<b>comfortless</b>	Having or offering nothing that serves to ease feelings or grief or distress. <i>A <b>comfortless</b> room.</i>
<b>cruel</b>	Causing pain or suffering. <i>People who are <b>cruel</b> to animals.</i>
<b><u>cynical</u></b>	Believing that people are motivated purely by self-interest; distrustful of human sincerity or integrity. <i>Her <b>cynical</b> attitude.</i>
<b>dark</b>	Of a person having dark skin hair or eyes. <i><b>Dark</b> as the inside of a black cat.</i>
<b>depressed</b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i><b>Depressed</b> by the loss of his job.</i>
<b>depressing</b>	Causing sad feelings of gloom and inadequacy. <i>The economic outlook is <b>depressing</b>.</i>
<b><u>dingy</u></b>	Gloomy and drab. <i>A <b>dingy</b> room.</i>
<b><u>dire</u></b>	Fraught with extreme danger; nearly hopeless- G.C.Marshall. <i><b>Dire</b> news.</i>

<b>disconsolate</b>	Sad beyond comforting; incapable of being consoled. <i>She left Fritz looking <b>disconsolate</b>.</i>
<b><u>disheartening</u></b>	Causing someone to lose determination or confidence; discouraging or dispiriting. <i>Her death is particularly <b>disheartening</b> because it was preventable.</i>
<b>dismal</b>	Causing dejection. <i>The first <b>dismal</b> dispiriting days of November.</i>
<b>dispirited</b>	Having lost enthusiasm and hope; disheartened. <i>She was determined to appear unworried in front of her <b>dispirited</b> family.</i>
<b><u>distant</u></b>	Remote or far apart in resemblance or relationship. <i>A <b>distant</b> cousin of the King.</i>
<b>dour</b>	Showing a brooding ill humor. <i>A <b>dour</b> self sacrificing life.</i>
<b><u>down</u></b>	Denoting a flavour variety of stable quark having relatively low mass and an electric charge of $-\frac{1}{3}$ . In the Standard Model protons and neutrons are composed of up and down quarks. <i>You going to the movies Yo I m <b>down</b>.</i>
<b>down in the mouth</b>	Extending or moving from a higher to a lower place.
<b>downcast</b>	Directed downward. <i>Her modestly <b>downcast</b> eyes.</i>
<b>downhearted</b>	Discouraged; in low spirits. <i>Feeling discouraged and <b>downhearted</b>.</i>
<b><u>drab</u></b>	Lacking in liveliness or charm or surprise. <i>Her <b>drab</b> suburban existence.</i>
<b><u>dreadful</u></b>	Very unpleasant. <i>A <b>dreadful</b> storm.</i>
<b>drear</b>	Causing dejection.
<b>dreary</b>	Lacking in liveliness or charm or surprise. <i>A series of <b>dreary</b> dinner parties.</i>
<b>fatalistic</b>	Relating to or characteristic of the belief that all events are predetermined and therefore inevitable. <i>He gives a <b>fatalistic</b> shrug at the bleak future.</i>
<b>forbidding</b>	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. <i>A grim and <b>forbidding</b> building.</i>
<b>frightful</b>	Provoking horror- Winston Churchill. <i>A <b>frightful</b> crime of decapitation.</i>

<b>ghastly</b>	Gruesomely indicative of death or the dead. <i>One of the most <b>ghastly</b> crimes ever committed.</i>
<b>gloomy</b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i>A dark <b>gloomy</b> day.</i>
<b>grisly</b>	Shockingly repellent; inspiring horror. <i>The town was shaken by a series of <b>grisly</b> crimes.</i>
<b>gruesome</b>	Extremely unpleasant. <i>The most <b>gruesome</b> murder.</i>
<b>harrowing</b>	Acutely distressing. <i>It was a <b>harrowing</b> experience.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Severe. <i>The <b>harsh</b> white light makes you screw up your eyes.</i>
<b>horrendous</b>	Causing fear or dread or terror. <i>She suffered <b>horrendous</b> injuries.</i>
<b>horrible</b>	Very unpleasant. <i>A <b>horrible</b> massacre.</i>
<b>horrid</b>	Grossly offensive to decency or morality; causing horror. <i>When she was bad she was <b>horrid</b>.</i>
<b>inexorable</b>	Impossible to stop or prevent. <i>The seemingly <b>inexorable</b> march of new technology.</i>
<b>joyless</b>	Not experiencing or inspiring joy. <i>A <b>joyless</b> occasion.</i>
<b>low</b>	Below average in amount extent or intensity. <i>A <b>low</b> bow.</i>
<b>low-spirited</b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency.
<b>macabre</b>	Disturbing because concerned with or causing a fear of death. <i>A <b>macabre</b> series of murders.</i>
<b>merciless</b>	Showing no mercy. <i>A <b>merciless</b> critic.</i>
<b>mirthless</b>	Lacking mirth. <i>He gave a short <b>mirthless</b> laugh.</i>
<b>miserable</b>	Pitiably small or inadequate. <i><b>Miserable</b> victims of war.</i>
<b>mordant</b>	Of a substance, especially a strong acid; capable of destroying or eating away by chemical action. <i>A <b>mordant</b> sense of humour.</i>

