- A place where a broken or discarded object lies.
- A hole dug in the ground to receive a coffin or dead body, typically marked by a stone or mound.
- A place for the burial of a corpse (especially beneath the ground and marked by a



tombstone.

- Carve, cut, or etch into a material or surface.
- Shape (a material like stone or wood) by whittling away at it.

sculpt techniques.


Sculpting human figures from ivory.

inscription Letters inscribed (especially words engraved or carved) on something.

The **inscription** on her headstone.

inter Place in a grave or tomb.

He was **inter**red with the military honours due to him.

IntermentThe ritual placing of a corpse in a grave.

Interments took place in the shurchyard

Interments took place in the churchyard.

Mausoleum A large burial chamber, usually above ground.

A cultural **mausoleum** such as the Tate.

mummification Embalmment and drying a dead body and wrapping it as a mummy.

Bureaucratic **mummification** in red tape.

necropolis A cemetery, especially a large one belonging to an ancient city.

pharaoh

A ruler in ancient Egypt.

The time of the **pharaoh**s.

plaque A sticky deposit on teeth in which bacteria proliferate.

Plaque around gum margins can lead to gingivitis.

quietus Death or something that causes death, regarded as a release from life.

sarcophagus

A stone coffin, typically adorned with a sculpture or inscription and

associated with the ancient civilizations of Egypt, Rome, and Greece.

sepulcher A chamber that is used as a grave.
