Associations of "Going on" (30 Words)

abscond	(of a person on bail) fail to surrender oneself for custody at the appointed time. <i>The barman absconded with a week s takings.</i>
absence	The time interval during which something or somebody is away. <i>He visited during my absence.</i>
ambulate	Walk about; not be bedridden or incapable of walking. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
astray	Into error or morally questionable behaviour. <i>He was led astray by boozy colleagues.</i>
away	Out of the way especially away from one s thoughts. <i>Ran away from the lion.</i>
bereavement	The fact or condition of being bereaved. <i>There is no right way to experience bereavement.</i>
decamp	Break up or leave a military camp. <i>Now he has decamped to Hollywood.</i>
depart	Leave (one’s job). <i>He departed from the precedent set by many.</i>
deviate	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>The whole affair offers revealing insights into attitudes towards sexual deviates.</i>
digress	Leave the main subject temporarily in speech or writing. <i>I have digressed a little from my original plan.</i>
dislodge	Knock or force out of position. <i>The new employee dislodged her by moving into her office space.</i>
egress	The act of coming (or going) out; becoming apparent. <i>Direct means of access and egress for passengers.</i>

err	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>He has erred and strayed as many of us have.</i>
exude	(of a person) display (an emotion or quality) strongly and openly. <i>The beetle exudes a caustic liquid.</i>
far	Beyond a norm in opinion or actions. <i>The far north of Scotland.</i>
gad	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>
gallivant	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
leave	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>He ll leave you in no doubt about what he thinks.</i>
leaving	The act of departing.
mitigation	The action of lessening in severity or intensity. <i>The identification and mitigation of pollution.</i>
outlet	A means of expressing one's talents, energy, or emotions. <i>An outlet store.</i>
overboard	To extremes. <i>The severe storm washed a man overboard.</i>
passing	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>With the passing of the years she had become a little eccentric.</i>
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Roses climbed rambled hung over walls.</i>
roam	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>The gypsies roamed the woods.</i>
rove	(of a person's eyes) look in changing directions in order to see something thoroughly. <i>The policeman s eyes roved around the pub.</i>
sidetrack	A well or borehole which runs partly to one side of the original line of drilling. <i>A sidetrack to the original discovery well.</i>
spill	A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt. <i>Diners can spill out into the courtyard.</i>
stray	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>Over these mounds the shepherd strays.</i>
