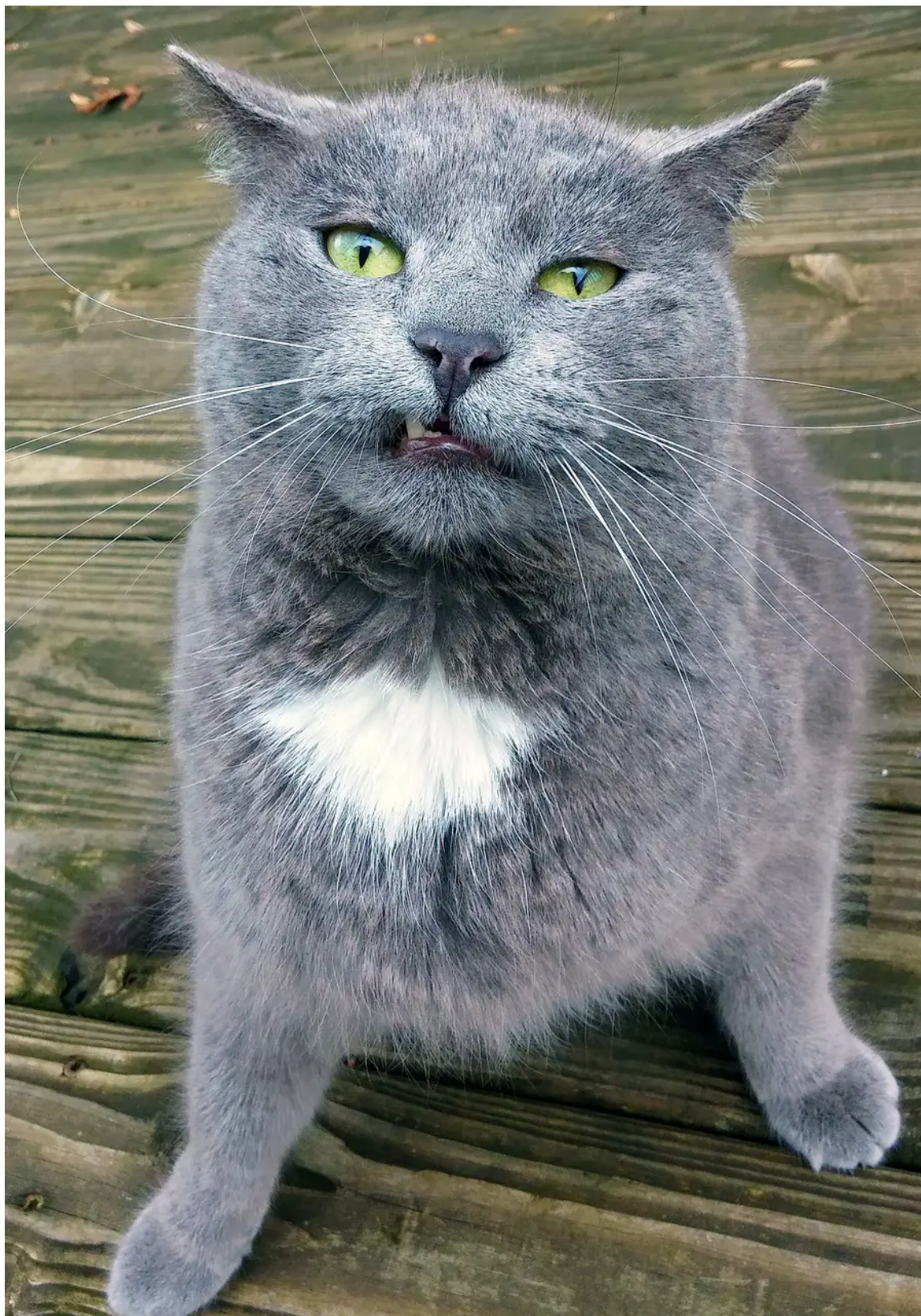

### Definitions of "Goofy" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “goofy” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Having or displaying protruding or crooked front teeth.*
- *Ludicrous, foolish.*
- *(in surfing and other board sports) having the right leg in front of the left on the board.*
- *Foolish or harmlessly eccentric.*



