## Gratification as a Noun

### Definitions of "Gratification" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “gratification” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *State of being gratified or satisfied.*
- *A source of pleasure.*
- *Pleasure, especially when gained from the satisfaction of a desire.*
- *The act or an instance of satisfying.*



## Synonyms of "Gratification" as a noun (8 Words)

- appeasement** The act of appeasing (as by acceding to the demands of).  
*A policy of **appeasement**.*
- assuagement** The feeling that comes when something burdensome is removed or reduced.
- fulfilment** The performance of a duty or role as required, pledged, or expected.  
*The **fulfilment** of statutory requirements.*
- indulgence** In the Roman Catholic Church a grant by the Pope of remission of the temporal punishment in purgatory still due for sins after absolution The unrestricted sale of indulgences by pardoners was a widespread abuse during the later Middle Ages.  
*Too much **indulgence** spoils a child.*
- quenching** The act of extinguishing; causing to stop burning.
- relief** A method of moulding carving or stamping in which the design stands out from the surface to a greater high relief or lesser low relief extent.  
*He cast them in **relief** from molten metal.*



**satiation** The act of achieving full gratification.

**satisfaction** The payment of a debt or fulfillment of an obligation.  
*We were unable to get **satisfaction** from the local store.*



## Usage Examples of "Gratification" as a noun

- *To my immense gratification he arrived on time.*
- *A thirst for sexual gratification.*
- *Dull repetitious work gives no gratification.*





## Associations of "Gratification" (30 Words)

- amuse** Make (somebody) laugh.  
*The play **amused** the ladies.*
- blessedness** A state of supreme happiness.
- bliss** A state of extreme happiness.  
*She gave a sigh of **bliss**.*
- complacency** A feeling of smug or uncritical satisfaction with oneself or one's achievements.  
*The figures are better but there are no grounds for **complacency**.*
- content** The state of being contented with your situation in life.  
*I am **contented**.*
- contentment** Happiness with one's situation in life.  
*He found **contentment** in living a simple life in the country.*

<b>delectation</b>	A feeling of extreme pleasure or satisfaction. <i>They had all manner of rock n roll goodies for our <b>delectation</b>.</i>
<b>delight</b>	Take delight in. <i>She took great <b>delight</b> in telling your story.</i>
<b>ecstasy</b>	Street names for methylenedioxyamphetamine. <i>There was a look of <b>ecstasy</b> on his face.</i>
<b>enjoyable</b>	Affording satisfaction or pleasure. <i>The company was <b>enjoyable</b>.</i>
<b>entertain</b>	Provide entertainment for. <i>Washington <b>entertained</b> little hope of an early improvement in relations.</i>
<b>euphoria</b>	A feeling of great (usually exaggerated) elation. <i>In his <b>euphoria</b> he had become convinced he could defeat them.</i>
<b>exult</b>	To express great joy. <i><b>Exulting</b> in her escape Lisa closed the door behind her.</i>
<b>exultant</b>	Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the <b>exultant</b> crowds.</i>
<b>glad</b>	Feeling happy appreciation. <i>I m really <b>glad</b> to hear that.</i>
<b>gladness</b>	Experiencing joy and pleasure.
<b>gratify</b>	Indulge or satisfy (a desire). <i>She was gratified to see the shock in Jim's eyes.</i>
<b>happiness</b>	The state of being happy. <i>She struggled to find <b>happiness</b> in her life.</i>
<b>happy</b>	Fortunate and convenient. <i>They tended to be grenade <b>happy</b>.</i>
<b>indulge</b>	Treat with excessive indulgence. <i>We <b>indulged</b> in a cream tea.</i>
<b>joviality</b>	A jovial nature.
<b>joy</b>	A thing that causes joy. <i>The <b>joy</b> of being alive.</i>
<b>please</b>	Cause to feel happy and satisfied. <i>This is the first time in ages that I can just <b>please</b> myself.</i>
<b>pleasure</b>	A formal expression. <i>He took his <b>pleasure</b> of her.</i>
<b>rapture</b>	A feeling of intense pleasure or joy. <i>The tabloids went into <b>raptures</b> about her.</i>



- rejoice** Be ecstatic with joy.  
*He **rejoiced** in her spontaneity.*
- satisfaction** Compensation for a wrong.  
*The full and final **satisfaction** of the claim.*
- satisfy** Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.  
*There was insufficient collateral to **satisfy** the loan.*
- sensual** Relating to or involving gratification of the senses and physical, especially sexual, pleasure.  
*The production of the ballet is **sensual** and passionate.*
- thrilled** Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
