<b>appreciation</b>	A full understanding of a situation. <i>He had a fine <b>appreciation</b> of drawing.</i>
<b>apprehension</b>	Fearful expectation or anticipation. <i>The student looked around the examination room with <b>apprehension</b>.</i>
<b>awareness</b>	Having knowledge of. <i>A growing environmental <b>awareness</b>.</i>
<b>capacity</b>	The maximum production possible. <i>I was engaged in a voluntary <b>capacity</b>.</i>
<b>clasp</b>	A fastener (as a buckle or hook) that is used to hold two things together. <i>A gold bracelet with a turquoise <b>clasp</b>.</i>
<b>clench</b>	A small slip noose made with seizing. <i>She saw the anger rise saw the <b>clench</b> of his fists.</i>
<b>clutch</b>	A clutch bag. <i>She made a <b>clutch</b> at his body.</i>

<b>clutches</b>	A coupling that connects or disconnects driving and driven parts of a driving mechanism.
<b>cognizance</b>	Range of what one can know or understand. <i>The Renaissance <b>cognizance</b> of Greece was limited.</i>
<b>compass</b>	The range or scope of something. <i>The event had political repercussions which are beyond the <b>compass</b> of this book.</i>
<b>comprehension</b>	An ability to understand the meaning or importance of something (or the knowledge acquired as a result). <i>The <b>comprehension</b> of spoken language.</i>
<b>conception</b>	The action of conceiving a child or of one being conceived. <i>Our <b>conception</b> of how language relates to reality.</i>
<b>grip</b>	A hairgrip. <i>They kept a firm <b>grip</b> on the two top priorities.</i>
<b>hold</b>	A stronghold. <i>He lost his <b>hold</b> and fell.</i>
<b>ken</b>	One's range of knowledge or understanding. <i>Beyond my <b>ken</b>.</i>
<b>knowledge</b>	Facts, information, and skills acquired through experience or education; the theoretical or practical understanding of a subject. <i>The transmission of <b>knowledge</b>.</i>
<b>limits</b>	The greatest amount of something that is possible or allowed. <i>There are <b>limits</b> on the amount you can bet.</i>
<b>perception</b>	Knowledge gained by perceiving. <i>Luther had a new <b>perception</b> of the Bible.</i>
<b>power</b>	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>The <b>power</b> went oout around midnight.</i>
<b>range</b>	The maximum distance to which a gun will shoot or over which a missile will travel. <i>Grand hotels were outside my price <b>range</b>.</i>
<b>reach</b>	A distance traversed in reaching. <i>Outside the <b>reach</b> of the law.</i>
<b>realization</b>	An instance or embodiment of an abstract group as the set of symmetry operations of some object or set. <i>Verbal sequences were produced using segmental <b>realization</b>.</i>
<b>scope</b>	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Plato even maintains religion to be the chief aim and <b>scope</b> of human life.</i>

**understanding** The statement (oral or written) of an exchange of promises.  
*Foreign visitors with little **understanding** of English.*

### **absorb**

Cause to become one with.

*She sat in an armchair **absorbed** in a book.*

<b>act on</b>	Behave in a certain manner; show a certain behavior; conduct or comport oneself.
<b>apprehend</b>	Anticipate with dread or anxiety. <i>We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise <b>apprehend</b>.</i>
<b>assimilate</b>	Take in and understand fully (information or ideas). <i>Immigrants often want to <b>assimilate</b> quickly.</i>
<b>clasp</b>	Place (one's arms) around something so as to hold it tightly. <i>He <b>clasped</b> Joanne in his arms.</i>
<b><u>clench</u></b>	Squeeze together tightly. <i>Ian s right hand <b>clenched</b> into a fist.</i>
<b>clutch</b>	Affect. <i>She <b>clutched</b> her purse.</i>
<b><u>compass</u></b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>This writer attempts more than his talents can <b>compass</b>.</i>
<b>comprehend</b>	To become aware of through the senses. <i>I simply couldn t <b>comprehend</b> what had happened.</i>
<b>dig</b>	Remove harvest or recover by digging. <i><b>Dig</b> out a channel.</i>
<b>follow</b>	Come as a logical consequence follow logically. <i>When he lectures I cannot <b>follow</b>.</i>
<b>get the picture</b>	Perceive by hearing.
<b>get to the bottom of</b>	Irritate.
<b>grip</b>	To grip or seize as in a wrestling match. <i>She was <b>gripped</b> by a feeling of excitement.</i>
<b>grok</b>	Establish a rapport. <i>Nestling earth couple would like to find water brothers to <b>grok</b> with in peace.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Hold the attention of. <i>He was <b>holding</b> and the police hauled him off to jail.</i>
<b>hold on</b>	Have or hold in one's hands or grip.
<b>lay hold of</b>	Put in a horizontal position.
<b>make sense of</b>	Eliminate urine.
<b>master</b>	Make a master copy of a film or recording. <i>All records are now being <b>mastered</b> and manufactured for us in the Netherlands.</i>

