<u>distinction</u>	Excellence that sets someone or something apart from others. <i>He gained the highest distinction awarded for excellence in photography.</i>
divine happiness	Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.
divine rapture	Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.
elegance	A quality of neatness and ingenious simplicity in the solution of a problem (especially in science or mathematics). <i>The simplicity and elegance of his invention.</i>

homage	Special honour or respect shown publicly. <i>Daniel's films were a homage to her.</i>
honour	A woman's virtue or chastity. <i>She died defending her honour.</i>
illustriousness	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence.
impressiveness	Splendid or imposing in size or appearance.
kudos	Compliments or congratulations. <i>She was looking for kudos rather than profit.</i>
laurels	The state of being honored.
lustre	Ceramics with an iridescent metallic glaze lustreware. <i>The lustre of the Milky Way.</i>
magnificence	Splendid or imposing in size or appearance. <i>The magnificence of the surrounding countryside.</i>
majesty	Impressiveness in scale or proportion. <i>The majesty of the royal household.</i>
marvel	A wonderful or astonishing person or thing. <i>The marvels of technology.</i>

<u>name</u>	A language unit by which a person or thing is known. <i>Those are two names for the same thing.</i>
nimbus	A luminous cloud or a halo surrounding a supernatural being or a saint. <i>Nimbus clouds.</i>
<u>nobility</u>	The quality of being noble in character. <i>After 1722 nobility was only acquired by service in the army or bureaucracy.</i>
notability	A celebrity who is an inspiration to others. <i>A Fleet Street notability.</i>
note	A written sign representing the pitch and duration of a musical note. <i>There was a note of uncertainty in his voice.</i>
opulence	Great wealth or luxuriousness. <i>Rooms of spectacular opulence.</i>
