<b>soberness</b>	<p>The state of not being under the influence of alcohol; sobriety.</p> <p>He leaves the festivities proclaiming his <b>soberness</b>.</p>
<b>sobriety</b>	<p>The state of being sober and not intoxicated by alcohol.</p> <p>The price of beer compelled me to maintain a certain level of <b>sobriety</b>.</p>
<b>solemnity</b>	<p>A solemn and dignified feeling.</p> <p>His ashes were laid to rest with great <b>solemnity</b>.</p>
<b>somberness</b>	A manner that is serious and solemn.
<b>sombreness</b>	A feeling of melancholy apprehension.
