progression	The process of developing or moving gradually towards a more advanced state. <i>Good opportunities for career progression.</i>
release	A device that when pressed will release part of a mechanism. <i>The movie will be on release from Christmas.</i>
sledding	The sport of riding on a sled or sleigh. <i>Sledding is not allowed on ski trails.</i>

abscond	Leave hurriedly and secretly, typically to escape from custody or avoid arrest. <i>The barman absconded with a week s takings.</i>
absence	An occasion or period of being away from a place or person. <i>The letter had arrived during his absence.</i>
ambulate	Walk; move about. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
astray	Away from the correct path or direction. <i>A bullet went astray and killed a bystander.</i>
away	Out of the way especially away from one s thoughts. <i>In front of them the land fell away to the river.</i>
bereavement	The fact or condition of being bereaved. <i>The family suffered a sad bereavement.</i>
decamp	Run away; usually includes taking something or somebody along. <i>The armies of both chiefs had decamped.</i>

depart	Leave. <i>The train departs at noon.</i>
deviate	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>Their deviate behaviour.</i>
digress	Leave the main subject temporarily in speech or writing. <i>I have digressed a little from my original plan.</i>
dislodge	Change place or direction. <i>The hoofs of their horses dislodged loose stones.</i>
egress	(astronomy) the reappearance of a celestial body after an eclipse. <i>A narrow egress.</i>
err	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>The judge had erred in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.</i>
exude	(with reference to moisture or a smell) discharge or be discharged slowly and steadily. <i>She exudes great confidence.</i>
far	More distant than another object of the same kind. <i>The far future.</i>
gad	An anxiety disorder characterized by chronic free-floating anxiety and such symptoms as tension or sweating or trembling or lightheadedness or irritability etc that has lasted for more than six months. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>
gallivant	Wander aimlessly in search of pleasure. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
leave	Leave behind unintentionally. <i>Leave your child in the nurse s care.</i>
leaving	The act of departing.
mitigation	The action of reducing the severity, seriousness, or painfulness of something. <i>The identification and mitigation of pollution.</i>
outlet	An opening that permits escape or release. <i>A designer outlet.</i>
overboard	To extremes. <i>The severe storm washed a man overboard.</i>
passing	In sport the action of passing a ball to another team member. <i>His play showed good passing and control.</i>

ramble	Walk for pleasure in the countryside. <i>Willy rambled on about Norman archways.</i>
roam	(of a person's eyes or hands) pass lightly over something without stopping. <i>The gypsies roamed the woods.</i>
rove	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>The policeman s eyes roved around the pub.</i>
sidetrack	A railway branch line or siding. <i>A sidetrack to the original discovery well.</i>
spill	An instance of a liquid spilling or being spilt. <i>Passengers baggage had spilled out of the hold.</i>
stray	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>Dog owners are urged not to allow their dogs to stray.</i>
wander	An act or instance of wandering. <i>After dinner we wandered into town.</i>
