apprehension	Fearful expectation or anticipation. <i>The student looked around the examination room with apprehension.</i>
awareness	Having knowledge of. <i>A growing environmental awareness.</i>
capacity	The maximum production possible. <i>I was engaged in a voluntary capacity.</i>
clasp	A fastener (as a buckle or hook) that is used to hold two things together. <i>A gold bracelet with a turquoise clasp.</i>
clench	A small slip noose made with seizing. <i>She saw the anger rise saw the clench of his fists.</i>
clutch	A clutch bag. <i>She made a clutch at his body.</i>

clutches	A coupling that connects or disconnects driving and driven parts of a driving mechanism.
cognizance	Range of what one can know or understand. <i>The Renaissance cognizance of Greece was limited.</i>
compass	The range or scope of something. <i>The event had political repercussions which are beyond the compass of this book.</i>
comprehension	An ability to understand the meaning or importance of something (or the knowledge acquired as a result). <i>The comprehension of spoken language.</i>
conception	The action of conceiving a child or of one being conceived. <i>Our conception of how language relates to reality.</i>
grip	A hairgrip. <i>They kept a firm grip on the two top priorities.</i>
hold	A stronghold. <i>He lost his hold and fell.</i>
ken	One's range of knowledge or understanding. <i>Beyond my ken.</i>
knowledge	Facts, information, and skills acquired through experience or education; the theoretical or practical understanding of a subject. <i>The transmission of knowledge.</i>
limits	The greatest amount of something that is possible or allowed. <i>There are limits on the amount you can bet.</i>
perception	Knowledge gained by perceiving. <i>Luther had a new perception of the Bible.</i>
power	Denoting a sports player team or style of play that makes use of power rather than finesse. <i>The power went oout around midnight.</i>
range	The maximum distance to which a gun will shoot or over which a missile will travel. <i>Grand hotels were outside my price range.</i>
reach	A distance traversed in reaching. <i>Outside the reach of the law.</i>
realization	An instance or embodiment of an abstract group as the set of symmetry operations of some object or set. <i>Verbal sequences were produced using segmental realization.</i>
scope	A telescope microscope or other device having a name ending in scope. <i>Plato even maintains religion to be the chief aim and scope of human life.</i>

understanding The statement (oral or written) of an exchange of promises.
*Foreign visitors with little **understanding** of English.*

absorb

Cause to become one with.

*She sat in an armchair **absorbed** in a book.*

act on	Behave in a certain manner; show a certain behavior; conduct or comport oneself.
apprehend	Anticipate with dread or anxiety. <i>We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise apprehend.</i>
assimilate	Take in and understand fully (information or ideas). <i>Immigrants often want to assimilate quickly.</i>
clasp	Place (one's arms) around something so as to hold it tightly. <i>He clasped Joanne in his arms.</i>
<u>clench</u>	Squeeze together tightly. <i>Ian s right hand clenched into a fist.</i>
clutch	Affect. <i>She clutched her purse.</i>
<u>compass</u>	Get the meaning of something. <i>This writer attempts more than his talents can compass.</i>
comprehend	To become aware of through the senses. <i>I simply couldn t comprehend what had happened.</i>
dig	Remove harvest or recover by digging. <i>Dig out a channel.</i>
follow	Come as a logical consequence follow logically. <i>When he lectures I cannot follow.</i>
get the picture	Perceive by hearing.
get to the bottom of	Irritate.
grip	To grip or seize as in a wrestling match. <i>She was gripped by a feeling of excitement.</i>
grok	Establish a rapport. <i>Nestling earth couple would like to find water brothers to grok with in peace.</i>
hold	Hold the attention of. <i>He was holding and the police hauled him off to jail.</i>
hold on	Have or hold in one's hands or grip.
lay hold of	Put in a horizontal position.
make sense of	Eliminate urine.
master	Make a master copy of a film or recording. <i>All records are now being mastered and manufactured for us in the Netherlands.</i>

perceive	Become aware or conscious of (something); come to realize or understand. <i>If Guy does not perceive himself as disabled nobody else should.</i>
realize	Earn on some commercial or business transaction; earn as salary or wages. <i>His worst fears have been realized.</i>
savvy	Get the meaning of something. <i>Charley would savvy what to do.</i>
see	See and understand have a good eye. <i>It has to be the answer don t you see.</i>
take advantage of	Interpret something in a certain way; convey a particular meaning or impression.
take in	Take into one s possession.
understand	Be understanding of. <i>She didn t really understand the situation.</i>

- apprehend** Understand or perceive.
*We enter a field of vision we could not otherwise **apprehend**.*
- capture** Capture as if by hunting snaring or trapping.
*The free electrons were moving too rapidly to be **captured** by nuclei.*
- catch** Discover or come upon accidentally suddenly or unexpectedly catch
somebody doing something or in a certain state.
*The **catch** was only 10 fish.*

clasp	Grasp firmly. <i>A gold bracelet with a turquoise clasp.</i>
<u>clench</u>	A small slip noose made with seizing. <i>He clenched the steering wheel so hard that the car wobbled.</i>
clutch	The pedal operating the clutch in a vehicle. <i>He is a good man in the clutch.</i>
<u>commiserate</u>	Express or feel sympathy or pity; sympathize. <i>She went over to commiserate with Rose on her unfortunate circumstances.</i>
comprehend	Get the meaning of something. <i>I simply couldn't comprehend what had happened.</i>
comprehensible	Able to be understood; intelligible. <i>Clear and comprehensible English.</i>
<u>comprehension</u>	The setting of questions on a set text to test understanding, as a school exercise. <i>How you can do that is beyond my comprehension.</i>
<u>construe</u>	Analyse the syntax of (a text, sentence, or word). <i>His words could hardly be construed as an apology.</i>
embrace	Include or contain (something) as a constituent part. <i>Totalitarianism has meant that no interest falls outside the embrace of the state.</i>
empathize	Understand and share the feelings of another. <i>Counsellors need to be able to empathize with people.</i>
<u>engage</u>	Keep engaged. <i>Engage aid help services or support.</i>
<u>grab</u>	A mechanical device for clutching, lifting, and moving things, especially materials in bulk. <i>She grabbed her keys and rushed out.</i>
grapple	Struggle to deal with or overcome (a difficulty or challenge). <i>Passers by grappled with the man after the knife attack.</i>
grip	To grip or seize as in a wrestling match. <i>It was an old briefcase but it still had a good grip.</i>
hold	Have room for hold without crowding. <i>I don't know what the future holds.</i>
impound	Shut up (domestic animals) in a pound or enclosure. <i>The cattle were rounded up and impounded.</i>

know	Be cognizant or aware of a fact or a specific piece of information possess knowledge or information about. <i>I know Latin.</i>
perceivable	Capable of being apprehended or understood. <i>Perceivable through the mist.</i>
recognize	Express obligation, thanks, or gratitude for. <i>Julia hardly recognized Jill when they met.</i>
savvy	Get the meaning of something. <i>Most of us are pretty web savvy.</i>
seize	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>I realized that the mechanism had seized.</i>
<u>sympathize</u>	Feel or express sympathy. <i>It is easy to understand and sympathize with his predicament.</i>
tongs	An instrument with two movable arms that are joined at one end, used for picking up and holding things. <i>Sugar tongs.</i>
understand	Be understanding of. <i>I don't understand the idea.</i>
understandable	To be expected; natural, reasonable, or forgivable. <i>It is understandable that mistakes occur sometimes.</i>