## Synonyms of "Goofy" as an adjective (31 Words)

<b>absurd</b>	Inconsistent with reason or logic or common sense- Walter Lippman. <i>It may look <b>absurd</b> but having a treadmill desk could improve your attention span.</i>
<b>bizarre</b>	Conspicuously or grossly unconventional or unusual. <i>A <b>bizarre</b> situation.</i>
<b>cranky</b>	(of a machine) working erratically. <i>He was <b>cranky</b> after eight hours of working.</i>
<b>crazy</b>	Extremely enthusiastic. <i>The crowd went <b>crazy</b>.</i>
<b><u>eccentric</u></b>	(of a person or their behaviour) unconventional and slightly strange. <i>Famed for his <b>eccentric</b> spelling.</i>
<b>fantastic</b>	Existing in fancy only- Nathaniel Hawthorne. <i>A <b>fantastic</b> trip to the Orient.</i>
<b>far out</b>	Being of a considerable distance or length.
<b>freakish</b>	Conspicuously or grossly unconventional or unusual. <i>A <b>freakish</b> combination of styles.</i>
<b><u>idiosyncratic</u></b>	Peculiar to the individual. <i>She emerged as one of the great <b>idiosyncratic</b> talents of the nineties.</i>
<b><u>insane</u></b>	Very foolish. <i>They were making <b>insane</b> amounts of money.</i>
<b>jutting</b>	Extending out above or beyond a surface or boundary. <i>The <b>jutting</b> limb of a tree.</i>
<b>madcap</b>	Characterized by undue haste and lack of thought or deliberation. <i>A <b>madcap</b> scheme.</i>
<b>nonsensical</b>	Having no meaning; making no sense. <i>Ask a <b>nonsensical</b> question and get a <b>nonsensical</b> answer.</i>
<b>obtrusive</b>	Undesirably noticeable. <i>Equally <b>obtrusive</b> was the graffiti.</i>
<b><u>odd</u></b>	An indefinite quantity more than that specified. <i>It s <b>odd</b> that she didn t recognize me.</i>
<b>offbeat</b>	Unconventional; unusual. <i>The answer sums up his <b>offbeat</b> skewed vision of the world.</i>
<b>outlandish</b>	Looking or sounding bizarre or unfamiliar. <i><b>Outlandish</b> brightly coloured clothes.</i>



<b>peculiar</b>	Markedly different from the usual-Virginia Woolf. <i>An expression <b>peculiar</b> to Canadians.</i>
<b>prominent</b>	Conspicuous in position or importance. <i>A <b>prominent</b> citizen.</i>
<b>protuberant</b>	Curving outward. <i>His <b>protuberant</b> eyes fluttered open.</i>
<b>proud</b>	Of an event achievement etc causing someone to feel proud. <i><b>Proud</b> parents.</i>
<b><u>quirky</u></b>	Having or characterized by peculiar or unexpected traits or aspects. <i>Her sense of humour was decidedly <b>quirky</b>.</i>
<b>ridiculous</b>	So unreasonable as to invite derision. <i>Her conceited assumption of universal interest in her rather dull children was <b>ridiculous</b>.</i>
<b>silly</b>	Ridiculously trivial or frivolous. <i><b>Silly</b> giggles.</i>
<b>standing out</b>	Having a supporting base.
<b>strange</b>	Relating to or originating in or characteristic of another place or part of the world. <i>Children have some <b>strange</b> ideas.</i>
<b><u>surreal</u></b>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>A <b>surreal</b> mix of fact and fantasy.</i>
<b>wacky</b>	Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular. <i>A <b>wacky</b> chase movie.</i>
<b><u>weird</u></b>	Strikingly odd or unusual. <i><b>Weird</b> inhuman sounds.</i>
<b>whacky</b>	Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular.
<b>zany</b>	Amusingly unconventional and idiosyncratic. <i>His <b>zany</b> humour.</i>

