crook	A piece of extra tubing which can be fitted to a brass instrument to lower the pitch by a set interval. <i>Her head was cradled in the crook of Luke s left arm.</i>
encouragement	The action of giving someone support, confidence, or hope. <i>Incentives and encouragement to play sports.</i>
fillip	A movement made by bending the last joint of the finger against the thumb and suddenly releasing it; a flick of the finger. <i>The halving of car tax would provide a fillip to sales.</i>
goading	A verbalization that encourages you to attempt something.
<u>impetus</u>	The act of applying force suddenly. <i>Hit the booster coil before the flywheel loses all its impetus.</i>
<u>impulse</u>	A change of momentum produced by an impulse equivalent to the average value of the force multiplied by the time during which it acts. <i>Nerve impulses.</i>

incentive	An additional payment (or other remuneration) to employees as a means of increasing output. <i>Tax incentives for investing in depressed areas.</i>
inducement	A positive motivational influence. <i>There is no inducement to wait for payment.</i>
pole	A long slender flexible rod of wood or fibreglass used by a competitor in pole vaulting. <i>They tell you on the tin that their tuna is entirely caught with pole and line.</i>
prodding	A pointed instrument that is used to prod into a state of motion. <i>The ceaseless prodding got on his nerves.</i>
prompt	The time limit for the payment of an account stated on a prompt note. <i>The audience could hear his prompting.</i>
rod	A square rod of land. <i>The largest carp ever caught on rod and line in Britain.</i>
spike	Fruiting spike of a cereal plant especially corn. <i>The oil price spike.</i>
spiked stick	Sports equipment consisting of a sharp point on the sole of a shoe worn by athletes.
spur	A projection from a mountain or mountain range. <i>It s an easy walk up the spur that leads to the summit.</i>
spurring	A sharp prod fixed to a rider's heel and used to urge a horse onward.
staff	Building material consisting of plaster and hair; used to cover external surfaces of temporary structure (as at an exposition) or for decoration. <i>The hospital has an excellent nursing staff.</i>
stimulant	A drug that temporarily quickens some vital process. <i>Population growth is a major stimulant to industrial development.</i>
stimulation	The effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>The stimulation of a revolution in intelligence affairs.</i>
stimulus	Any stimulating information or event; acts to arouse action. <i>If the tax were abolished it would act as a stimulus to exports.</i>
urging	The action of urging someone to do something. <i>I have had maternal urgings.</i>

Definitions of "Goad" as a verb

- Give heart or courage to.
- Provoke or annoy (someone) so as to stimulate an action or reaction.
- Stab or urge on as if with a pointed stick.
- Urge with or as if with a goad.
- Drive (an animal) with a spiked stick.
- Goad or provoke, as by constant criticism.
- Annoy or provoke, as by constant criticism.

badger	Persuade through constant efforts. <i>Tom had finally badgered her into going.</i>
dragoon	Subjugate by imposing troops. <i>She had been dragooned into helping with the housework.</i>
egg on	Coat with beaten egg.
encourage	Inspire with confidence; give hope or courage to. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative.</i>
excite	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The energy of an electron is sufficient to excite the atom.</i>
fire up	Cause to go off.
hound	Pursue or chase relentlessly. <i>The detectives hounded the suspect until they found him.</i>
impel	Drive forward; propel. <i>Financial difficulties impelled him to desperate measures.</i>

inspire	Breathe in (air); inhale. <i>His passion for literature inspired him to begin writing.</i>
motivate	Request (something) and present facts and arguments in support of one's request. <i>It is the teacher's job to motivate the child at school.</i>
move	Move so as to change position perform a nontranslational motion. <i>She deftly moved the conversation to safer territory.</i>
needle	Prick with a needle. <i>I just said that to Charlie to needle him.</i>
pressure	To cause to do through pressure or necessity by physical moral or intellectual means. <i>She pressured her son to accept a job offer from the bank.</i>
pressurize	Maintain a certain pressure. <i>A pressurized can.</i>
prompt	(of a computer) request input from (a user). <i>The violence prompted a wave of refugees to flee the country.</i>
provoke	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. <i>A teacher can provoke you into working harder.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Rouse the beer as the hops are introduced.</i>
spur	Equip with spurs. <i>She spurred her horse towards the hedge.</i>
stimulate	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner. <i>This play stimulates.</i>
sting	Cause an emotional pain as if by stinging. <i>A nettle stings if you brush it lightly.</i>
stir	Stir the feelings emotions or peace of. <i>The story stirred many memories of my childhood.</i>
urge	Encourage (a person or animal) to move more quickly or in a particular direction. <i>Do try to relax she urged.</i>
work up	Cause to happen or to occur as a consequence.

afflict	Cause physical pain or suffering in. <i>She was afflicted by the death of her parents.</i>
affront	Treat, mention, or speak to rudely. <i>He took his son's desertion as a personal affront.</i>
aggressor	A confident assertive person who acts as instigator.
assailant	Someone who attacks. <i>The police have no firm leads about the identity of his assailant.</i>
bludgeon	Beat someone repeatedly with a bludgeon or other heavy object. <i>She was found bludgeoned to death in the basement.</i>
bullying	Noisily domineering; tending to browbeat others.

defamation	An abusive attack on a person's character or good name. <i>She sued him for defamation.</i>
detraction	A petty disparagement. <i>Let it be no detraction from his merits to say he is plainspoken.</i>
enemy	A personal enemy. <i>The enemy shot down four helicopters.</i>
glee	Great merriment. <i>His face lit up with impish glee.</i>
gloat	An act of gloating. <i>I would join her for a good gloat.</i>
humiliation	The action of humiliating someone or the state of being humiliated. <i>The conference decision was a humiliation for the union's executive.</i>
indignity	An affront to one's dignity or self-esteem. <i>The indignity of needing financial help.</i>
insult	Treat, mention, or speak to rudely. <i>The present offer is an absolute insult.</i>
irritate	Make (someone) annoyed or a little angry. <i>It irritates me that she never closes the door after she leaves.</i>

jibe	Make insulting or mocking remarks; jeer. <i>A jibe at his old rivals.</i>
<u>mock</u>	Mock examinations. <i>Obtaining Grade A in mocks.</i>
obloquy	Strong public condemnation. <i>Conduct to which no more obloquy could reasonably attach.</i>
playfully	In a light-hearted manner. <i>Lily laughed and playfully slapped him across the chest.</i>
rankle	(of a wound or sore) continue to be painful; fester. <i>Lisa was rankled by his assertion.</i>
<u>repel</u>	Be repellent to cause aversion in. <i>Like poles repel and unlike poles attract.</i>
<u>slander</u>	Make false and damaging statements about (someone). <i>I've had just about all I can stomach of your slanders.</i>
<u>stab</u>	Stab or pierce. <i>She felt a stab of jealousy.</i>
tantalize	Excite the senses or desires of (someone). <i>Such ambitious questions have long tantalized the world's best thinkers.</i>
taunt	Provoke or challenge (someone) with insulting remarks. <i>Pupils will play truant rather than face the taunts of classmates about their ragged clothes.</i>
tease	Mock or make fun of playfully. <i>Some think of him as a tease who likes to keep others guessing.</i>
vilification	Slandorous defamation. <i>The widespread vilification of politicians.</i>