<b>perceive</b>	Become aware or conscious of (something); come to realize or understand. <i>If Guy does not <b>perceive</b> himself as disabled nobody else should.</i>
<b>realize</b>	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>His worst fears have been <b>realized</b>.</i>
<b>savvy</b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>Charley would <b>savvy</b> what to do.</i>
<b>see</b>	See and understand have a good eye. <i>It has to be the answer don t you <b>see</b>.</i>
<b>take advantage of</b>	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
<b>take in</b>	Take into one s possession.
<b>understand</b>	Be understanding of. <i>She didn t really <b>understand</b> the situation.</i>





## Usage Examples of "Grasp" as a verb

- *She grasped the bottle.*
- *Edward grasped her by the wrist.*
- *The press failed to grasp the significance of what had happened.*
- *Many companies grasped the opportunity to expand.*



## Associations of "Grasp" (30 Words)

- acceptance** Banking: a time draft drawn on and accepted by a bank.  
*A mood of resigned **acceptance**.*
- apprehend** Understand or perceive.  
*We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise **apprehend**.*
- capture** Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping.  
*The free electrons were moving too rapidly to be **captured** by nuclei.*
- catch** Discover or come upon accidentally suddenly or unexpectedly catch somebody doing something or in a certain state.  
*The **catch** was only 10 fish.*

<b>clasp</b>	Grasp firmly. <i>A gold bracelet with a turquoise <b>clasp</b>.</i>
<b><u>clench</u></b>	A small slip noose made with seizing. <i>He <b>clenched</b> the steering wheel so hard that the car wobbled.</i>
<b>clutch</b>	The pedal operating the clutch in a vehicle. <i>He is a good man in the <b>clutch</b>.</i>
<b><u>commiserate</u></b>	Express or feel sympathy or pity; sympathize. <i>She went over to <b>commiserate</b> with Rose on her unfortunate circumstances.</i>
<b>comprehend</b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>I simply couldn't <b>comprehend</b> what had happened.</i>
<b>comprehensible</b>	Able to be understood; intelligible. <i>Clear and <b>comprehensible</b> English.</i>
<b><u>comprehension</u></b>	The setting of questions on a set text to test understanding, as a school exercise. <i>How you can do that is beyond my <b>comprehension</b>.</i>
<b><u>construe</u></b>	Analyse the syntax of (a text, sentence, or word). <i>His words could hardly be <b>construed</b> as an apology.</i>
<b>embrace</b>	Include or contain (something) as a constituent part. <i>Totalitarianism has meant that no interest falls outside the <b>embrace</b> of the state.</i>
<b>empathize</b>	Understand and share the feelings of another. <i>Counsellors need to be able to <b>empathize</b> with people.</i>
<b><u>engage</u></b>	Keep engaged. <i><b>Engage</b> aid help services or support.</i>
<b><u>grab</u></b>	A mechanical device for clutching, lifting, and moving things, especially materials in bulk. <i>She <b>grabbed</b> her keys and rushed out.</i>
<b>grapple</b>	Struggle to deal with or overcome (a difficulty or challenge). <i>Passers by <b>grappled</b> with the man after the knife attack.</i>
<b>grip</b>	To grip or seize as in a wrestling match. <i>It was an old briefcase but it still had a good <b>grip</b>.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Have room for hold without crowding. <i>I don't know what the future <b>holds</b>.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Shut up (domestic animals) in a pound or enclosure. <i>The cattle were rounded up and <b>impounded</b>.</i>

<b>know</b>	Be cognizant or aware of a fact or a specific piece of information possess knowledge or information about. <i>I <b>know</b> Latin.</i>
<b>perceivable</b>	Capable of being apprehended or understood. <i><b>Perceivable</b> through the mist.</i>
<b>recognize</b>	Express obligation, thanks, or gratitude for. <i>Julia hardly <b>recognized</b> Jill when they met.</i>
<b>savvy</b>	Get the meaning of something. <i>Most of us are pretty web <b>savvy</b>.</i>
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>I realized that the mechanism had <b>seized</b>.</i>
<b><u>sympathize</u></b>	Feel or express sympathy. <i>It is easy to understand and <b>sympathize</b> with his predicament.</i>
<b>tongs</b>	An instrument with two movable arms that are joined at one end, used for picking up and holding things. <i>Sugar <b>tongs</b>.</i>
<b>understand</b>	Be understanding of. <i>I don't <b>understand</b> the idea.</i>
<b>understandable</b>	To be expected; natural, reasonable, or forgivable. <i>It is <b>understandable</b> that mistakes occur sometimes.</i>
