- *A broad smile.*

broad smile Slang term for a woman.

grinning A facial expression characterized by turning up the corners of the mouth; usually shows pleasure or amusement.

smile A pleased, kind, or amused facial expression, typically with the corners of the mouth turned up and the front teeth exposed.

*She greeted us all with a **smile**.*

smiling The action or fact of smiling.

***Smiling** is still a big part of the job.*

smirk

A smile expressing smugness or scorn instead of pleasure.

*Gloria pursed her mouth in a self satisfied **smirk**.*

Grin as a Verb

Definitions of "Grin" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "grin" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *To draw back the lips and reveal the teeth, in a smile, grimace, or snarl.*
- *Smile broadly.*
- *Express with a broad smile.*
- *Grimace grotesquely so as to reveal the teeth.*



Synonyms of "Grin" as a verb (7 Words)

| <u>beam</u> | Express with a beaming face or smile. <i>He beamed his approval.</i> |
| grin from ear to ear | To draw back the lips and reveal the teeth, in a smile, grimace, or snarl. |
| grin like a cheshire cat | To draw back the lips and reveal the teeth, in a smile, grimace, or snarl. |
| smile | Express with a smile. <i>At first fortune smiled on him.</i> |
| smile broadly | Express with a smile. |
| smile from ear to ear | Express with a smile. |
| <u>smirk</u> | Smile in an irritatingly smug, conceited, or silly way. <i>He smirked in triumph.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Grin" as a verb

- *She grinned her approval.*
- *Dennis appeared, grinning cheerfully.*
- *The skull grinned back at him, its eye sockets dark and hollow.*
- *'My word,' grinned the delighted man.*

| <u>joyful</u> | Full of high-spirited delight. <i>Joyful music.</i> |
| laugh | An act of laughing. <i>His face wrinkled in a silent laugh of derision.</i> |
| laughing | Showing or feeling mirth or pleasure or happiness. <i>Laughing children.</i> |
| <u>merry</u> | Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. <i>A merry evening.</i> |

| simper | An affectedly coy or ingratiating smile. <i>She simpered looking pleased with herself.</i> |
| smile | Express with a smile. <i>He smiled his admiration of the great stone circle.</i> |
| smiling | Smiling with happiness or optimism. <i>It s nice to see everyone s smiling faces.</i> |
| <u>smirk</u> | A smug, conceited, or silly smile. <i>Gloria pursed her mouth in a self satisfied smirk.</i> |
| <u>snicker</u> | Laugh quietly. <i>He could imagine them snickering as he passed.</i> |
| <u>wink</u> | An act of winking. <i>The authorities winked at their illegal trade.</i> |
