### **Definitions of "Gregarious" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “gregarious” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of plants) growing in groups that are close together.*
- *Tending to form a group with others of the same species.*
- *(of animals) living in flocks or loosely organized communities.*
- *Instinctively or temperamentally seeking and enjoying the company of others.*
- *(of plants) growing in open clusters or in pure associations.*
- *Growing in groups that are close together.*
- *(of animals) tending to form a group with others of the same species.*
- *(of a person) fond of company; sociable.*

- companionable** (of a situation) relaxed and pleasant because shared with friends or friendly people.

- living in flocks** Absolute.
- living in herds** Pertaining to living persons.
- living in shoals** Pertaining to living persons.
- organized** Methodical and efficient in arrangement or function.

**sociable**

Inclined to or conducive to companionship with others.

*Being a **sociable** person Eva loved entertaining.*

**social**

Composed of sociable people or formed for the purpose of sociability.

*Staff facilities included a **social** club and leisure complex.*



**Usage Examples of "Gregarious" as an adjective**

- *Gregarious species forage in flocks from colonies or roosts.*
- *Gregarious bird species.*
- *In the wild, trees are usually gregarious plants.*
- *He is a gregarious person who avoids solitude.*
- *He was a popular and gregarious man.*

<b>affable</b>	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>An <b>affable</b> smile.</i>
<b>anomie</b>	Lack of moral standards in a society. <i>The theory that high rise architecture leads to <b>anomie</b> in the residents.</i>
<b>companionable</b>	Suggestive of companionship. <i>A <b>companionable</b> young man.</i>
<b>conformism</b>	Orthodoxy in thoughts and belief.
<b>conservatism</b>	The doctrines of the Conservative Party of Great Britain or a similar party elsewhere. <i>A party that espoused <b>conservatism</b>.</i>
<b>convivial</b>	(of an atmosphere or event) friendly, lively, and enjoyable. <i>A <b>convivial</b> cocktail party.</i>

<b>debutante</b>	A woman making her first public appearance, especially in sport. <i>The women s team includes eighteen year old <b>debutante</b> Katharine Merry.</i>
<b>democrat</b>	An advocate of democratic principles. <i>As a <b>democrat</b> I accepted the outcome of the referendum.</i>
<b>demography</b>	The branch of sociology that studies the characteristics of human populations. <i>Europe s <b>demography</b> is changing.</i>
<b>effluent</b>	Liquid waste or sewage discharged into a river or the sea. <i>Contamination with trade <b>effluents</b>.</i>
<b>epistemologist</b>	A specialist in epistemology.
<b>etiquette</b>	The customary code of polite behaviour in society or among members of a particular profession or group. <i><b>Etiquette</b> books.</i>
<b>extrovert</b>	Relating to denoting or typical of an extrovert. <i>His <b>extrovert</b> personality made him the ideal host.</i>
<b>extroverted</b>	At ease in talking to others. <i>She is <b>extroverted</b> confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
<b>friendly</b>	Favourable or serviceable. <i>Child <b>friendly</b> policies.</i>
<b>interpersonal</b>	Relating to relationships or communication between people. <i><b>Interpersonal</b> situations in which speech occurs.</i>
<b>introversion</b>	The quality of being shy and reticent. <i>We expected our sample to show elevated neuroticism and <b>introversion</b>.</i>
<b>liberalism</b>	The belief that many traditional beliefs are dispensable, invalidated by modern thought, or liable to change. <i>Representative democracy operates under the principles of classical <b>liberalism</b>.</i>
<b>maladjustment</b>	The condition of being unable to adapt properly to your environment with resulting emotional instability. <i>Economic <b>maladjustment</b> left the currency hopelessly vulnerable.</i>
<b>milieu</b>	A person's social environment. <i>Gregory came from the same aristocratic <b>milieu</b> as Sidonius.</i>
<b>mores</b>	The conventions that embody the fundamental values of a group. <i>An offence against social <b>mores</b>.</i>
<b>outgoing</b>	An instance of going out. <i>She s always been very <b>outgoing</b> and she s got heaps of friends.</i>



<b>personality</b>	Lively, engaging qualities. <i>She has triumphed by sheer force of <b>personality</b>.</i>
<b>phenomenon</b>	Any state or process known through the senses rather than by intuition or reasoning. <i>The band was a pop <b>phenomenon</b> just for their sales figures alone.</i>
<b>regimentation</b>	The imposition of order or discipline.
<b>sociable</b>	Willing to talk and engage in activities with other people; friendly. <i>Enjoyed a <b>sociable</b> chat.</i>
<b>social</b>	An informal social gathering especially one organized by the members of a particular club or group. <i><b>Social</b> legislation.</i>
<b>surroundings</b>	The things and conditions around a person or thing. <i>I took up the time admiring my <b>surroundings</b>.</i>
<b>theorist</b>	A person concerned with the theoretical aspects of a subject; a theoretician.