<b>pitiless</b>	(especially of weather) unrelentingly harsh or severe. <i>A night of <b>pitiless</b> rain.</i>
<b>relentless</b>	Unceasingly intense. <i>A patient but <b>relentless</b> taskmaster.</i>
<b>ruthless</b>	Having or showing no pity or compassion for others. <i>An act of <b>ruthless</b> ferocity.</i>
<b>savage</b>	Cruel and vicious; aggressively hostile. <i>The decision was a <b>savage</b> blow for the town.</i>
<b>severe</b>	Severely simple. <i>A <b>severe</b> test of stamina.</i>
<b>shocking</b>	Very bad. <i>I ve got a <b>shocking</b> cold.</i>
<b>sick</b>	Intensely annoyed with or bored by (someone or something) as a result of having had too much of them. <i>Gossip that makes one <b>sick</b>.</i>
<b>sombre</b>	Dark or dull in colour or tone. <i>The night skies were <b>sombre</b> and starless.</i>
<b>sorry</b>	Without merit; of little or no value or use. <i>I m <b>sorry</b> you were saying.</i>
<b>stern</b>	Of a stern or strict bearing or demeanor forbidding in aspect. <i>The <b>stern</b> demands of parenthood.</i>
<b>terrible</b>	Exceptionally bad or displeasing. <i>A <b>terrible</b> crime.</i>
<b>unappeasable</b>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>What began as an aspiration turned soon to an <b>unappeasable</b> hunger.</i>
<b>unapproachable</b>	Discouraging intimacies; reserved. <i>An <b>unapproachable</b> executive.</i>
<b>unforgiving</b>	Unwilling or unable to forgive or show mercy. <i>He was always a proud and <b>unforgiving</b> man.</i>
<b>uninviting</b>	Not tempting. <i>The house was dark and <b>uninviting</b>.</i>
<b>unrelenting</b>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i><b>Unrelenting</b> opponents.</i>
<b>unspeakable</b>	Too sacred to be uttered. <i>I felt an <b>unspeakable</b> tenderness towards her.</i>

<b>vicious</b>	Bringing or deserving severe rebuke or censure. <i>The dog was <b>vicious</b> and likely to bite.</i>
<b>wretched</b>	(of a person) in a very unhappy or unfortunate state. <i>The <b>wretched</b> conditions of the slums.</i>

<b>disconsolate</b>	Sad beyond comforting; incapable of being consoled. <i>A <b>disconsolate</b> winter landscape.</i>
<b>dismal</b>	(of a person or their mood) gloomy. <i>His <b>dismal</b> mood was not dispelled by finding the house empty.</i>
<b>dour</b>	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>A hard <b>dour</b> humourless fanatic.</i>
<b>downcast</b>	A ventilation shaft through which air enters a mine. <i><b>Downcast</b> after his defeat.</i>
<b><u>drab</u></b>	Clothes especially trousers made of drab. <i><b>Drab</b> camouflage uniforms.</i>
<b>dreary</b>	Lacking in liveliness or charm or surprise. <i>A series of <b>dreary</b> dinner parties.</i>
<b>gloom</b>	Be or look depressed or despondent. <i>His <b>gloom</b> deepened.</i>
<b><u>gloomy</u></b>	Filled with melancholy and despondency. <i><b>Gloomy</b> at the thought of what he had to face.</i>
<b>heartsick</b>	Full of sorrow. <i>Too <b>heartsick</b> to fight back.</i>

<b><u>melancholy</u></b>	A humor that was once believed to be secreted by the kidneys or spleen and to cause sadness and melancholy. <i>We acquainted him with the <b>melancholy</b> truth.</i>
<b>mourning</b>	The expression of sorrow for someone's death. <i>She s still in <b>mourning</b> after the death of her husband.</i>
<b>pensive</b>	Showing pensive sadness. <i>A <b>pensive</b> mood.</i>
<b>sad</b>	Of things that make you feel sad Christina Rossetti. <i>He told her the <b>sad</b> story of his life.</i>
<b>sadness</b>	The state of being sad. <i>It is one of life s <b>sadnesses</b>.</i>
<b><u>somber</u></b>	Grave or even gloomy in character. <i>Children in <b>somber</b> brown clothes.</i>
