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## Associations of "Go over" (30 Words)

<a href="#">absenteeism</a>	The practice of regularly staying away from work or school without good reason. <i>High levels of <b>absenteeism</b> caused by low job motivation.</i>
<a href="#">across</a>	Used with an expression of measurement. <i>Halfway <b>across</b> Jenny jumped.</i>
<a href="#">beyond</a>	The unknown, especially in references to life after death. <i>The athletes are pushing themselves to their limits and <b>beyond</b>.</i>
<a href="#">consumerism</a>	The theory that an increasing consumption of goods is economically beneficial. <i>The growth of <b>consumerism</b> has led to many organizations improving their service to the customer.</i>
<a href="#">exceed</a>	Go beyond what is allowed or stipulated by (a set limit). <i>Production costs have <b>exceeded</b> 60 000.</i>
<a href="#">excess</a>	Excessive indulgence. <i>As regards other cancers in this age group there is a small <b>excess</b> during 1984 90.</i>
<b>extra</b>	Excessive or extravagant. <i>He is trying to be <b>extra</b> good.</i>
<b>extravagant</b>	Recklessly wasteful. <i><b>Extravagant</b> praise.</i>
<a href="#">furthermore</a>	In addition. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>
<a href="#">inordinate</a>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of <b>inordinate</b> length.</i>
<b>outdo</b>	Be or do something to a greater degree. <i>She <b>outdoes</b> all other athletes.</i>

<b>outrun</b>	Run or travel faster or further than. <i>Their one chance was to <b>outrun</b> their pursuers.</i>
<b>outwit</b>	Beat through cleverness and wit. <i>Ray had <b>outwitted</b> many an opponent.</i>
<b>overstep</b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>You must not <b>overstep</b> your borrowing limit.</i>
<b><u>overtake</u></b>	Catch up with and possibly overtake. <i>Germany rapidly <b>overtook</b> Britain in industrial output.</i>
<b>pass</b>	An act of passing the hands over something as in conjuring or hypnotism. <i>It is now my duty to <b>pass</b> sentence upon you.</i>
<b>pedantry</b>	Excessive concern with minor details and rules. <i>To object to this is not mere <b>pedantry</b>.</i>
<b>redundance</b>	The attribute of being superfluous and unneeded.
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>superfluity</b>	The state of being superfluous. <i>A <b>superfluity</b> of unoccupied time.</i>
<b>superfluous</b>	Serving no useful purpose; having no excuse for being. <i>Delete <b>superfluous</b> or unnecessary words.</i>
<b><u>surpass</u></b>	Do or be better than ever before. <i>Her performance <b>surpasses</b> that of any other student I know.</i>
<b>through</b>	Throughout the entire extent. <i>We need the money to help us get <b>through</b> until he has a new job.</i>
<b>tiredness</b>	The state of wishing for sleep or rest; weariness. <i>Depression and <b>tiredness</b> caused by overwork.</i>
<b><u>too</u></b>	In addition; also. <i>He was driving <b>too</b> fast.</i>
<b>transcend</b>	Surpass (a person or achievement). <i>He doubts that he will ever <b>transcend</b> Shakespeare.</i>
<b><u>transgress</u></b>	Pass beyond (limits or boundaries). <i>The sea <b>transgresses</b> along the West coast of the island.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Not yet payable. <i>His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.</i>
<b>unnecessary</b>	Unnecessary things. <i>Some people feel that holiday insurance is <b>unnecessary</b>.</i>
<b>weariness</b>	Reluctance to see or experience any more of something. <i>He began to feel <b>weariness</b>.</i>