## Associations of "Goofy" (30 Words)

<b>absurd</b>	An absurd state of affairs. <i>It may look <b>absurd</b> but having a treadmill desk could improve your attention span.</i>
<b>absurdity</b>	The quality or state of being ridiculous or wildly unreasonable. <i>The crowd laughed at the <b>absurdity</b> of the clown's behavior.</i>
<b>comical</b>	Amusing, especially in a ludicrous or absurd way. <i>A <b>comical</b> look of surprise.</i>
<b>daft</b>	Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular. <i>Don't ask such <b>daft</b> questions.</i>
<b>dullard</b>	A person who evokes boredom. <i>He was caricatured as a dupe and a <b>dullard</b>.</i>

<b>farcical</b>	Relating to or resembling farce, especially because of absurd or ridiculous aspects. <i>He considered the whole idea <b>farcical</b>.</i>
<b>fatuity</b>	A ludicrous folly.
<b>fatuous</b>	Extremely silly or stupid. <i>A <b>fatuous</b> comment.</i>
<b>folly</b>	Foolish or senseless behavior. <i>Trying to drive through a blizzard is the height of <b>folly</b>.</i>
<b>fool</b>	Fool or hoax. <i>He <b>fooled</b> nightclub managers into believing he was a successful businessman.</i>
<b>foolish</b>	Having or revealing stupidity. <i><b>Foolish</b> remarks.</i>
<b>idiotic</b>	Having a mental age of three to seven years. <i>I was able to hum its <b>idiotic</b> theme tune.</i>
<b>illogical</b>	Lacking in correct logical relation. <i>An <b>illogical</b> fear of the supernatural.</i>
<b>impolitic</b>	Not politic. <i>An <b>impolitic</b> approach to a sensitive issue.</i>
<b>inadvisable</b>	Not prudent or wise; not recommended. <i>An unnecessary and <b>inadvisable</b> action.</i>
<b>inane</b>	Extremely silly or stupid. <i>Don't badger people with <b>inane</b> questions.</i>
<b>injudicious</b>	Lacking or showing lack of judgment or discretion; unwise. <i>I took a few <b>injudicious</b> swigs of potent cider.</i>
<b>laughable</b>	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>If it didn't make me so angry it would be <b>laughable</b>.</i>
<b>ludicrous</b>	Incongruous; inviting ridicule. <i>It's <b>ludicrous</b> that I have been fined.</i>
<b>nonsense</b>	Ornamental objects of no great value. <i><b>Nonsense</b> syllables.</i>
<b>nuts</b>	Mad. <i>The way he turns on the television as soon as he walks in drives me <b>nuts</b>.</i>
<b>preposterous</b>	Contrary to reason or common sense; utterly absurd or ridiculous. <i>A <b>preposterous</b> attempt to turn back the pages of history.</i>
<b>puerile</b>	Displaying or suggesting a lack of maturity. <i>A <b>puerile</b> argument.</i>



<b>ridiculous</b>	Inspiring scornful pity. <i>It seems absolutely <b>ridiculous</b> that anyone would try to pull a stunt like this.</i>
<b>ridiculously</b>	So as to arouse or deserve laughter. <i><b>Ridiculously</b> I felt like crying.</i>
<b>silly</b>	Helpless; defenceless (typically used of a woman, child, or animal). <i>He would brood about <b>silly</b> things.</i>
<b><u>twit</u></b>	Harass with persistent criticism or carping.
<b><u>unwise</u></b>	Showing or resulting from lack of judgment or wisdom. <i>An <b>unwise</b> investor is soon impoverished.</i>
<b>vacuous</b>	Having or showing a lack of thought or intelligence; mindless. <i><b>Vacuous</b> comments.</i>
<b>zany</b>	A zany person. <i>A <b>zany</b> sense of humor.</i>
