<b>finance</b>	The commercial activity of providing funds and capital. <i>The club's <b>finances</b> are stretched to the limit.</i>
<b>finances</b>	The commercial activity of providing funds and capital.
<b>first prize</b>	The lowest forward gear ratio in the gear box of a motor vehicle; used to start a car moving.
<b>funds</b>	Assets in the form of money.
<b>gold medal</b>	A deep yellow color.
<b>liquid assets</b>	A substance that is liquid at room temperature and pressure.
<b>lucre</b>	The excess of revenues over outlays in a given period of time (including depreciation and other non-cash expenses). <i>Officials getting their hands grubby with filthy <b>lucre</b>.</i>
<b>means</b>	An action or system by which a result is achieved; a method. <i>Technology seen as a <b>means</b> to bring about emancipation.</i>
<b>money</b>	Wealth reckoned in terms of money. <i>The main aim of a commercial organization is to make <b>money</b>.</i>
<b>reserves</b>	Civilians trained as soldiers but not part of the regular army.
<b>resources</b>	The ability to deal resourcefully with unusual problems. <i>A man of resource.</i>
<b>wealth</b>	The state of being rich and affluent; having a plentiful supply of material goods and money. <i>Some people buy boats and cars to display their <b>wealth</b>.</i>
<b>wherewithal</b>	The necessary means (especially financial means). <i>They lacked the <b>wherewithal</b> to pay.</i>

<b>amber</b>	A honey yellow colour typical of amber. <i><b>Amber</b> eyes.</i>
<b>amethyst</b>	A violet or purple colour. <i><b>Amethyst</b> earrings.</i>
<b>auriferous</b>	(of rocks or minerals) containing gold. <i>Not all the quartz veins are <b>auriferous</b>.</i>
<b>bracelet</b>	Jewelry worn around the wrist for decoration.
<b>chain</b>	Fasten or secure with a chain. <i>The agency is part of a nationwide <b>chain</b>.</i>
<b>coal</b>	Take in coal. <i>Men were loading <b>coals</b> into a wagon.</i>
<b>colliery</b>	A coal mine and the buildings and equipment associated with it.
<b>copper</b>	Brown coins of low value made of copper or bronze. <i><b>Coppered</b> pins.</i>
<b>diamond</b>	One of the four suits in a conventional pack of playing cards denoted by a red diamond. <i>He led a small <b>diamond</b>.</i>
<b>diggings</b>	Material that has been dug from the ground. <i>Hills scarred with peat <b>diggings</b>.</i>
<b>excavation</b>	A hole in the ground made by excavating. <i>Inside the <b>excavation</b> were the bones of some huge creature.</i>
<b>gem</b>	Decorate with or as with gems. <i>Tiny drops of sweat <b>gemmed</b> his forehead.</i>
<b>gravel</b>	Cover with gravel. <i>They <b>gravelled</b> the road.</i>
<b>jade</b>	An ornament made of jade. <i>A <b>jade</b> figurine.</i>
<b>jadeite</b>	A green, blue, or white mineral which is one of the forms of jade. It is a silicate of sodium, aluminium, and iron and belongs to the pyroxene group.
<b>jewelry</b>	An adornment (as a bracelet or ring or necklace) made of precious metals and set with gems (or imitation gems).
<b>medal</b>	Decorate or honour with a medal. <i>He was <b>medalled</b> by the Michigan Photographers Association.</i>
<b>medallion</b>	A circular helping of food (especially a boneless cut of meat). <i><b>Medallions</b> of veal.</i>

<b>mine</b>	Excavation in the earth from which ores and minerals are extracted. <i><b>Mine</b> ores and metals.</i>
<b>miner</b>	A person who dug tunnels in order to destroy an enemy position with explosives. <i>The <b>miners</b> were freed after spending four days trapped underground.</i>
<b>mineral</b>	Of or denoting a mineral. <i><b>Mineral</b> ingredients such as zinc oxide.</i>
<b>mineshaft</b>	A deep narrow vertical hole, or sometimes a horizontal tunnel, that gives access to a mine. <i>One member of this party almost vanished down a hidden disused <b>mineshaft</b>.</i>
<b>mining</b>	The act of extracting ores or coal etc from the earth. <i>Close linkages between <b>mining</b> and other sectors of the economy.</i>
<b>necklace</b>	In South Africa kill someone with a tyre necklace. <i>A diamond <b>necklace</b>.</i>
<b>nephrite</b>	A hard, pale green or white mineral which is one of the forms of jade. It is a silicate of calcium and magnesium.
<b>ore</b>	A monetary subunit in Denmark and Norway and Sweden 100 ore equal 1 krona. <i>The mine s reserves of <b>ore</b>.</i>
<b>pearl</b>	An artificial imitation of a pearl. <i>Tweeds look traditional teamed with twinset and <b>pearls</b>.</i>
<b>quarry</b>	Extract stone or other materials from a quarry. <i><b>Quarry</b> marble.</i>
<b>quartz</b>	A hard glossy mineral consisting of silicon dioxide in crystal form present in most rocks especially sandstone and granite yellow sand is quartz with iron oxide impurities.
<b>turquoise</b>	A shade of blue tinged with green. <i>Blue <b>turquoise</b> is valued as a gemstone.</i>
