>	Grave or even gloomy in character. A <b>somber</b> mood.
sulky	Sullen or moody. She had a sultry <b>sulky</b> mouth.
sullen	Bad-tempered and sulky. A <b>sullen</b> crowd.
<u>wistful</u>	Showing pensive sadness. The sensitive and <b>wistful</b> response of a poet to the gentler phases of beauty.
