Synonyms of "Goddess" as a noun (13 Words)

- beauty queen** A very attractive or seductive looking woman.
- belle** A young woman who is the most charming and beautiful of several rivals.
*She was the **belle** of the ball.*
- charmer** A person with an attractive and engaging personality, typically one who uses this to impress or manipulate others.
*Joe who had been such a **charmer** had become irritable and lazy.*
- deity** A god or goddess (in a polytheistic religion).
*A ruler driven by delusions of **deity**.*
- divine being** Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.
- divinity** God.
*A doctor of **divinity**.*

- enchantress** A female sorcerer or magician.
- english rose** The people of England.
- immortal** An immortal being especially a god of ancient Greece or Rome.
*Shakespeare is one of the **immortals**.*
- picture** A form of entertainment that enacts a story by sound and a sequence of images giving the illusion of continuous movement.
*They could still receive the sound but the **picture** was gone.*
- seductress** A woman who seduces.
- venus** The second nearest planet to the sun; it is peculiar in that its rotation is slow and retrograde (in the opposite sense of the Earth and all other planets except Uranus); it is visible from Earth as an early `morning star' or an `evening star.
- vision** The images seen on a television screen.
*Madame was a **vision** in black velvet.*



Usage Examples of "Goddess" as a noun

- *Athena Nike, goddess of victory.*
- *He had an affair with a screen goddess.*

biblical	Relating to or contained in the Bible. <i>There is a biblical cadence in the last words he utters.</i>
blessing	A person's sanction or support. <i>He gave the project his blessing.</i>
centaur	A mythical being that is half man and half horse.
deification	The condition of being treated like a god. <i>The capitalists deification of capital.</i>
deify	Worship or regard as a god. <i>These young men deify financial success.</i>
deity	The creator and supreme being (in a monotheistic religion such as Christianity). <i>Also on show is a bronze falcon deity.</i>
divinity	The state or quality of being divine. <i>Christ s divinity.</i>
elegance	A refined quality of gracefulness and good taste. <i>The simplicity and elegance of his invention.</i>
enshrine	Hold sacred. <i>The saint s bones were enshrined in the cathedral.</i>
fairy	Offensive term for a homosexual man. <i>Fairy gold.</i>
gracefulness	Beautiful carriage.
holy	Morally and spiritually excellent. <i>The holy month of Ramadan.</i>
idealize	Regard or represent as perfect or better than in reality. <i>She idealized her husband after his death.</i>
idolize	Admire, revere, or love greatly or excessively. <i>Many teenagers idolized the Beatles.</i>
legend	A story about mythical or supernatural beings or events. <i>See legend to Fig 1.</i>
legendary	So celebrated as to having taken on the nature of a legend. <i>A legendary British king of the 4th century.</i>
myth	A traditional story accepted as history; serves to explain the world view of a people. <i>The heroes of Greek myth.</i>

mythological	Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical validity. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all mythological symbols.</i>
mythology	A set of stories or beliefs about a particular person, institution, or situation, especially when exaggerated or fictitious. <i>We look for change in our thirties not in our forties as popular mythology has it.</i>
oracle	A response or message given by an oracle especially an ambiguous one. <i>He reigned supreme as the Colonial Office's oracle on Africa.</i>
orison	Reverent petition to a deity.
pantheon	A building in which the illustrious dead of a nation are buried or honoured. <i>The pantheon of the all time greats.</i>
personification	A figure intended to represent an abstract quality. <i>The knight is accompanied by two feminine personifications of vice.</i>
priestess	A female priest of a non-Christian religion.
prophet	In Christian use the books of Isaiah Jeremiah Ezekiel Daniel and the twelve minor prophets. <i>He is repeatedly hailed as a prophet of modernism.</i>
religion	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny. <i>The world's great religions.</i>
seer	A person with unusual powers of foresight. <i>A seer of the future.</i>
temple	A thing regarded as holy or likened to a temple especially a person's body. <i>The veins in his temple throbbed.</i>
worship	The activity of worshipping. <i>She adores her sons and they worship her.</i>
