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## Associations of "Going on" (30 Words)

<b>abscond</b>	(of a person on bail) fail to surrender oneself for custody at the appointed time. <i>The barman <b>absconded</b> with a week s takings.</i>
<b><a href="#">absence</a></b>	The time interval during which something or somebody is away. <i>He visited during my <b>absence</b>.</i>
<b>ambulate</b>	Walk about; not be bedridden or incapable of walking. <i>People who make use of crutches to <b>ambulate</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">astray</a></b>	Into error or morally questionable behaviour. <i>He was led <b>astray</b> by boozy colleagues.</i>
<b><a href="#">away</a></b>	Out of the way especially away from one s thoughts. <i>Ran <b>away</b> from the lion.</i>
<b>bereavement</b>	The fact or condition of being bereaved. <i>There is no right way to experience <b>bereavement</b>.</i>
<b>decamp</b>	Break up or leave a military camp. <i>Now he has <b>decamped</b> to Hollywood.</i>
<b><a href="#">depart</a></b>	Leave (one’s job). <i>He <b>departed</b> from the precedent set by many.</i>
<b><a href="#">deviate</a></b>	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>The whole affair offers revealing insights into attitudes towards sexual <b>deviates</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">digress</a></b>	Leave the main subject temporarily in speech or writing. <i>I have <b>digressed</b> a little from my original plan.</i>
<b><a href="#">dislodge</a></b>	Knock or force out of position. <i>The new employee <b>dislodged</b> her by moving into her office space.</i>
<b>egress</b>	The act of coming (or going) out; becoming apparent. <i>Direct means of access and <b>egress</b> for passengers.</i>

<b>err</b>	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>He has <b>erred</b> and strayed as many of us have.</i>
<b>exude</b>	(of a person) display (an emotion or quality) strongly and openly. <i>The beetle <b>exudes</b> a caustic liquid.</i>
<b>far</b>	Beyond a norm in opinion or actions. <i>The <b>far</b> north of Scotland.</i>
<b>gad</b>	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>He had heard that I was <b>gadding</b> about with an airline stewardess.</i>
<b>gallivant</b>	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>leave</b>	Go and leave behind either intentionally or by neglect or forgetfulness. <i>He ll <b>leave</b> you in no doubt about what he thinks.</i>
<b>leaving</b>	The act of departing.
<b>mitigation</b>	The action of lessening in severity or intensity. <i>The identification and <b>mitigation</b> of pollution.</i>
<b>outlet</b>	A means of expressing one's talents, energy, or emotions. <i>An <b>outlet</b> store.</i>
<b>overboard</b>	To extremes. <i>The severe storm washed a man <b>overboard</b>.</i>
<b>passing</b>	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>With the <b>passing</b> of the years she had become a little eccentric.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Roses climbed <b>rambled</b> hung over walls.</i>
<b>roam</b>	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>The gypsies <b>roamed</b> the woods.</i>
<b>rove</b>	(of a person's eyes) look in changing directions in order to see something thoroughly. <i>The policeman s eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b>sidetrack</b>	A well or borehole which runs partly to one side of the original line of drilling. <i>A <b>sidetrack</b> to the original discovery well.</i>
<b>spill</b>	A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt. <i>Diners can <b>spill</b> out into the courtyard.</i>
<b>stray</b>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>Over these mounds the shepherd <b>strays</b>.</i>
