## Synonyms of "Goddess" as a noun (13 Words)

**beauty queen** A very attractive or seductive looking woman.

**belle** A young woman who is the most charming and beautiful of several rivals.  
*She was the **belle** of the ball.*

**charmer** A person with an attractive and engaging personality, typically one who uses this to impress or manipulate others.  
*Joe who had been such a **charmer** had become irritable and lazy.*

**deity** A god or goddess (in a polytheistic religion).  
*A ruler driven by delusions of **deity**.*

**divine being** Terms referring to the Judeo-Christian God.

**divinity** God.  
*A doctor of **divinity**.*

<b>enchantress</b>	A female sorcerer or magician.
<b>english rose</b>	The people of England.
<b><u>immortal</u></b>	An immortal being especially a god of ancient Greece or Rome. <i>Shakespeare is one of the <b>immortals</b>.</i>
<b>picture</b>	A form of entertainment that enacts a story by sound and a sequence of images giving the illusion of continuous movement. <i>They could still receive the sound but the <b>picture</b> was gone.</i>
<b><u>seductress</u></b>	A woman who seduces.
<b>venus</b>	The second nearest planet to the sun; it is peculiar in that its rotation is slow and retrograde (in the opposite sense of the Earth and all other planets except Uranus); it is visible from Earth as an early `morning star' or an `evening star'.
<b>vision</b>	The images seen on a television screen. <i>Madame was a <b>vision</b> in black velvet.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Goddess" as a noun

- *Athena Nike, goddess of victory.*
- *He had an affair with a screen goddess.*

<b>biblical</b>	Relating to or contained in the Bible. <i>There is a <b>biblical</b> cadence in the last words he utters.</i>
<b>blessing</b>	A person's sanction or support. <i>He gave the project his <b>blessing</b>.</i>
<b>centaur</b>	A mythical being that is half man and half horse.
<b>deification</b>	The condition of being treated like a god. <i>The capitalists <b>deification</b> of capital.</i>
<b>deify</b>	Worship or regard as a god. <i>These young men <b>deify</b> financial success.</i>
<b>deity</b>	The creator and supreme being (in a monotheistic religion such as Christianity). <i>Also on show is a bronze falcon <b>deity</b>.</i>
<b>divinity</b>	The state or quality of being divine. <i>Christ s <b>divinity</b>.</i>
<b>elegance</b>	A refined quality of gracefulness and good taste. <i>The simplicity and <b>elegance</b> of his invention.</i>
<b>enshrine</b>	Hold sacred. <i>The saint s bones were <b>enshrined</b> in the cathedral.</i>
<b>fairy</b>	Offensive term for a homosexual man. <i><b>Fairy</b> gold.</i>
<b>gracefulness</b>	Beautiful carriage.
<b>holy</b>	Morally and spiritually excellent. <i>The <b>holy</b> month of Ramadan.</i>
<b>idealize</b>	Regard or represent as perfect or better than in reality. <i>She <b>idealized</b> her husband after his death.</i>
<b>idolize</b>	Admire, revere, or love greatly or excessively. <i>Many teenagers <b>idolized</b> the Beatles.</i>
<b>legend</b>	A story about mythical or supernatural beings or events. <i>See <b>legend</b> to Fig 1.</i>
<b>legendary</b>	So celebrated as to having taken on the nature of a legend. <i>A <b>legendary</b> British king of the 4th century.</i>
<b>myth</b>	A traditional story accepted as history; serves to explain the world view of a people. <i>The heroes of Greek <b>myth</b>.</i>

<b>mythological</b>	Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical validity. <i>The tree of life is one of the oldest of all <b>mythological</b> symbols.</i>
<b>mythology</b>	A set of stories or beliefs about a particular person, institution, or situation, especially when exaggerated or fictitious. <i>We look for change in our thirties not in our forties as popular <b>mythology</b> has it.</i>
<b>oracle</b>	A response or message given by an oracle especially an ambiguous one. <i>He reigned supreme as the Colonial Office's <b>oracle</b> on Africa.</i>
<b>orison</b>	Reverent petition to a deity.
<b>pantheon</b>	A building in which the illustrious dead of a nation are buried or honoured. <i>The <b>pantheon</b> of the all time greats.</i>
<b>personification</b>	A figure intended to represent an abstract quality. <i>The knight is accompanied by two feminine <b>personifications</b> of vice.</i>
<b>priestess</b>	A female priest of a non-Christian religion.
<b>prophet</b>	In Christian use the books of Isaiah Jeremiah Ezekiel Daniel and the twelve minor prophets. <i>He is repeatedly hailed as a <b>prophet</b> of modernism.</i>
<b>religion</b>	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny. <i>The world's great <b>religions</b>.</i>
<b>seer</b>	A person with unusual powers of foresight. <i>A <b>seer</b> of the future.</i>
<b>temple</b>	A thing regarded as holy or likened to a temple especially a person's body. <i>The veins in his <b>temple</b> throbbed.</i>
<b>worship</b>	The activity of worshipping. <i>She adores her sons and they <b>worship</b> her.</i>
