befuddled	Unable to think clearly; confused or perplexed. <i>The wino s poor befuddled mind.</i>
benumbed	Having lost or been caused to lose interest because of overexposure. <i>The benumbed intellectual faculties can no longer respond.</i>
bewildered	Perplexed by many conflicting situations or statements; filled with bewilderment. <i>Bewildered and confused.</i>
confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>The confused information supplied by authorities.</i>

dazed	In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock. <i>I was left dazed and confused.</i>
disorientated	Having lost one's sense of direction; disoriented. <i>When he emerged into the street he was totally disorientated.</i>
disoriented	Socially disoriented. <i>Jet lag leaves you irritable disoriented and tired.</i>
dizzy	Having or involving a sensation of spinning around and losing one's balance. <i>Had a dizzy spell.</i>
faint	Lacking strength or vigor. <i>Haven't the faintest idea.</i>
foggy	Filled or abounding with fog or mist. <i>She was foggy with sleep.</i>
fuddled	Confused or stupefied, especially as a result of drinking alcohol. <i>Fuddled drinkers spilt their brandy and slid beneath the table.</i>
in a stupor	Directed or bound inward.
logy	Dull and heavy in motion or thought; sluggish. <i>The beer made them logy and disinclined to move.</i>
muddled	Not arranged in order; untidy. <i>Such a view reflects muddled thinking.</i>
muzzy	Blurred; indistinct. <i>Society's muzzy notion of tolerance.</i>
numb	(of a part of the body) deprived of the power of physical sensation. <i>Numb to the cries for mercy.</i>
punch-drunk	Dazed from or as if from repeated blows.
shaky	Not secure; beset with difficulties. <i>A cracked dangerously shaky table.</i>
staggering	Deeply shocking; astonishing. <i>The amount of money required was staggering.</i>
stunned	In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock. <i>She stared at him in stunned disbelief.</i>
stupefied	In a state of mental numbness especially as resulting from shock. <i>Lay semiconscious stunned or stupefied by the blow.</i>
stuporous	Stunned or confused and slow to react (as from blows or drunkenness or exhaustion).
unsteady	Not firmly or solidly positioned. <i>Her unsteady walk.</i>

vague	Lacking clarity or distinctness. <i>Saw a vague outline of a building through the fog.</i>
weak	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A weak mind.</i>
wobbly	(of a line or handwriting) not straight or regular. <i>A wobbly soprano.</i>

disorient	Cause someone to lose their sense of direction disorientate. <i>I was disoriented by the dark.</i>
dispirited	Having lost enthusiasm and hope; disheartened. <i>A dispirited and divided Party.</i>
dormant	In a condition of biological rest or suspended animation. <i>That dormant urge to write fiction has re emerged.</i>
doze	Sleep lightly. <i>I dozed off for a few seconds.</i>
dreaming	Imaginative thoughts indulged in while awake.
dreamy	Dreamy in mood or nature. <i>The atmosphere is tranquil and dreamy.</i>
drowse	Be sluggish or inactive. <i>Any birds which the heat has not utterly drowsed.</i>
drowsiness	A very sleepy state. <i>This drug can cause drowsiness.</i>
drowsy	(of a place) peaceful and quiet. <i>The wine had made her drowsy.</i>
exhausted	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Kirov spat his patience suddenly exhausted.</i>

feeble	Lacking strength of character. <i>Feeble efforts.</i>
gloomy	Causing or feeling depression or despondency. <i>A gloomy corridor badly lit by oil lamps.</i>
ill	Presaging ill fortune. <i>A terminally ill patient.</i>
lackadaisical	Lacking enthusiasm and determination; carelessly lazy. <i>She was annoyingly lackadaisical and impractical.</i>
languid	Weak or faint from illness or fatigue. <i>She was pale languid and weak as if she had delivered a child.</i>
languorous	Characterized by an oppressive stillness. <i>A hot languorous afternoon.</i>
lethargic	Affected by lethargy; sluggish and apathetic. <i>Bullfrogs became lethargic with the first cold nights.</i>
lethargy	A pathological state of sleepiness or deep unresponsiveness and inactivity. <i>A history of weight loss lethargy and fluid retention.</i>
listless	(of a person or their manner) lacking energy or enthusiasm. <i>Bouts of listless depression.</i>
nap	A card game similar to whist; usually played for stakes. <i>Excuse me I ll just take a little nap.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>You ll be fully recovered before you know it.</i>
sleep	A period of time spent sleeping. <i>Two more sleeps till I fly to LA.</i>
sleepy	Ready to fall asleep. <i>Sleepyheaded students.</i>
sluggish	Slow to respond or make progress. <i>Alex woke late feeling tired and sluggish.</i>
somnolence	A very sleepy state.
somnolent	Inclined to or marked by drowsiness. <i>The sound had a somnolent effect.</i>
tired	(especially of a statement or idea) boring or uninteresting because overfamiliar. <i>I have to look after these animals when you get tired of them.</i>
uninterested	Not having or showing interest. <i>An uninterested voice.</i>
vertigo	A reeling sensation; a feeling that you are about to fall.
